with the reservation of power to correct mechanical and typographical errors. Motion seconded by Commissioner Stebbins. Chairman Crosby abstained from the vote as he was absent from the meeting on May 6th.

Motion passed four to zero.

10:29 a.m. Commissioner McHugh moved for the approval of the May 14, 2015

minutes with the reservation of power to correct mechanical and typographical errors. Motion seconded by Commissioner Stebbins.

Commissioner McHugh abstained from the vote as he was absent from the

meeting on May 14th. Motion passed four to zero.

Administrative Update

- 10:30 a.m. Robert DeSalvio, President of Wynn MA, provided an update on the Wynn Project Schedule and Quarterly Report as of March 31st which included: permitting, SSFEIR, MBTA land transaction, escrow arrangement, traffic and transportation, response to comments, site plan review application, notice of intent to Everett Conservation Commission, and Chapter 91 application.
- 10:46 a.m. Chris Gordon, Project Manager for Wynn Everett, provided an update on remediation, public input meeting and comment period, detail plans for contractors, building design, offsite infrastructure, RFP process, permitting, project schedule, regulatory work, cost estimates, utilities, fencing, and debris removal.
- 11:04 a.m. Robert DeSalvio provided an update on Wynn project resources and diversity which included representation on the Access and Opportunity Committee and workforce goals. A video was shown highlighting a successful labor fair attracting approximately 800-1000 individuals.
- 11:19 am. The Commission took a short recess.
- <u>11:26 a.m.</u> The meeting resumed.
- 11:27 a.m. CFAO Derek Lennon provided an update on the Massachusetts Gaming Commission's 3rd Quarter FY15 Budget which included: paid licensee assessments, no changes projected for FY15 revenue estimates, proposed spending changes, and status of the indirect waiver request.
- 11:44 a.m. Financial Analyst Agnes Beaulieu reported on the status of spending benchmarks which included exceeding benchmarks set for women-owned businesses and small businesses, and a projection to reach the benchmark set for minority businesses. Ms. Beaulieu also reported that they have reached out to the Secretary of Veterans Services and they will research veteran-owned companies within the Commonwealth.
- 11:54 a.m. Human Resources Manager Trupti Banda provided an update on staffing since December 2014 which included the hiring of 21 gaming employees and 18 seasonal racing employees. Ms. Banda reported that they have reached an agency goal of 25% diversity. Ms. Banda also reported they will continue to build their networks to locate qualified candidates and will implement an applicant tracking system.
- 11:59 p.m. IEB Director Karen Wells provided a Region C update on KG Urban. The IEB has received an unsigned proposed term sheet and a report from KG Urban that they are still in negotiations with GLPI. No forms required as part of the RFA 1 process have been received from GLPI.

- 12:02 p.m. Managing Partner Andrew Stern, KG Urban, provided an update on the status of negotiations with GLPI. He stated that they do not have a signed term sheet however drafts have been provided to the IEB to show progress made. He also reported that GLPI's position is that they will act as a funding source and will not have a role in operational matters. He further reported that the project was at a standstill for 18 months, the design team had to make new changes due to a footprint change, they had to reorganize in a 45 day crunch, and they are now close to signing the term sheet all as an explanation as to why they have not submitted additional materials to the IEB.
- 12:47 p.m. Commissioner McHugh moved that the Commission consider the application of KG Urban substantially complete provided that KG Urban submits to the IEB no later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 9, 2015 a completed signed term sheet signed by all parties to the contract. 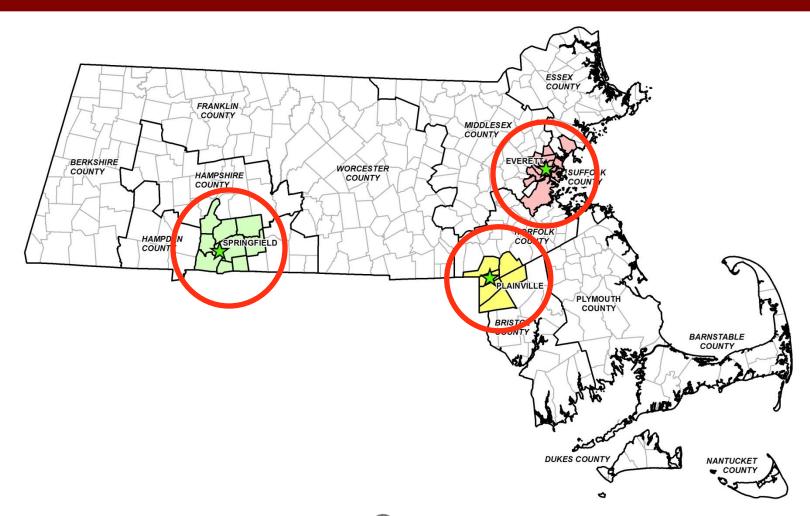

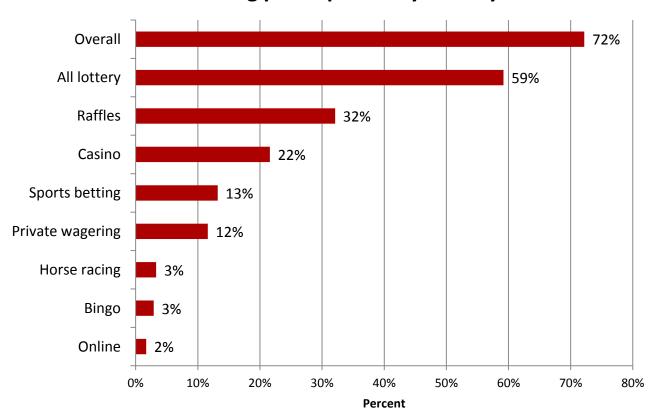

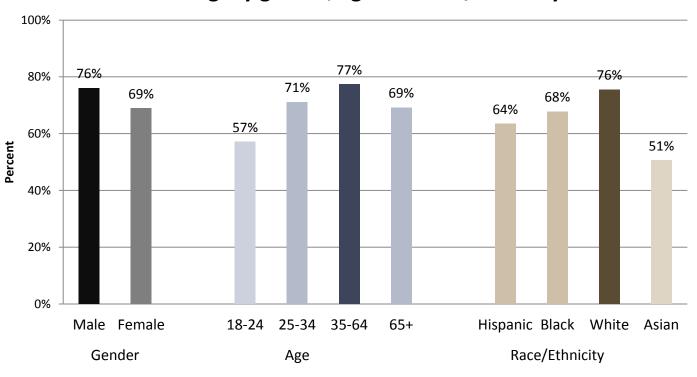

Past-year Gambling Participation by Gender, Age, and Race/Ethnicity

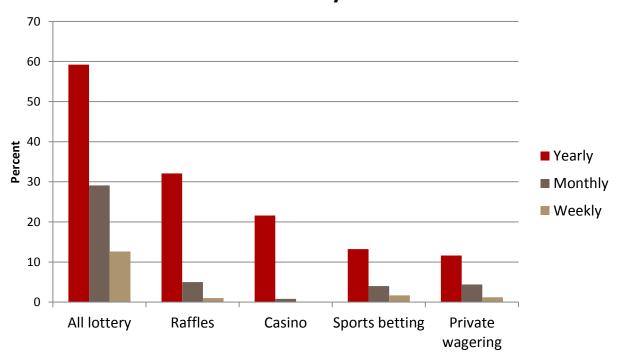
Gambling by gender, age and race/ethnicity





Frequency of Gambling Participation by Activity

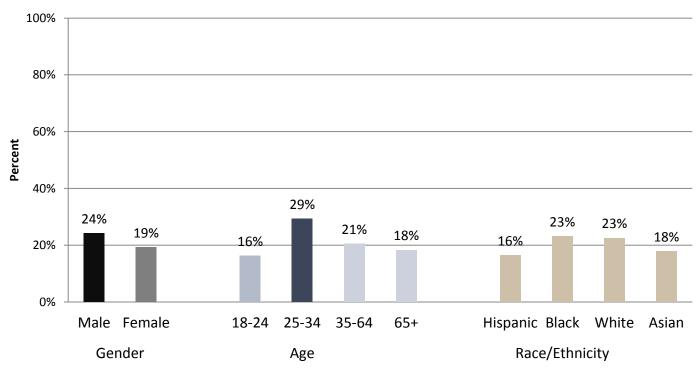
Frequency of gambling participation by gambling activity





Past-year Casino Participation by Gender, Age, and Race/Ethnicity

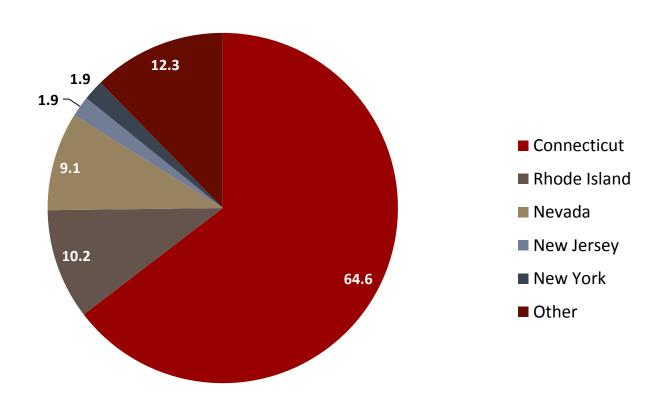
Casino participation by gender, age and race/ethnicity

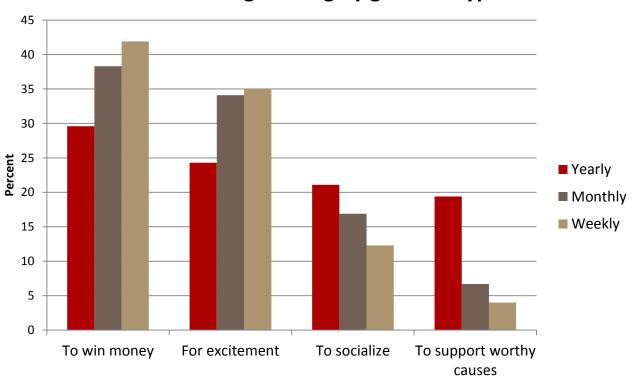

Reasons for gambling by gambler type





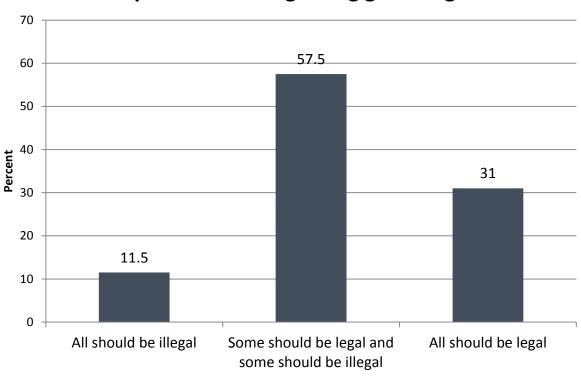

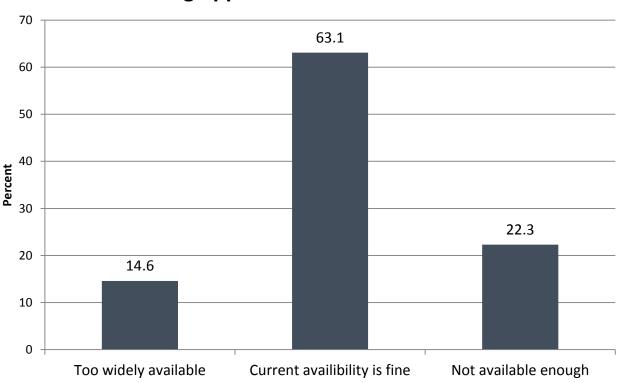

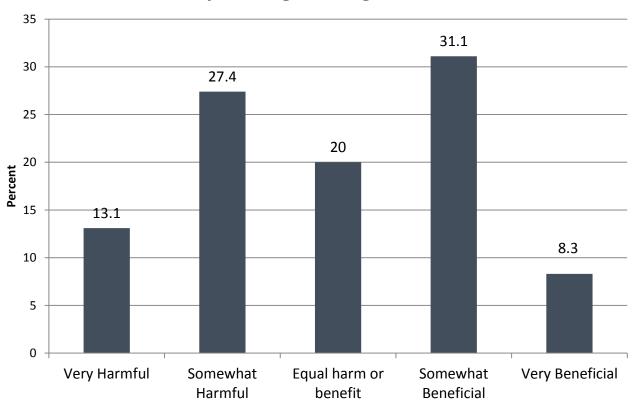

Impact of Gambling Expansion on State

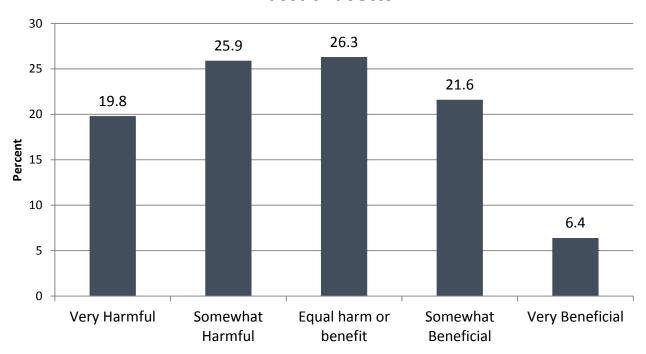
Perceived impact of gambling in Massachusetts

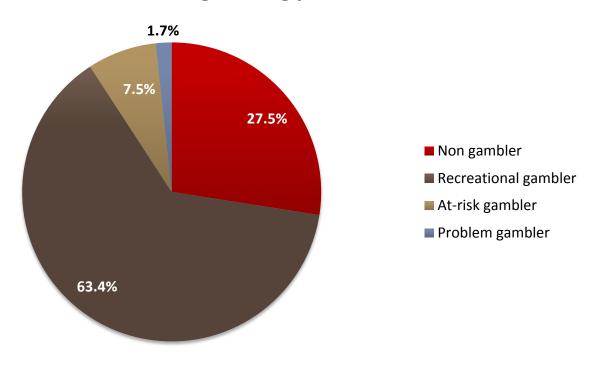

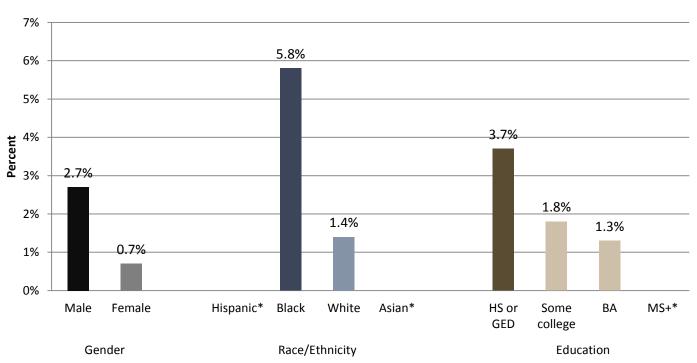

Problem Gambling Status by Gender, Race/Ethnicity, & Education

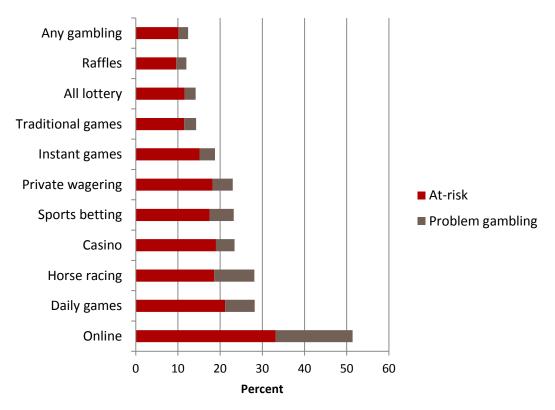
Problem gambling by gender, race/ethnicity and education

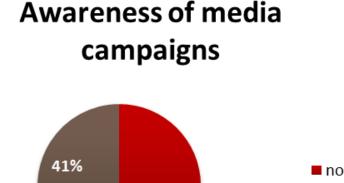

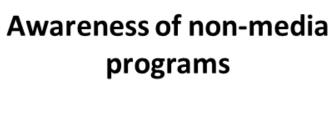

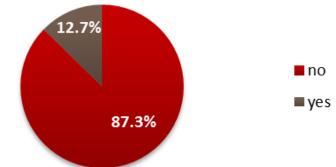


Awareness of Media Campaigns & Programs



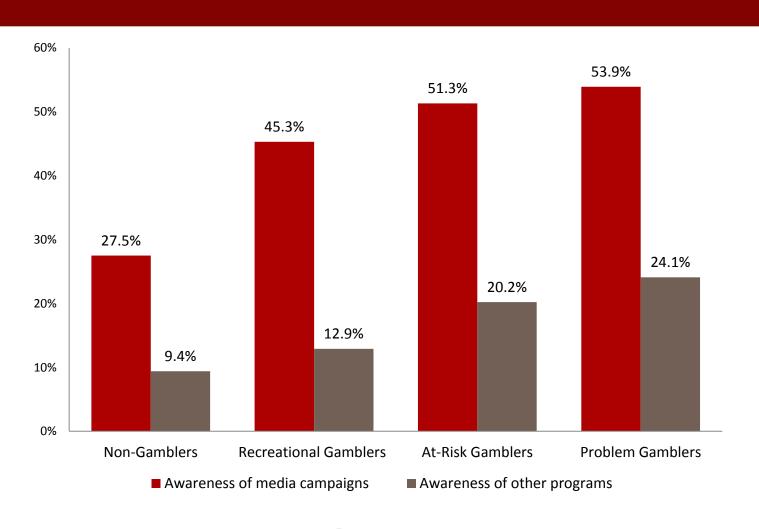

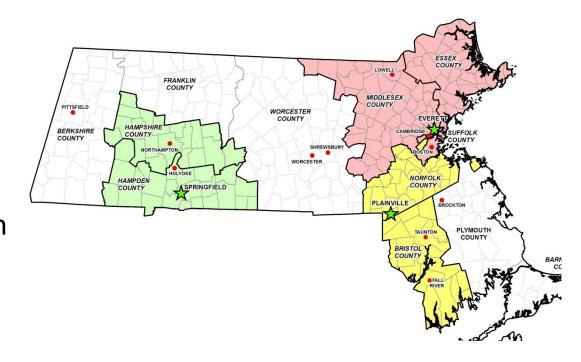

REMI MODELING



Role of REMI Modeling

- Measures the regional and state impacts of the construction and operation of casinos
- Captures direct impacts from applications and primary data collection
- Calculates the ripple effects of the direct impacts on six substate areas and the Commonwealth





Primary Data Collection for REMI Model

- Construction data obtained for Plainville
- New employee questionnaires developed and implemented by MGC
- Operator data being collected for employees, payroll, vendor spending
- Patron / visitor survey being developed

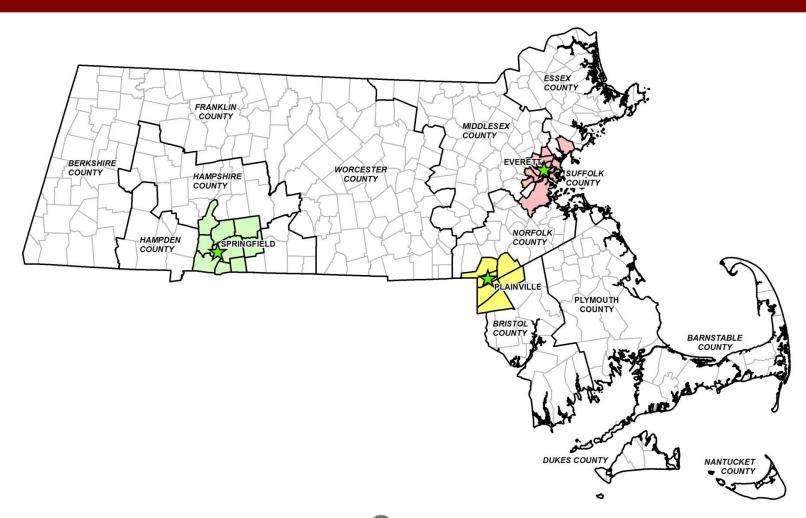

HOST COMMUNITY PROFILES



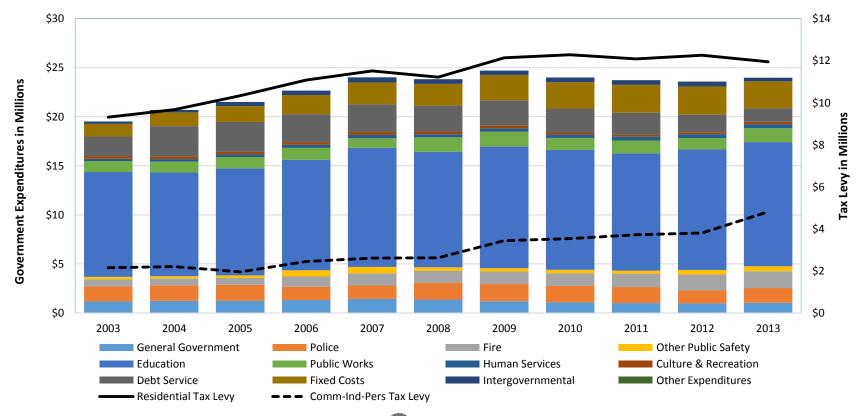

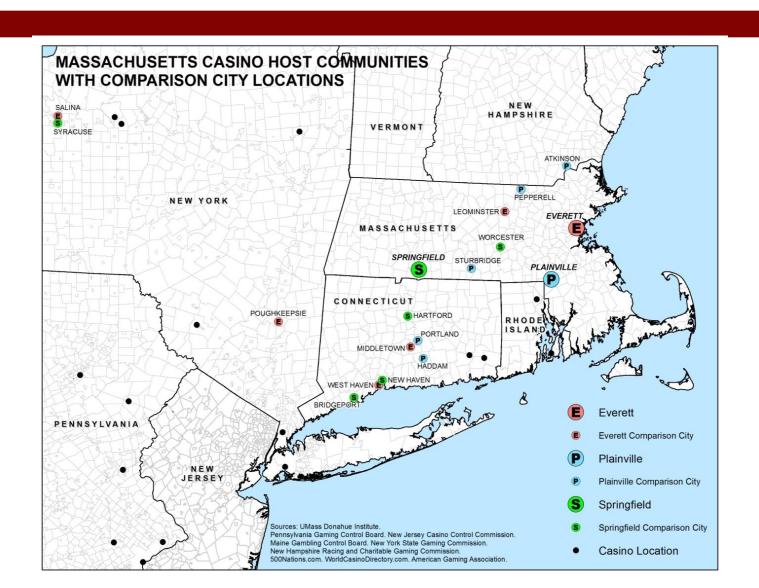


How this Approach Works

- Choose a community or set of communities that are economically and demographically similar but do not have a casino and are not influenced by the casino
- Set criteria for matching
 - In New England, New York, or New Jersey
 - Not within 25 miles of existing casino
 - Similar population size
 - Similar per capita income
- Select the 5 best matches
- Compared with casino community to improve estimation of economic impacts

- Few studies of lottery data exist

Dear New Bedford Voter:

The New Bedford City Council has called for a special election to be held on **Tuesday**, **June 23**, **2015** on whether to permit the operation of a gaming establishment if licensed by the Massachusetts Gaming Commission (the "Commission") to be located on approximately 43 acres of land located off of MacArthur Drive, which land includes the former Cannon Street power station. I write this letter as a notice to registered voters pursuant to 205 CMR 115.05(6)(a).

The City of New Bedford (the "City") and KG New Bedford, LLC ("KG"), an applicant for a license to operate a category 1 gaming establishment in the City, executed a Host Community Agreement (the "Agreement") on March 19, 2015. A summary of the Agreement is enclosed for your reference and the complete text of the Agreement is available in the City Clerk's Office and on the City's website at: http://www.newbedford-ma.gov/

On June 23, 2015 the polls will be open from 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM at the normal polling locations, which are listed on the Election Commission's website at http://www.newbedford-ma.gov/election-commission/voter-info/polling-locations/. If you have questions about your voter status, please call the Election Commission at (508) 979-1420. Absentee ballots may be requested by qualified voters until 12:00 PM on June 22.

Massachusetts General Law c. 23K authorizes the Commission to develop and manage the process to select, license, oversee, and regulate all expanding gaming facilities in the Commonwealth. Under this law, KG must demonstrate compliance with the suitability requirements imposed by state law as implemented and administered by the Commission and KG must obtain a positive determination of suitability from the Commission.

The Commission's application process for awarding a category 1 license has two phases. **Phase**1 of the application process includes investigations conducted by the Commission and its Investigations and Enforcement Bureau including members of the Massachusetts State Police to determine the applicants' suitability and will not be completed until after the election. As part of the background checks, in compliance with the requirements of c.23K, the Commission reviews such things as the integrity, honesty, good character and reputation of the applicant; the financial stability, integrity and background of the applicant; the business practices and the business ability of the applicant to establish and maintain a successful gaming establishment; and whether the applicant has a history of compliance with gaming licensing requirements in other jurisdictions. Phase 2 of the application process involves the Commission's review of the details of the development itself, its location, design and amenities, how it will operate, and how the applicant will mitigate the impact in the host community.

In accordance with regulations issued by the Gaming Commission, 205 CMR 115.05(6)(a), I write to inform you that the City's June 23, 2015 special election will be held subject to the Commission's issuance of a positive determination of suitability to KG; that the Commission will make its determination of suitability after completing a thorough background investigation of KG, its principal operating officers, gaming partner and investors; and that the Commission will not permit KG, its principal operating officers, gaming partner and investors to proceed with the application for a gaming

license unless it determines that they are suitable to operate a gaming facility in Massachusetts. The Commission has approved this notice.

The IEB has found that in each case that the license is reasonably likely to be issued upon completion of the investigation.

Pursuant to 205 CMR 136.03(3), the Division of Licensing is forwarding to the Commission the attached application for a Gaming Beverage License from Plainville Gaming and Redevelopment, LLC, with the recommendation that it be approved, pending resolution of the following issues:

- Insurance: Plainville Gaming and Redevelopment, LLC has submitted a request for variance from the Commission for 205 CMR 136.07. While the insurance policy Plainville Gaming and Redevelopment, LLC provided in their application exceeds the minimum amounts noted in the regulation, it does not meet the requirement of having "no annual aggregate limit". Upon review, the Division of Licensing believes that the excess (umbrella) coverage (well in excess of \$100 million) demonstrated in both the Certificate of Liability Insurance, as well as the Additional Remarks Schedule provide evidence that Plainville Gaming and Redevelopment, LLC would be adequately insured for any case that should occur.
- Smoking Porch: Plainville Gaming and Redevelopment, LLC is proposing the inclusion of a smoking porch, located outside the facility, but still to be considered as part of the Gaming Establishment. Plainville Gaming and Redevelopment, LLC is requesting that the Commission allow both smoking and alcohol consumption on the smoking porch. Plainville Gaming and Redevelopment, LLC has included a memo in their application stating their opinion on the matter, however, in the opinion of the Division of Licensing it is still an open question as to whether smoking and alcohol consumption can both be allowed, or if by virtue of being part of the Gaming Establishment smoking is precluded in that area.
- Follow-up Site Visit: Plainville Gaming and Redevelopment, LLC's application contains details that were agreed to as part of the process outlined in 205 CMR 136.03(2). Some of these details include promises that certain physical features be included in the Gaming Establishment to provide adequate assurance that the interests of the integrity of gaming and/or public health, welfare or safety are met. Specifically, Plainville Gaming and Redevelopment, LLC has assured the Division of Licensing: that signs will be posted in specific unattended areas; that an attendant station will be placed near the racing entrance/exit; and that a permanent fence will be placed at the end of the racing apron to delineate the licensed from the unlicensed area. The

Division of Licensing recommends that the Commission or its designee inspect these promised features prior to the issuance of the Gaming Beverage License.

The previous issues notwithstanding, The Division of Licensing has deemed the application complete, and has determined that it contains the necessary elements required in 205 CMR 136.04. Further, this determination is the result of Plainville Gaming and Redevelopment, LLC satisfactorily addressing the Division of Licensing's requests for clarifications and additional information in accordance with 205 CMR 136.03(2). This process included collaboration with the applicant including but not limited to site visits to determine that the application served the interests of the integrity of gaming, as well as public health, welfare and safety.

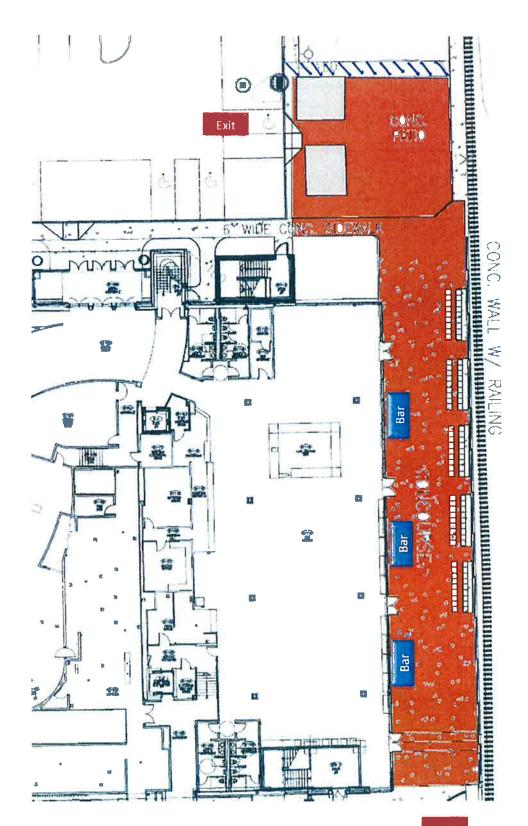

Blue are unlicensed areas / Yellow is the licensed area / Red is the smoking porch where they can consume alcohol.

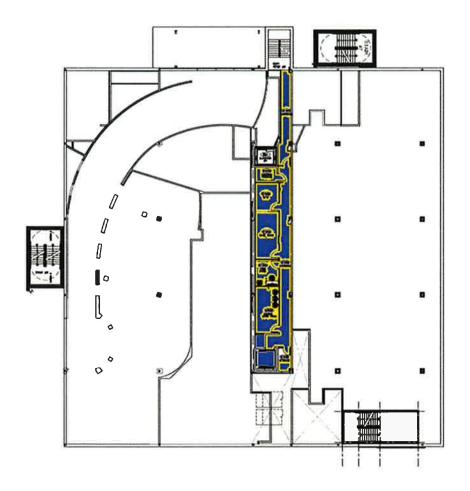




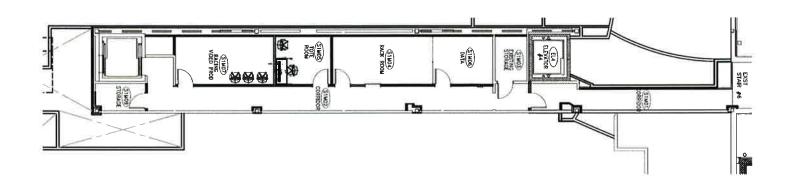


Back of House No Alcohol Areas Racing Building

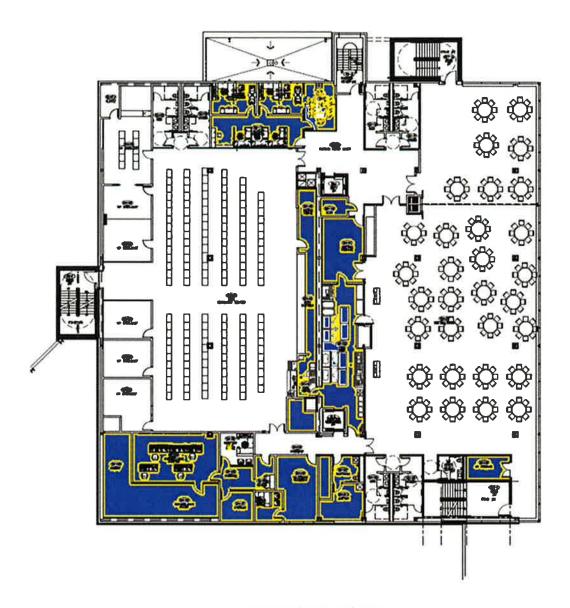

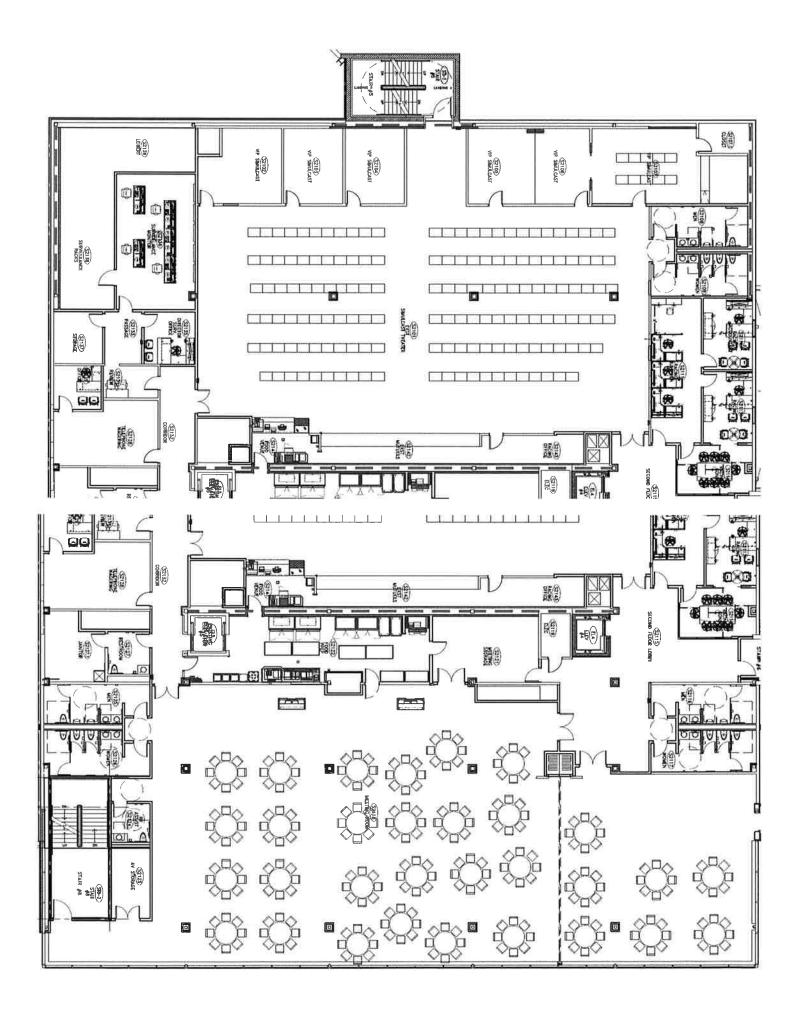
PROPOSED INEST LEVEL INEZZANDIE FLOOR PLAN



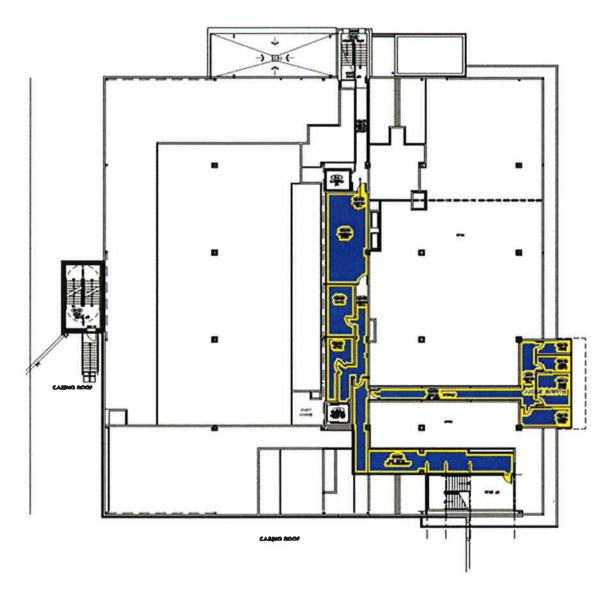

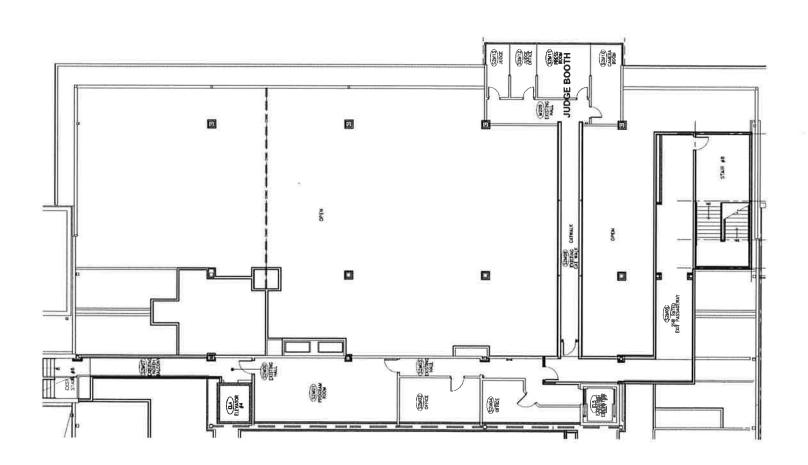
PROPOSED SECOND LEVEL FLOOR PLAN

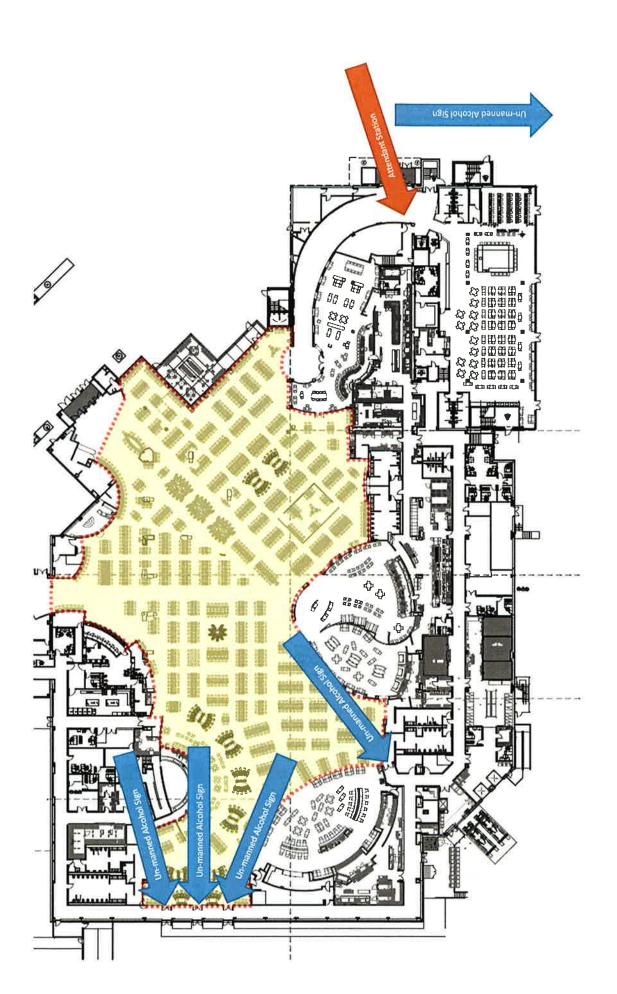

Plainridge Park Casino Smoking Porch and Alcohol Consumption

G.L. ch. 23K §9(8)(i) provides that the gaming commission shall require "...that the applicant shall mitigate the potential negative public health consequences associated with gambling and the operation of a gaming establishment, including: (i) maintaining a smoke-free environment within the gaming establishment under section 22 of chapter 270..."

The only reference to a "smoke free environment... under section 22 of chapter 270..." is found at G.L. ch. 270 § 22(b)(1), which provides that "[i]t shall be the responsibility of the employer to provide a **smoke free environment** for all employees working in an enclosed workplace."

While the legislature could have simply required that the applicant agree to "maintain[] a smoke free environment within the gaming establishment," without further specific citation, the legislature specifically made reference to a smoke free environment as required *under G.L. ch. 270, s. 22*.

Therefore, it is reasonable to interpret 23K $\S9(8)(i)$ as referring only to the "smoke free environment" under $\S22(b)(1)$, i.e. a smoke free environment for employees working in an enclosed workplace.

As the smoking deck is an unenclosed outdoor space, the smoking deck is clearly not an "enclosed workspace" as defined under §22(a), therefore, it is not the responsibility of the employer to provide a **smoke free environment** in that area.

Accordingly, the two statutes reasonably read together do not prohibit smoking on the smoking deck in the gaming establishment.

And if smoking is not prohibited in an area of the gaming establishment, and alcohol consumption is allowed in "any part of...the gaming establishment, subject to any restrictions or conditions...(emphasis added)" per 205 CMR 106.02(1), then smoking and alcohol consumption are both allowed on the smoking porch.

Pursuant to 205 CMR 102.03(a), Plainville Gaming and Redevelopment, LLC, d.b.a. Plainridge Park Casino ("PPC"), hereby requests a variance from the Massachusetts Gaming Commission ("Commission") for section of 205 CMR 136.077 of the regulations concerning dram shop insurance.

Section 136,077 reads as follows:

Practices and Conditions of License

(1) Insurance. The gaming beverage licensee must at all times maintain liquor liability insurance for bodily injury or death for a minimum amount of \$250,000 on account of injury to or death of 1 person, and \$500,000 on account of any 1 accident resulting in injury to or death of more than 1 person. The policy shall have no aggregate limit.

The insurance coverage for all Penn National properties is provided under Penn's overall insurance policy. Our primary policy limits are well in excess of the required 136.077 limits of \$250,000 on account of injury to or death of 1 person and \$500,000 on account of any 1 accident, as our primary policy limit is \$2 million per occurrence with no per person limit. The primary policy does however, have an aggregate limit of \$4 million which is in conflict with the last sentence of 136.077 which indicates that the "policy shall have no aggregate limit."

We note that in addition to the primary policy limits mentioned above, PPC is also covered by an excess liability tower of insurance with limits in amounts well in excess of \$100 Million (each occurrence and in aggregate). This excess (umbrella) coverage would be triggered should the annual primary coverage limits ever be exhausted.

We believe the higher limits of the primary insurance coverage combined with the excess umbrella coverage vastly exceed the minimum coverage contemplated by 136.077 and should provide adequate comfort to the Commission and the Commonwealth that the property is adequately insured for any dram shop case that may occur. Requiring PPC to establish a separate policy with no aggregate limits might not be commercially available at reasonable cost

and would not provide any significant additional coverage that would be excess of the existing umbrella policy.

We would appreciate your expedited review of this variance request, as we must provide evidence of our insurance coverage in order to receive our liquor licenses. We believe granting this variance is in the best interest of PPC, the Commission, and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Summary:

The Massachusetts Gaming Commission's (MGC) initial Fiscal Year 2016 (FY16) budget projections include \$28.3M for gaming operations including funding for 70.48 FTEs, 1 contract position and 3 interns, \$1.57M for racing operations including funding for 5 FTEs and one contract position and an additional \$1.7M of racing payments to licensees for a total agency budget of \$31.58M (75.48 FTEs, 2 contractors and 3 interns). A complete list of the MGC's spending and revenue by appropriation is attached to this document (Attachment A). The MGC, under 205 CMR 121.00 will assess licensees the difference between its budget and anticipated revenues in FY16. The MGC's gaming operations costs are projected to be \$28.3M, and revenues are anticipated to equal ~\$6.1M, which would leave an assessment of \$22.2M to be divided up among the licensees.

The Racing Division's budget is funded through a portion of wagering as stipulated in statue. While the landscape of racing in Massachusetts is not stable, the Division's budget was built using prior year revenue projections deflated at the average rate of decline experienced from FY13-FY14.

Analyzing FY15 compared to FY16 does not present significant insight as the Commission is still in the "start-up" phase and costs/programmatic expenses from year to year are not consistent. There are still significant one-time costs included in both the FY15 and FY16 spending figures. A brief chart is included in this memorandum showing changes by spending category. A more detailed comparison and analysis of year-over-year will be beneficial once the MGC reaches a steady state. The MGC's budget is presented at the Division/Bureau functional level. The process of each division being assigned a budget, that budget being established in the Commonwealth's accounting system, and expenditures tracked against that budget began in FY15. This same process is being carried into FY16. Some of the more significant anticipated costs of each division/bureau are described later in this memo.

In FY15 the budgets of Pennsylvania and Michigan Gaming Control Boards were compared to the Massachusetts budget to test the reasonableness of MA's budget and to ensure our cost of regulating was not disproportionate to other jurisdictions. While MA did not have a casino open to regulate in FY15, a good case was made that the cost of regulating in MA was not out of line with other jurisdictions.

Licensees requested that we continue to monitor our overall cost of regulating to ensure MA is not an outlier. Monitoring in such a way requires continued review of the intricacies of each law. The MGC budget for oversight of gaming operations is projected at \$28.3M in FY16. Included in that budget is \$1.9M for the State Attorney General's office (reimbursements for these costs are required by statute and the MGC does not have discretion), \$3.2M in State Police related costs (\$475K for the AGO's state police detail), \$4.6M in Responsible Gaming related expenditures, which will be funded from the Public Health Trust Fund in subsequent years, as well as ~\$1M in anticipated Region C one-time costs. If you reduce the Commission's budget by those items, the internal costs of MGC are closer to \$17.6M from \$28.3M. Below is a simple analysis on three additional gaming jurisdictions (Maryland, Ohio, Colorado), including a short summary of the peculiar pieces of each jurisdiction's legislation. We intend to provide a chart that compares the 5 jurisdictions with MGC at the June 25th meeting.

Colorado:

This jurisdiction has a \$100 bet maximum, and has 36 venues. Most venues are relatively small in number of gaming devices and the tax structure is built to accommodate the difference in size. In total, Colorado receives \$101.7M in tax revenue from 36 venues. In addition, the funding for the Commission's budget comes from that \$101.7M.

Ohio:

There are four venues in Ohio. The Gaming Control Board and Lottery split responsibilities. The Gaming Control Board oversees Casinos with the combination of live table games and video lottery terminals/electronic gaming devices. The Lottery oversees Racing establishments with video lottery terminals. Gross Gaming Revenue tax is 33%. Administration expenses are capped at 1% of GGR and any license fees generated.

FY16 Budget Structure:

In FY16, the MGC will continue allocating funds to each division/bureau and tracking contractual commitments, expenditures and salaries against each division/bureau budget. The Commission will be using the expense budget feature in the Massachusetts Management and Accounting Reporting System (MMARS) to establish these budgets and automate the process of keeping track of budget to actual expenditures and commitments.

The MGC's Office of Finance met with each division/bureau head within the MGC and developed spending and revenue projections that are realistic representations of what will be needed in FY16 to operate the Commission, as well as what can be expected for revenue based on the Commission's current fee structures. These requests were then reviewed by the CFAO, the Executive Director, and the Treasurer of the Commission. A third review was conducted by representatives of the current gaming licensees (Penn, Wynn and MGM) at a meeting on May 18, 2015 at MGC offices. The meeting was productive and included a comprehensive review of the Commission's budget at a line item level, as well as a review of each division's staffing levels by employee and anticipated hire. As a result of that meeting, the budget was reduced by \$1.075M. The most significant reduction was \$717K cut to Oversight Project Management ("OPM") anticipated costs.

Each appropriation (eight digit number assigned in the accounting system that expenditures are tracked against and to which revenue is assigned) will have expense budgets set up so that the MGC can verify at any point that the approved spending levels will not exceed the approved budget. Below is a summary of each division/bureau proposed budget. Immediately following the table are highlights of significant spending in each division/bureau. Attachment B to this document provides an object class, object code and then specific budget item view of each division/bureau budget. For purposes of utilizing the state accounting system, budgets will be loaded at the object class level.

This item funds the operations of the Racing division. The majority of funding from this appropriation is payroll related at ~\$623K. In addition, the racing division spends between \$310K on seasonal salaries during the live racing season. Other costs of the division are drug and laboratory testing \$200K, purchased client services for economic hardship payments, eighth pole payments, and the jockey guild \$165K.

Racing Capital Improvement and Promotional Trust Funds

The racing division has historically spent ~\$650K annually from the harness horse and racing horse capital improvement trust funds. Revenue for these funds are generated through a portion of the total amount wagered at each track. Projects approved from these funds must be approved by the Commission. Payments are made as funds become available in the trust funds.

10500140 Payments to Cities and Towns for Local Share of Racing Tax Revenue

This item is a state appropriated item for expenses which the MGC must reimburse the general fund. Funds from this item go directly to race tracks and represent a percentage of pari-mutuel taxes.

Assessment on Licensees:

Chapter 23K §56 (a)-(c) define how the MGC will fund its annual costs related to Gaming/non-racing activities. This chapter was further defined through 205 CMR 121.00. By taking the projected spending less the net revenues projected for FY16, the commission will utilize 205 CMR 121.01 3(c) to assess ~\$22.2M on licensees as shown in the chart below:

Conclusion:

Staff is proposing an FY16 MGC budget of \$28.3M for gaming operations and \$1.57M for racing operations and an additional \$1.7M of racing payments to licensees for a total agency budget of \$31.58M. Staff seeks the Commission's guidance on further spending recommendations or seeking additional comment. If this version is approved, the MGC will assess \$22.2M on the slot and casino licensees in FY16.

For FY16 the following recommendation is made regarding payment of the assessment:

• The Commission should bill the assessment in quarterly installments with 25% of the assessment billed on 7/1/2015, 25% billed on 9/1/2015, 25% billed on 12/1/2015, and the final 25% billed on 3/1/2016

MEMORANDUM

TO: Massachusetts Gaming Commission

RE: Location of Gaming Establishment at Plainridge Park Casino

DATE: June 11, 2015

I. Introduction

As part of the award of each gaming license, the Massachusetts Gaming Commission ("Commission") must determine what the premises of the gaming establishment are. That is, it must determine which premises will be subject to regulatory oversight by the Commission. In the case of Plainridge Park Casino ("PPC") the Commission made that determination when it awarded the Category 2 gaming license to Springfield Gaming and Redevelopment LLC (now Plainridge Gaming and Redevelopment LLC) by written determination dated February 28, 2014. See relevant provision attached as Exhibit A. Therein the Commission determined that "[t]he gaming establishment is defined as: the site plan as proved by Springfield Gaming and Redevelopment LLC as part of its RFA 2 application as attachment 4-79-02" See Exhibit A; a copy of attachment 4-79-02 is attached Exhibit B. With the impending commencement of operations at PPC, this gaming establishment determination should be revisited to ensure that its boundaries are precisely drawn in light of the effects discussed below.

II. Law and Analysis

The Commission's determination in this regard is required by G.L. c 23K, §2 which defines the "gaming establishment" as: "the premises approved under a gaming license which includes a gaming area and any other nongaming structure related to the gaming area and may include, but shall not be limited to, hotels, restaurants or other amenities." The term "gaming area" is defined by G.L. c. 23K, § 2 as "the portion of the premises of the gaming establishment in which or on which gaming is conducted." Under G.L. c. 23K, §10(a), hotels in Category 1 gaming establishments are necessarily part of the gaming establishment. Beyond that, though, by use of the term "may" in the definition of 'gaming establishment,' it is clear that the Legislature intended to provide the Commission great latitude in determining the components of the gaming establishment. The latitude was designed so that the Commission is able to include any element within the gaming establishment that it deems necessary to ensure proper regulation of the gaming licensee. Further, there are a number of effects that flow from the inclusion or exclusion of an area from the gaming establishment including the triggering of a licensure/registration requirement for employees working in the area, inclusion as a 'licensed area' in the

¹ G.L. c.23K, §10(a) states in pertinent part: "a gaming licensee shall make a capital investment of not less than \$500,000,000 into the gaming establishment which shall include, but not be limited to, a gaming area, <u>at least 1 hotel</u> and other amenities as proposed in the application for a category 1 license." (Emphasis added).



gaming beverage license awarded to the gaming licensee, and restrictions on the placement and/or functionality of ATMs.

By definition, the gaming area itself must be included in the gaming establishment. When it comes to other areas, though, a holistic review of G.L. c.23K, with specific focus on the definitions of "gaming area," "gaming establishment" contained in G.L. c.23K, §2, indicates that in making the determination as to what areas should be included or excluded from the gaming establishment the Commission should engage in a four part analysis. That is, whether the area: (1) is a non-gaming structure, (2) is related to the gaming area, (3) is under common ownership and control of the gaming applicant, and (4) the Commission has a regulatory interest in including it as part of the gaming establishment. Part 4 only comes into play though, where the first three parts are satisfied. The control element of part 3 is implicit in the statute's licensing and registration requirement, see G.L. c. 23K, §§30 through 32, the requirement for the licensee to own or control all land on which the gaming establishment is located, G.L. c. 23K, §15(3), and the statute's general structure which places control by the licensee at the heart of the Commission's regulatory authority. The statute offers some guidance as to what the Legislature envisioned being included as part of the gaming establishment by providing that the term may include things like "hotels, restaurants or other amenities...."

A. Entrance, internal roadways, and surface parking lots

As it presently stands, areas including the entrance, internal roadways, the racetrack, pari-mutuel and simulcasting related areas, and surface parking lots are all included in the PPC gaming establishment. See Exhibit B. The Commission should consider redrawing the boundaries of the gaming establishment to exclude them for the following reasons. It is clear that the gaming area, Game Sense area, retail areas, restaurants/food and beverage/lounge areas, back of the house, parking garage, porte-cochere, physical plant/facilities maintenance, and all public areas related to those spaces meet the 4 part test and accordingly should be included as part of the gaming establishment. They are all non-gaming structures that are related to the gaming area in that they are included to support the gaming area by making the entire facility a more attractive destination. They are all under the ownership and control of the gaming licensee. Finally, the Commission may consider them to be amenities to the gaming area because it has an interest in, amongst other things, ensuring that all employees working in those areas are licensed or registered in accordance with 205 CMR 134.00, having knowledge of the flow of money through these areas, and ensuring proper surveillance and/or security. Such control helps ensure the integrity of gaming in the Commonwealth through strict oversight.

Conversely, the entrance, internal roadways, and surface parking lots do not satisfy the elements of the analysis to be considered part of the gaming establishment. By inclusion of hotels and restaurants as examples of non-gaming structures related to the gaming area in the definition of gaming establishment in G.L. c.23K, §2, the Legislature suggested that the term 'structure' be applied in its traditional sense. Indeed, the Commission has previously adopted that position. In the case of PPC, the entrance, internal roadways, and surface parking lots are not structures in the traditional sense; accordingly, they would not meet part 1 of the analysis and as such should not be included as part of the gaming establishment. Further, the Commission does not have any regulatory interest in overseeing those areas. They are all



subject to patrol and oversight by local police and other authorities and possess not characteristics that would warrant regulations with the Commission's special expertise. Accordingly, there is no benefit to including those areas within the gaming establishment.

B. Racing areas

The racetrack and pari-mutuel and simulcasting related areas meet the first three elements of the analysis so could be considered to be part of the gaming establishment if they meet the fourth element. It is the application of the fourth element that provides the Commission with the discretion to determine whether those areas, the racing areas, should be included in the gaming establishment. In making that determination, the Commission should take the following factors, among others, into consideration.

- All of the racing areas are subject to oversight and licensing by the Commission under a separate body of statutes and regulations than those that govern gaming. Though the racing and gaming operations fall under common ownership and management, they are distinct operations from a regulatory perspective.
- Certain employees of the racing operation must be licensed by the Commission under a separate body of statutes and regulations. If the racing areas are included as part of the gaming establishment, all of those individuals would also have to be licensed or registered in accordance with 205 CMR 134.00 thus requiring them to go through two licensing processes for a single job.
- Similar to the employees, vendors to the racing operation who have historically never been subject to any type of licensure or registration requirement would now be required to do so.
- Police jurisdiction relative to the premises of the gaming establishment has been addressed by way of MOU. However, absent the MOU, if the racing area were excluded from the gaming establishment, that exclusion may affect the jurisdictional parameters of the Gaming Enforcement Unit. See G.L. c.23K, §6(f).
- If the racing area were to be excluded, the racing area would be outside of the scope of the gaming beverage license and leave such regulation subject to the Town of Plainville's alcoholic beverage license, presently in effect, issued in accordance with G.L. c.138. Historically, the Plainville license has provided the regulatory basis for controlling the sale of alcoholic beverages sold at the track.

Ultimately, there are valid considerations supporting conclusions relative to the racing areas in each direction that should be considered. If the Commission were to exclude the racing areas from the gaming establishment though, it would not give up regulatory authority over racing operations. To the contrary, the Commission would continue to serve as regulator of the racing side of the operation and may impose any necessary controls, conditions, or take disciplinary action as it may presently do.

In making a determination as to whether the Commission has a regulatory interest in including any area as part of the gaming establishment it is important to consider the underlying reason specific government oversight is important. That is, the Commission should consider things like why vendor and employee licensure/registration is required, and why alcoholic beverage control restrictions are put in place.



C. Smoking porch

The gaming licensee, Plainridge Gaming and Redevelopment LLC ("PGR"), was required to, and agreed to, maintain "a smoke-free environment within the gaming establishment under section 22 of chapter 270" as a condition of its gaming license. See G.L. c.23K, §9(a)(8). PGR has proposed a smoking porch to be located at PPC. A question has arisen as to whether patrons could be allowed to smoke and consume alcoholic beverages within this area. There are a number of considerations. Alcoholic beverages can only be consumed on the premises of the gaming establishment. See 205 CMR 136.02(1) and 136.03(1).² Accordingly, if the smoking porch is not part of the gaming establishment, alcoholic beverages cannot be consumed in that area. Conversely, depending upon one's read of G.L. c.23K, §9(a)(8) and G.L. c.270, §22, smoking may be prohibited in the gaming establishment which would include the smoking porch. PGR legal counsel will be present at the Commission meeting to offer the licensee's interpretation of the applicable law.

III. Conclusion

I recommend that the Commission exclude the property entrance, all of the external roadways and surface parking areas from the gaming establishment as they do not satisfy the four part analysis. I further recommend that the Commission include the racing buildings in which pari-mutuel and simulcasting wagering is conducted, and which includes event space, so that it may provide for uniform oversight of the service and consumption of alcoholic beverages on the premises under one license. For the time being, the track, the barns, paddock, and other associated racing areas can be excluded of the gaming establishment so as not to interrupt the existing regulatory framework in a piecemeal fashion.

A proposed outline to the amended boundaries of the gaming establishment that excludes the entrance, internal roadways, surface parking lots, the racetrack, the aforementioned racing structures, and includes the racing and function building (Exhibit C) are attached.

² 205 CMR 136.02(1) provides: "No person may sell or distribute alcoholic beverages to be drunk on the premises of a gaming establishment except as allowed by a gaming beverage license. Alcoholic beverages served in a licensed area in accordance with the terms of a gaming beverage license may be consumed in any part of the premises of the gaming establishment subject to any restrictions or conditions placed on the gaming beverage license in the interest of the integrity of gaming and/or public health, welfare, or safety."

²⁰⁵ CMR 136.0(1) provides: "Pursuant to M.G.L. c. 23K, § 26, the commission may grant a gaming beverage license to a gaming licensee for purposes of allowing the sale and distribution of alcoholic beverages within all licensed areas of the gaming establishment as identified and defined in the license subject to 205 CMR 136.00 to be drunk on the premises of the gaming establishment, subject to any restrictions imposed on the license."

<u>DETERMINATION OF ISSUANCE OF A LICENSE TO OPERATE A</u> <u>CATEGORY 2 GAMING ESTABLISHMENT</u>

I. Authority

PPE Casino Resorts MA, LLC, ("PPE"), Springfield Gaming and Redevelopment LLC ("SGR") and Raynham Park LLC ("Raynham") (hereinafter referred to as "Applicant" or jointly as "Applicants") each submitted to the Massachusetts Gaming Commission (hereinafter "Commission" or "MGC") an RFA 2 application for a Category 2 Gaming License to operate a Gaming Establishment. The Commission has the authority to issue a single Category 2 Gaming License ("License") pursuant to M.G.L. c.23K §20.

II. Background

On or before January 15, 2013, the Commission received an RFA-1 application from each Applicant. Each Applicant then underwent a thorough investigation by the Investigation and Enforcement Bureau ("IEB"). Pursuant to 205 CMR 101.01, a public meeting or an adjudicatory hearing was held before the full Commission at the conclusion of the investigation to determine the suitability of each Applicant. See 205 CMR 115.04. The Commission held a public meeting to determine the suitability of PPE on July 11, 2013; the Commission held an adjudicatory proceeding to determine the suitability of Raynham on July 26, 2013; and the Commission held an adjudicatory proceeding to determine the suitability of SGR on September 18 and 19, 2013. The Commission issued a **POSITIVE** determination of suitability for each Applicant, deeming



provided funding to startup companies in the medical device industry and could potentially create 5000 jobs over the next twenty (20) years. SGR offered the ability to continue harness racing in the Commonwealth, with the potential to save over 1000 currently existing jobs across several industries in the Commonwealth. Based on the preservation of current jobs, SGR excelled in the Economic Development category.

In the Building and Site design category, both applicants presented plans that included gaming, dining and entertainment facilities. PPE presented a more robust entertainment plan at the gaming establishment. SGR had the ability to offer harness racing as an additional amenity. PPE's building and site design included the highest quality amenities and its plan was supported by more detail. For that reason, PPE excelled in the Building and Site Design category.

Both applicants provided a basic plan to address the criteria in the Mitigation category. Each applicant agreed to address traffic issues as required; each applicant entered into an agreement with the MA State Lottery. SGR's plan to address problem gaming issues met and exceeded the American Gaming Association's reasonable code of conduct. For that reason, SGR excelled in the Mitigation category.

In the end, the Commission valued more highly the categories in which SGR excelled, namely Finance and Economic Development and for that reason, awards the license for a category 2 gaming establishment to SGR.

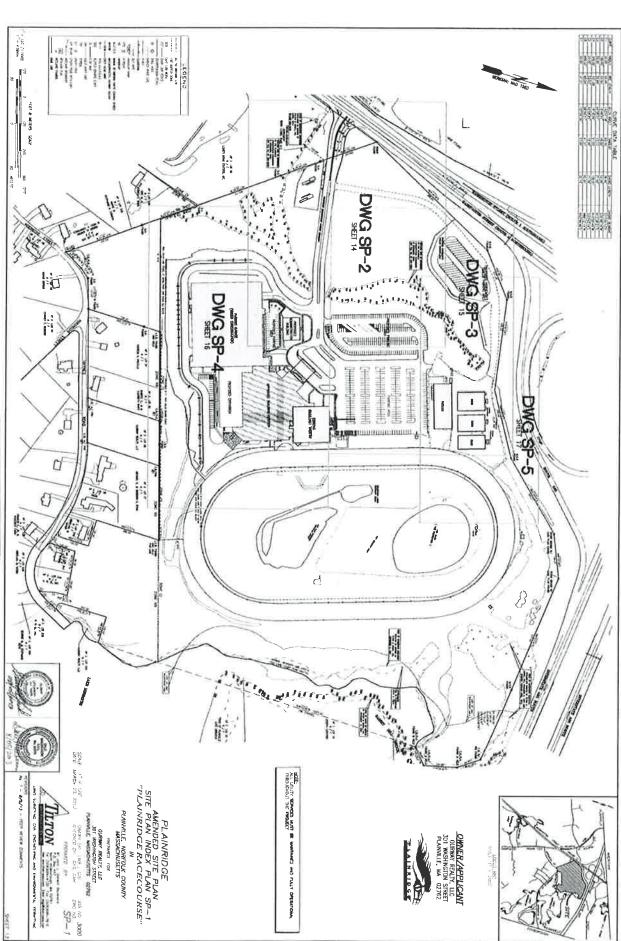
V. Award

The Commission was fortunate that it had before it three (3) capable and competent applicants each of whom presented detailed and thoughtful proposals for the introduction and operation of a Category 2 gaming establishment in the Commonwealth. Upon reviewing all of the requirements of c.23K, the regulations under 205 CMR 101 et seq. and weighing the Applicants' RFA 1 and RFA 2 applications and information and comments submitted by the public in a comparative manner, the Commission has determined that the Category 2 gaming establishment license is **GRANTED** to Springfield Gaming and Redevelopment LLC. As such, the applications for a Category 2 license submitted by PPE Casino Resorts MA, LLC and Raynham Park LLC are hereby **DENIED**.

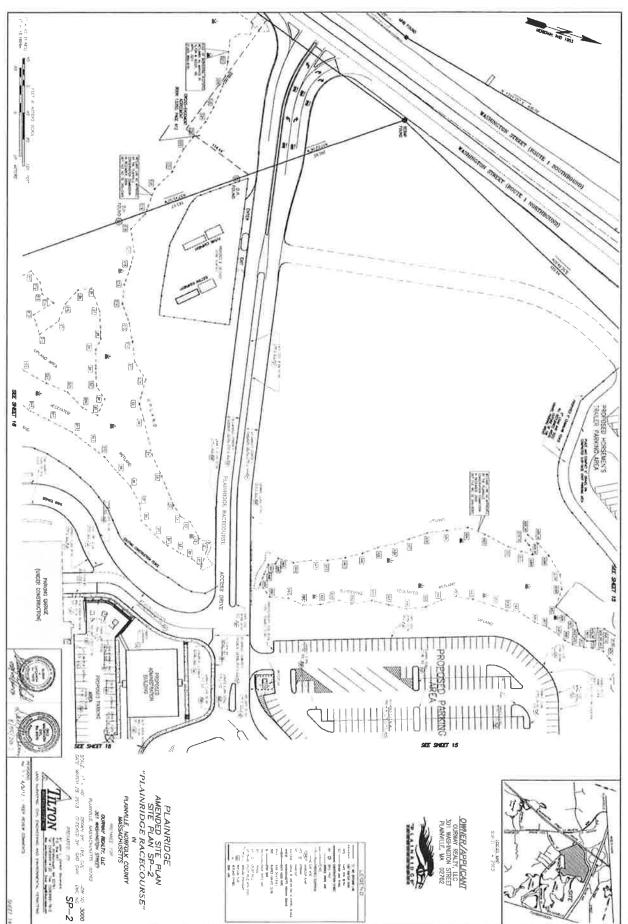

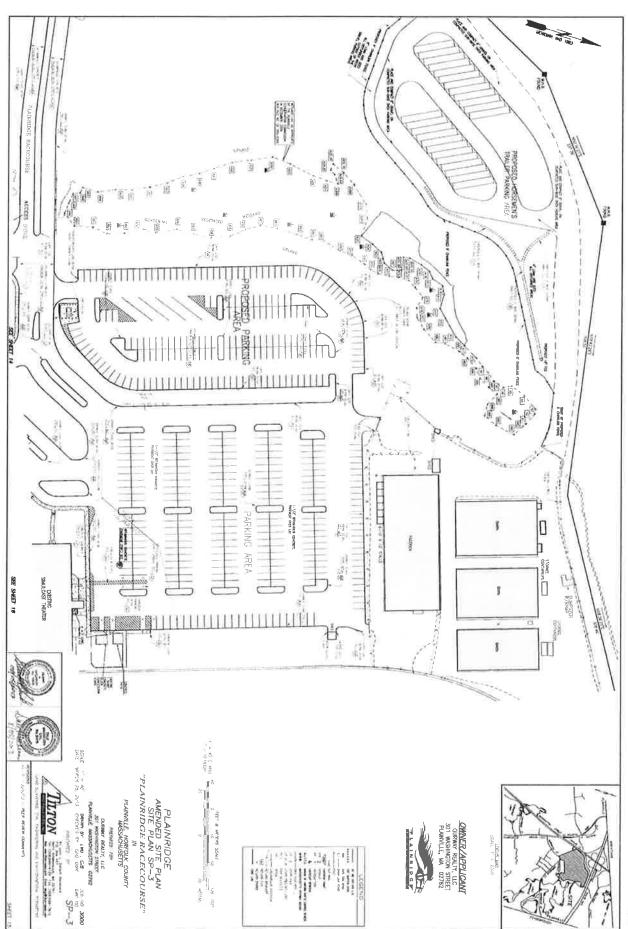
The term of the license awarded to SGR commences upon the Commission's approval of commencement of the operation of the gaming establishment and continues for a period of 5 years thereafter.

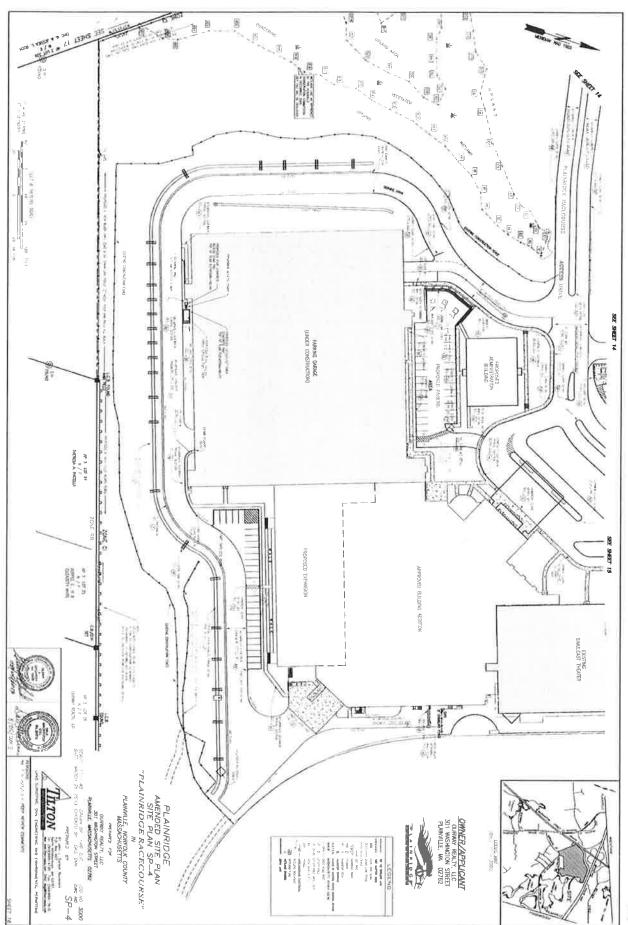


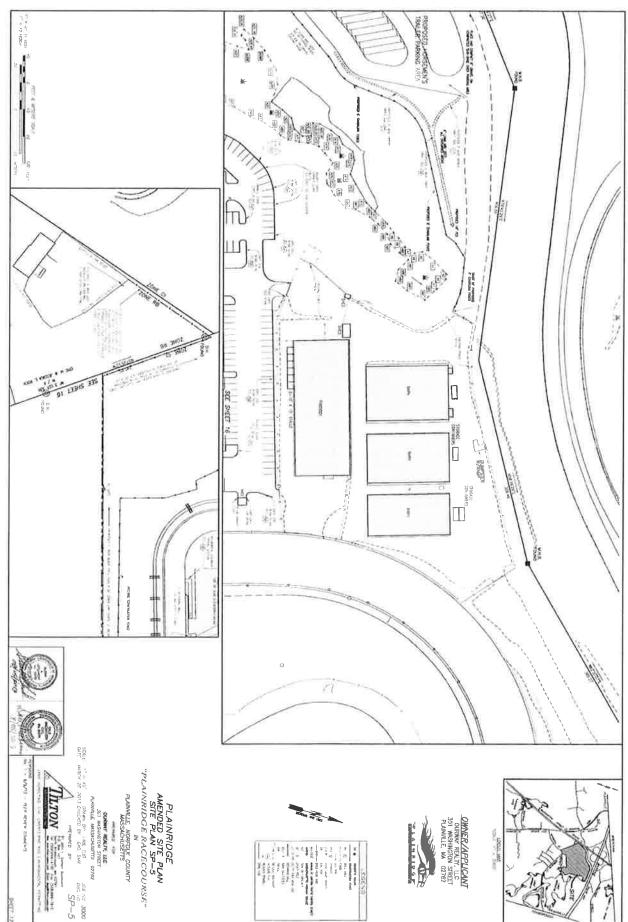

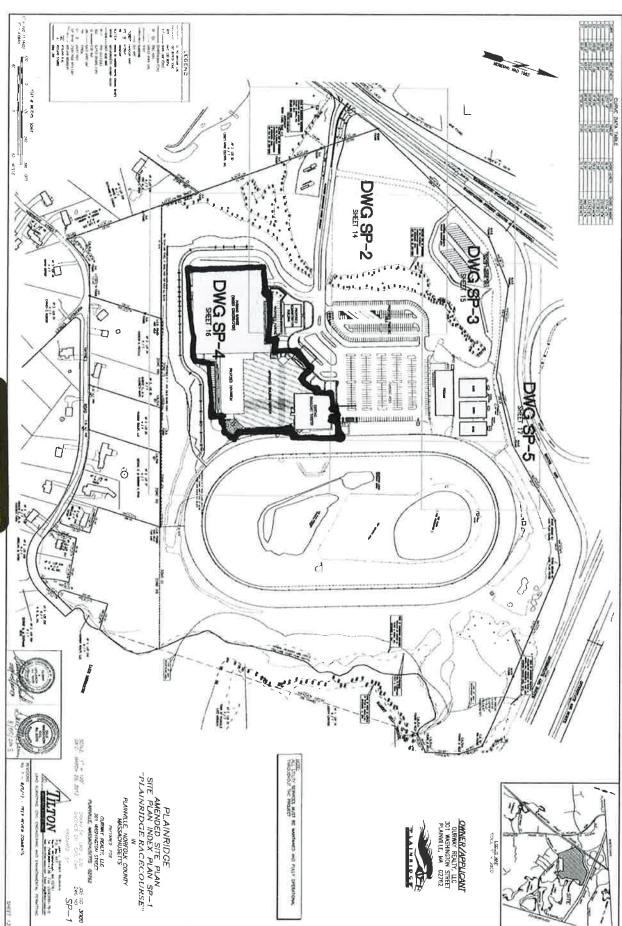

Dear Dr. Lightbown:

As you know, Sterling Suffolk Racecourse, LLC ("Suffolk Downs") has a request pending before the Massachusetts Gaming Commission (the "Commission") for authorization of three live racing dates for 2015 and an accompanying request for a disbursement of \$1.75 million from the Race Horse Development Fund. We understand the Commission is interested in hearing further about our plans and expectations for this three-day racing meeting, and I write to provide some additional information. I will, of course, also be attending the public hearing on the request on Thursday, June 11, and look forward to discussing our plans with the Commission at that time.

After our tenant Mohegan Sun Massachusetts was denied the Region A gaming license, Suffolk Downs faced a complete shutdown at the end of 2014 with the anticipated expiration of its 2014 racing license. The Legislature, however, extended our ability to operate, and to maintain the jobs of our direct and indirect employees, by extending the 2014 racing license into 2015 and authorizing Suffolk Downs to continue to simulcast and accept wagers on races run elsewhere. We are currently operating under the authority of Chapter 10 of the Acts of 2015, which extends the 2014 racing license and our simulcasting authorization through July 31, 2016, on the condition that there be a minimum of *one* day of live racing at Suffolk Downs in each calendar year this year and next.

Suffolk Downs is applying for *three* days of racing in conjunction and by agreement with our horsemen, represented by the New England Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association (the "NEHBPA"), Massachusetts thoroughbred breeders, represented by the Massachusetts Thoroughbred Breeders Association (the "MTBA"), and the New England Horsemen's Agricultural and Racing Cooperative ("NEHARC").

We have applied for three days in 2015—one per month in July, August and September—to achieve three primary objectives: first, to comply with the Chapter 10 of the Acts of 2015 and thereby ensure the continued employment of our direct and indirect employees; second, to help the NEHBPA continue its business operations as it pursues its longer-term goal of finding, acquiring and building its own racing facility; and third, to provide a venue for the MTBA and its members to stage races and earn purse money

for Massachusetts-bred horses foaled and trained in the Commonwealth over the last several years.

The legislative extension of our simulcasting authorization has already enabled us to preserve almost 100 year-round jobs related to our facility. The requested three days of live racing, while limited, will allow us to protect additional jobs in the Commonwealth related to racing and breeding while the NEHBPA continues its long term planning.

To conduct the meet, we are contracting with NEHARC to manage live racing operations. In conjunction with NEHARC, we hope to attract a mix of owners, trainers, jockeys and horses that have supported our racing program for the last several years. Many of these people are now stabled in other jurisdictions due to our announcement last year, when the Region A license was awarded to Wynn Everett, that we would cease live racing operations. In anticipation of racing at Suffolk Downs this summer, NEHARC is actively recruiting stables and horses from the mid-Atlantic, New Jersey and New York.

This would underiably be a markedly different meet from those we have run in the past. Balancing out the limited number of racing days would be a much richer purse structure, funded from the Race Horse Development Fund. Whereas for the last several years we paid about \$100,000 per day in purses, our plan for the 2015 races, fully supported by the NEHBPA and NEHARC, is to offer approximately \$500,000 per day in purses, including MTBA funding. We believe that purses in this amount, which is competitive with top-tier east coast venues, will enhance our ability to attract horses for these three days of racing.

The Commission may be interested in knowing that we considered having three or four consecutive days of live racing, rather than one per month. Such a schedule would reduce operating costs and may make it easier to recruit horses. However, we settled on the one-day-per-month approach during our extensive consultations with the NEHBPA and the MTBA prior to making the request. One of our primary considerations in doing so is to structure the meet so as to provide the maximum potential benefit to the MTBA and its members. Thoroughbreds need considerable time off between races, and spacing the racing days out at roughly one-month intervals gives owners of Massachusetts-bred horses multiple opportunities to start them in races.

I look forward to seeing you and the Commissioners on Thursday. If I can provide any further information between now and then, please do not hesitate to ask.

Dear Commissioners:

I am writing, independently and as a neighbor of Suffolk Downs, to directly question whether horse racing is still the best and highest use for the Suffolk Downs site. While I am sympathetic to the few hundred workers who are being impacted by the slow demise of horse racing nationwide, extending further life support to the operation at Suffolk Downs delays the inevitable, I'm afraid, and wastes precious resources that could be utilized to fund a comprehensive study of the effects of casino gambling in the Commonwealth. The community has not supported the track with its entertainment dollar for more than a decade, indicating that while the track holds nostalgic value for some, it is no longer the economic driver it once was. What is needed on that site -- a space twice the size of the North End, on two rail lines and abutting the precious Belle Isle Marsh -- is a vision that brings residents of Revere, East Boston, and beyond back to shop, work, live, and play in healthy ways. The site is needed both for job creation and housing needs in Boston, whose mayor has called for tens of thousands of new affordable units to be built in the coming decades. Whatever is put in that magnificent space, it must meet community approval in the neighborhoods that surround it, which have, in East Boston's case, called for a higher use than a gambling center. (like many of my neighbors, I endorse the development vision of EastBoston2020 for the Suffolk Downs site)

The proponents of a Suffolk Downs casino were right about one thing: East Boston and Revere have been waiting for a development on that parcel that will create jobs and drive the local economy. A casino was not the answer, but looking past casinos and horse racing, the skies are the limit for Suffolk Downs.

The NEHBPA, is the only recognized representative of the running horse (Thoroughbred) owners and trainers in the Commonwealth, has been vigorously and diligently working on behalf of our 900 members, whose livelihoods along with livelihoods of hundreds of workers who provided on-track care for our horses, the many Suffolk Downs' employees and numerous farm workers who grow feed or provide off-track care for our horses, were suddenly cast into a dire situation when the closure of Suffolk Downs, the only viable Thoroughbred race track in New England, was announced.

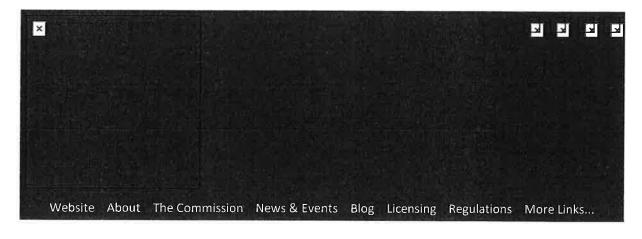
As a member of the NEHBPA this is how we get our information. From a Blood Horse article. From two sides working together to put the local horsemen out of business.

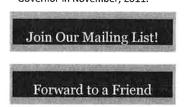

Suffolk Requests Three Days of Live Racing

The management of Suffolk Downs, which announced last September that live racing had come to an end at the historic East Boston, Mass., facility and the 2014 meet would be its last, intends to bring back the Thoroughbreds for three days this year and operate the meet.

The track submitted an application to the Massachusetts Gaming Commission requesting one day of racing on three Saturdays: July 11, Aug. 8, and Sept. 5. The New England Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association, which in February executed a two-year agreement with Suffolk Downs to lease the track, has instead withdrawn the "placeholder" application it filed with the MGC in October.

"Our 2014 racing license has been extended (by the state legislature) until the end of July 2016, and as part of that extension we were invited to apply for dates so we filed a supplemental application to run three days per our agreement with the horsemen," said Chip Tuttle, chief operating officer of the track. "We project purse levels at \$500,000 per day and we also look forward to accommodating the Massachusetts Thoroughbred Breeders' Association to run some of their races on those days."

Elaine Driscoll, spokesperson for the MGC, said Suffolk Downs' application is currently under review by its legal department. Upon completion of the attorneys' findings, the application will

be released and then a public hearing will be scheduled, as required by the MGC.

A hearing date is expected to be confirmed later the week of May 17.

"We're hopeful that the commission will look favorably on our application as it provides an opportunity for the horsemen and the breeders to have at least a minimal amount of racing as they work on their long-term plans for their future and for developing their own venue," Tuttle said.

At the same time, the abbreviated meet allows the ownership of the 80-year-old track an extended period to work on development plans for the property, which is one of the most valuable in New England and perhaps the Eastern seaboard.

"We are extremely positive that we are heading in the right direction," said New England HBPA president Anthony Spadea said. "We are confident now that Suffolk has applied for these dates that we can make them very successful days of racing."

In order for the three-day meet, if green-lighted by the MGC, to be successful, purses will have to be funded by some of the Thoroughbred industry's share of the state's new Race Horse Development Fund. The RHDF is being supplied by a percentage of the license fees and revenue from future casinos and a slot-machine parlor.

Success will also be contingent upon the New England horsemen, who dispersed some of their stock and scattered to other tracks along the East Coast after Suffolk Downs closed last year, coming home to race for those three dates.

Tuttle said a portion of the barn area will only be open from the Thursday prior to each Saturday race date until the day (Sunday) afterward. The dorms will not be available and the track kitchen, which burned down last year, will not be rebuilt.

It is expected that 12 to 14 races will be carded on each of the three days, with steeplechase racing added to the mix. Preference at the entry box will be given to horsemen who supported live racing at Suffolk Downs in the recent past, provided their horses fit the conditions.

Meanwhile, the New England HBPA is moving forward with plans to construct an equine center and family-friendly facility in another part of the state that will be ready to open once Suffolk Downs shuts its doors for good.

"We're hoping in the very near future, and with the help of the legislature, that we will be building a brand new facility for racing," Spadea said. "We feel that racing in New England can and will be what it used to be. We're trying to secure a permanent racing program for our horsemen and provide good racing with a lot of fun for the fans."

As a trainer and member of the NEHPBA having spent the winter waiting for a disposition on a race meet, I had opportunity to familiarize and review the association's presidents' call for solidarity in our trade publication for an ill-conceived plan to conduct a one to three day meet at Suffolk Downs on undetermined dates.

Such a plan would have serious repercussions on our horseman, their families and the welfare of the thoroughbred industry.

Suffolk Downs holds the fondest of career memories, but I cannot support the subsidization of its future real estate development plan with race horse development funds at the expense of fellow horseman.

I cannot support misallocation of racehorse development monies to an uncommitted licensee, having no interest in conducting a meaningful horse race meet or providing a home base facility to which we may return from winter racing.

I oppose the transfer of race horse development funds in consideration of a day or two of thoroughbred racing as proposed by a board clearly disconnected from the needs of its membership, to a licensee unprepared to execute the purpose of this legislation.
