#### **PUBLIC MEETING**

This public hearing is intended to provide the Commission with the opportunity to pose questions to the applicant and address concerns relative to the proposal of Wynn MA, LLC ("applicant") to build a gaming establishment in Everett, MA including the scope and quality of the proposed gaming area and amenities, the integration of the proposed gaming establishment into the surrounding community and the extent of required mitigation plans and receive input from members of the public from an impacted community. A copy of the applicant's application is available for review on the Commission's website: www.massgaming.com. No votes or decisions will be made at this hearing; it is simply intended as an opportunity for the Commission to gather information and gauge public sentiment relative to the application.

The Commission will schedule a pre-hearing conference with the applicant approximately 7-10 days prior to the public hearing to advise the applicant of the issues that it may be required to address in the public hearing.

Commissioner McHugh will preside over this public hearing. The applicant and its agents and representatives shall attend the public hearing, may make a presentation, and respond to questions as directed by the Commission. Representatives of Everett, representatives of the surrounding communities previously designated by the Commission, and representatives of the impacted live entertainment venues previously designated by the Commission may attend the public hearing, may make a presentation, and respond to questions as directed by the Commission. Any other interested person may attend the public hearing.

Those who wish to submit written comments in advance of the hearing may do so by sending an email to mgccomments@state.ma.us with the name of the applicant in the subject line. All comments received via email will be made public in their entirety, including the identity of the commenter, and distributed to the Commission for their review prior to the hearing.

Public officials from a host or surrounding community, representatives of interested parties, and members of the host or surrounding communities who wish to address the Commission at the hearing may place their name on the list of speakers by sending an email to mgccomments@state.ma.us with 'Request to address the Commission/Wynn MA" in the subject line. Individuals will also have an opportunity to sign up to address the Commission on the day of the meeting prior to its start at the Edward G. Connolly Center. In order to use the available time most efficiently, the Commission will limit each speaker to 4 minutes.

Dear Commission Members,

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comment today on the application being made by Wynn Resorts for a gaming license to develop a \$1.5 billion resort casino in Everett, Massachusetts.

The Mystic River Watershed Association, is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization founded in 1972 by a group of concerned local citizens. Our mission is to protect and restore clean water and related natural resources within the Mystic River basin.

I will limit my comments to those areas of most concern to our organization while respecting that the issues of traffic, problem gambling and impacts on local businesses and residential neighborhoods represent critically important issues for the Commission and the proponents to evaluate and address. The focus of our review is on the prospective impact of casino development on environmental conditions in the Mystic River.

It is important to note that both the Wynn Resorts and Mohegan Sun casinos are proposed to be constructed within the boundaries of the Mystic River watershed. Either of these projects if they are built will have significant impact on water quality, natural habitat, and flooding within the Mystic River and its tributaries. It is our position that if either of the Mystic River casinos are permitted, given the size and scope of these projects, plans for the casinos must include significant environmental benefit and plans long term environmental improvement.

Wynn Resort Casino project in particular represents an extraordinary opportunity for the proponents to provide important leadership and support for the transformation of this hardworking urban river system to a healthy condition. We applaud that the Wynn Everett project proposes to undertake remediation of a significant hazardous waste site that has until now remained a blighted and unused parcel on the waterfront. Responsible and thorough clean up of this long neglected hazardous waste site is a very important environmental benefit that can result from construction of this project.

At present, the proposed casino site, formerly owned by the Monsanto Chemical Company is an abandoned hazardous waste land causing ongoing impairment to the Mystic River. Significant and unaddressed contamination in soils, ground water and sediments on and adjacent to the site include volatile petroleum hydrocarbons, PCBs and a variety of heavy metals. Dissolved metal contamination in shallow groundwater is also present across the site. The stated intention of the proponents to address this contamination, to restore the Monsanto parcel, reduce off site discharges and to put this important riverfront property into productive use will provide substantial benefit to Mystic River communities and to the river itself.

With regard to other environmental concerns, the Wynn Resort Development team has been responsive to the recommendations of the Mystic River Watershed Association. Early on in the review process, our Association recommended several important changes to the developer's site plan. We are pleased that the Wynn Resort development team embraced these comments and substantially modified and improved their approach to site development. As a result, the Everett casino plan now includes substantial ecological restoration of the riverfront and coastal resource areas adjacent to the casino property.

The proposed construction of a living shoreline at the water's edge will help to restore native salt marsh and other native habitat and provide an important pilot project for habitat restoration in the Mystic. This plan will augment new salt marsh that is emerging adjacent to the casino site and will provide further evidence that restoration and protection of riverbank and habitat is feasible in the much abused Mystic River.

We are also pleased to see that the building footprint and size has been substantially modified in order to create more public outdoor open space and improved access to the riverfront which is much needed in this densely developed urban environment.

In conclusion, MyRWA is pleased with Wynn Resort plans to take important steps to protect and restore the local natural environment. We are encouraged by the stated commitment of the Wynn Everett development team to set high standards of excellence with regard to site design and environmental protection. We hope that the Commission will ensure these high standards are maintained.

Greetings:

I am a resident of the City of Everett who has lived in this city for 62 years.

Of the 2 applicants competing for the Region A gaming license I believe that Wynn Resorts Inc should be awarded the license for the following reasons:

Wynn has the needed cash and the deepest pockets. Wynn has the best kind of cash—all his own. No meddlesome third party financiers, bankers, or "vulture capitalists" who could go belly-up in mid-project like the terrible Vornado disaster that left an ugly, gaping hole in the middle of downtown Boston for years.

Wynn is the developer, financier, and operator all rolled into one. No complicated partnership deals and relationships that could sour and trigger friction and lawsuits between partners and a lot of bad press for the gaming industry in Massachusetts (as well as the Gaming Commission itself) because of a delayed project—or worse—a cancelled project.

Wynn has a long track record of building and operating profitable mega destination resort hotel-casinos here and abroad that operate under commercial licenses which require payment of corporate income taxes to the jurisdiction that issued the gaming license. Wynn's current stock and record of earnings reflects a financially stable and profitable enterprise which pleases Wall Street. Wynn Resorts has a \$13.5 billion market valuation and more than \$2 billion in cash.

Wynn Resorts Inc. is more hotel than casino because most of its revenue is from hotel operations. The same cannot be said for the competing applicant. The Wynn Casino is the engine that makes possible the building of a top quality five star hotel operation and all the frequent and expensive renovations needed to keep a hotel a top quality five star facility year after year. The numerous awards that Wynn Resorts has received over the years attest to the highest quality hotel accommodations and services to guests. Wynn now holds more Five Stars than any other independent hotel company in the world.

Wynn Resorts has the top quality five star accommodations and services needed to attract a significant amount of guests from outside the region. This is very important! Tourists, conventioneers, and business travelers from outside the region will bring in the dollars that will fuel the local economy which is always good for local businesses and job creation. The middling three star facility the competing applicant will build in Revere just won't have the same appeal to the business and international community, won't

bring in the same amount of money from outside the region, and won't yield the same benefits.

Wynn Resorts has a long history of successful operation in a fiercely competitive environment where the competition is right next door or across the street and not some 10 or more miles away. Such experience is a great advantage in facing the growing amount of competition within the gaming industry due to the proliferation of casinos in the northeast region of the country.

Wynn has a better design. The Wynn tower attracted a fair amount of criticism from its competitor which proposes building a flatter, spread-out facility. But this kind of layout is bound to irritate guests and staff who will be forced to travel longer distances on foot. No wonder Steve Wynn called it a "misfire" and "yesterday's newspaper." Last October I visited the Las Vegas hotels and found out what Wynn was talking about when I toured Caesars Palace and walked and walked and got lost in its spread-out bigness somewhere between the casinos, the Colosseum, and the Forum Shops. When I found my way out, I was irritated to learn that I had been traveling south back towards the Bellagio instead of north towards the Encore, my destination. As I made my exit I felt sorry for anyone who stays at a place big enough to suit Nero but doesn't provide each guest with a chariot to get around it.

Wynn will offer not just jobs but careers with a company recognized as the Number 1 large employer in Las Vegas by its employees in the Las Vegas Review-Journal's Top Workplaces Survey. Thousands at Wynn are long-term employees who have been with the company for years and far longer than the industry average.

Wynn will clean up the Monsanto Mess. What more can I say about this environmental disaster and disgrace? I wrote enough about this in a 6 page letter to the Gaming Commission on March 31 that featured 3 color photographs of the very act of pollution itself back in 1972: 3 close up views of drainpipes disgorging industrial waste matter onto the ground and ultimately into the Mystic and Boston Harbor. Such was the waste disposal practices of industries along the Mystic until the Clean Water Act outlawed this sort of thing only months after these photographs were taken. Suffice it to say that Wynn is the only prospective developer who is willing to spend the \$20 or \$30 million or even more to remediate this site and provide the public access to a revitalized waterfront area. No other prospective developer is willing to touch this site which has been closed to the public for well over a century and is likely to remain closed to the public for another century if Wynn does not get the opportunity to clean it up.

Wynn can help clean up the Mystic. A Wynn Resort will revitalize the Everett waterfront and bring thousands of visitors to the river's edge and on the river itself via water traffic thereby giving the Mystic River a visibility and its water quality a focus of attention it never had before. Currently, the river remains closed to swimming, fishing, and sometimes to boating in certain areas. Progress on its cleanup has been very slow and very frustrating over the last 40 years and lags far behind the Charles River and Boston Harbor. The Wynn Resort can change that. It can serve as the catalyst that will bring together the broad array of stakeholders to build the vision, find the resources, and rejuvenate this important local asset. What was done to the Charles River can be done

to the Mystic, and a Wynn Resort located at a prime waterfront location can help make that happen. A cleaned up waterway will provide enormous opportunities for economic, recreational, and educational activities in the Greater Boston area for generations to come. This will especially be true for the communities of Arlington, Medford, Somerville, Everett, Charlestown, Chelsea, and East Boston which lie along the banks of the river.

And finally, I will mention that the merits of the Wynn proposal were reinforced by the residents of the City of Everett who approved the project by a vote of 86.5% in favor of it. As you well know, the competition's vote in favor last February did not come close to this.

Let's not let this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity slip away.

Award Wynn the gaming license.

Commissioners,

I'm not here to talk about the Wynn Casino/Hotel proposal here in Everett but to speak about why the Commission should award this license for the benefit of the people of the City of Everett; not just today but for the people both past and future.

Everett has always, in the past, been a service city to the surrounding areas and not just the surrounding areas but in some cases worldwide. We have had to endure all that goes along with industrial conglomerates but never the benefits.

If we look along the Malden and Mystic Rivers, in which Everett is generally along the East side, we find a wide variety of businesses.

- At one time not long ago there was a transfer facility that loaded onto large barges house-hold and
  construction debris operating from the City of Medford. These barges, once loaded, were towed far
  out to sea and burned. The ashes were emptied at sea. When moving toward the sea much of the
  debris went overboard and settled along the bottom of the rivers. That is pollution that still resides
  there. Everett did not benefit from this venture. AND NO ONE ASKED THE CITIZENS OF EVERETT IF IT
  WAS OK.
  - 2. The next area along the river is the former G.E property. The G.E. provided many parts product for the U.S. Army Air Force and also the U.S. Air Force to be used in many aircraft engines. They did this as a service to our country. Everett's only benefit from this operation is what every municipality in the country received. When G.E. vacated the property it left us with an abundance of pollution. AND NO ONE ASKED THE CITIZENS OF EVERETT IF IT WAS OK.
  - Further on down the river is an industrial complex. No one has discovered just might be leaching
    into the river except some stone dust and a left behind abandoned marine docking facility.
     Everett does not benefit from this operation. AND NO ONE ASKED THE CITIZENS OF EVERETT IF
    IT WAS OK.
  - 3. Everett's city dump is next in line. It polluted Sandy beach and polluted most of that area and including the river. The property now houses a parking lot and a building on a slab foundation. Although Everett benefited by the use of a dump no ever one cleaned up the property. The new business built on top of the pollution and it still there. AND NO ONE ASKED THE CITISZENS OF EVERETT IF IT WAS OK.
  - 4. We now arrive at Monsanto Properties which is the third chemical company on that site. There are two locations. The first location is where the main offices and the manufacturing plants were located; entrance off Route 16. This is so badly polluted that seventeen feet of glacial silt

were required to cover the entire site. The hot spot was first covered with a 100 foot diameter cement dome cover before the glacial silt was placed on top. This pollution still remains at the site and I have no doubt that some still leaches into the river and surrounding marsh areas. Everett received no benefits from his location. AND NO ONE ASKED THE CITIZENS OF EVERETT IF IT WAS OK.

- 5. The second Monsanto location was the docking area for ships and also an open air raw materials stock pile. Many times residents were required to shut their windows to keep out the odor from the site. One time it was so bad that there was an evacuation of patients from the Whidden Memorial Hospital that is located 2.5 miles away. Everett received no benefits from this location. The pollution at this site has a long list and is still in existence. AND NO ONE ASKED THE CITIZENS OF EVERETT IF IT WAS OK
- 6. The "Edison Electric Co" is no longer there but the facility is still there. This site has been has been operated by several other companies over the past several years. The pollution has been reduced over the course of much redevelopment. However it was a facility that burned high sulfur coal that polluted the complete city and beyond. The facility released hot water into the Mystic River and destroyed the mollusk breeding beds and feeding areas for many fish and shell species. The river has never recovered. The City of Everett never received one watt of power from this facility. It all went to the City of Boston. AND NO ONE ASKED THE CITIZENS OF EVERETT IF IT WAS OK.
- 7. EASTERN Gas and Fuel were next and were the worst polluters that one could imagine. They not only polluted the river but also a large tract (acres) of land that still remains today. This facility burned coke to create gas. The coke was burned, creating coal dust that travel for miles, during the warm weather to fill giant gas tanks so the gas could be delivered to the City of Boston during cold weather. The City of Everett never received one therm of heat no matter how cold it was. AND NO ONE ASKED THE CITIZENS OF EVERETT IF IT WAS OK.
- 8. The Distrigas facility moved in and does not produce any known pollution. It is built on top of the ground and the pollution is still there. The City of Everett Board of Alderman did grant Distrigas a license to store LNG at the site. The City of Everett does not benefit by the conversion of LNG to natural gas; it is still piped to Boston and trucked to other near and far municipalities.
- 9. I need to back up a little to the Prolerized Corporation. They turned junked motor vehicles into a product for shipping and recycling. The leaching of hydro-carbons into the river has been corrected, by major construction, but the pollution still remains in the river.
- 10. Last to mention is the M. B. T. A. repair facility. No benefits, not even taxes, were derived by Everett. Who knows what effect they have caused by having a long term operation on the site?
- 11. There are many other concerns that I have not covered. Records will show that many Everett workers left home with their lunch buckets and never returned. Everett citizens have paid their dues over and over. They have paid economically, ecologically, and in human life.
- 12. While other municipalities have benefited from the "not in my back yard" syndrome Everett has never suffered from the "not in my back yard" syndrome.
- 13. That is some of the history of what the citizens of Everett have had to put up with over the years. We now have a developer who did ASK THE CITIZENS OF EVERETT IF IT WAS OK TO COME

- TO EVERETT TO BUILD A HOTEL /CASINO AND CLEAN UP A LARGE AREA OF POLLUTION PLUS OTHER CONSIDERSTIONS. AND THE CITIZENS OF EVERETT SAID YES.
- 14. So in conclusion I ask that you grant the license to Wynn not only because of the casino but because of the clean-up of the pollution. If the license in not granted the pollution will never be corrected and again Everett citizens will have no say it the matter.
  - If we compare Wynn and let's say a BJ's or a Wall-Mart, and in forty years they would decide to close doors and move on to some other place; with Wynn the pollution would be gone but with the others the pollution would still be there.
  - When The Massachusetts Gaming Commission indicated it wanted to do what was best for Massachusetts what better way than to clean up that pollution in Everett, give its citizens a much deserved break, and grant a license to an organization that will benefit not only Everett but citizens of Massachusetts.

#### **Bob Marra Testimony - June 25, 2014**

Hello, my name is Bob Marra. I have worked for Cambridge Health Alliance (CHA) as the Director of the Everett Community Health Partnership for the past nine years.

I am a resident of the Hyde Park neighborhood of Boston. My daughter is a very hard working and talented special education teacher in the Everett Public Schools who lives in Everett with her family, including my only grandchild.

I am a member of Action for Regional Equity and support the testimony they presented to you yesterday including the provision of living wage jobs for local residents of Everett and its surrounding communities including Boston. I am especially concerned that as many jobs as possible will be available to people returning to their communities from prison — a group of people I am assisting as they are referred to me by CHA doctors and the Everett Police.

I have very mixed emotions about casinos. The jobs they create are vitally important. However, I believe there are much fairer and safer ways to raise needed tax revenue.

I have no mixed emotions about one person who has been very outspoken in his support of a casino in Everett, that is, Everett's mayor, Carlo DeMaria, Jr.

Over the past forty years, including twenty years as an Assistant Deputy Commissioner at Boston City Hospital, I have come to know six mayors pretty well, three in Boston and three in Everett.

For seven years I have worked closely with Mayor DeMaria, his staff and his family on a variety of community health-related issues, including working with his wife to help her distribute the significant amount of money she raised for Everett's large Haitian community after the tragic earthquake in Haiti. At present I am working with the Mayor's mother, who has two amazing backyard gardens, to help expand Everett's community garden program.

What is most clear to me about the Mayor is his deep love for the people of this city and his willingness to work very, very hard, day in and day out on their behalf -- in an up front and honest way. Everett is a small city with very little separation of residents by income or color of skin like there is in Boston. What the Mayor does as the representative of the people he does also to himself and his family. He supports this casino because he thinks it is the right thing to do for everyone in Everett, including his family and my family.

I wholeheartedly support him and hope that you will do likewise.

The Boston Harbor Island Alliance (BHIA) is a nonprofit organization whose sole purpose is to promote the public use and awareness of the Boston Harbor Islands national park area. BHIA has not taken a position on casino gambling in Massachusetts nor endorsed any particular applicant or project. However, we are providing comment today to underscore the fact that this project, if approved, will be a significant addition to the waterfront recreational destinations in and around Boston Harbor, and development of this project presents an excellent opportunity to increase access to natural resources and recreational opportunities throughout Boston Harbor.

The applicant has put forward a proposal that has many exemplary environmental and sustainability design components, including renewable energy and energy efficiency components, waste to energy and recycling, land and water conservation, alternative modes of transportation and excellent transit connectivity with the proximity to the MBTA's Blue Line and potential future links to water transportation networks. We are impressed with the Proponent's efforts to make it a "green" project, and particularly with their commitment to LEED certification. We are also pleased with the effort the Proponents have put into public outreach and their willingness to engage with all parties, including our organization, to consider the project in its broadest harbor-wide context.

The gaming statute calls on proponents to provide measurable economic benefit to not only the impacted communities but to the region and state as a whole. The statute also implores proponents to work with existing cultural institutions to ensure "...patrons experience the diversified regional tourism industry." The Boston Harbor Islands national park area is not only a tremendous natural resource, within sight and a short boat ride from the project location, the park is truly a regional treasure and a cornerstone of the local tourism experience. The Boston Harbor Islands National park area is one of only 400 national parks in the country, and one of the few in an urban area.

The proposed project is clearly part of the regional tourism economy, and we believe that in addition to the proponents laudable attention to conserving and making connections to natural resources, improving access to those resources, and supporting alternative modes of transportation, providing mitigation funding for water transportation to the Boston Harbor Islands national park area is appropriate. Park managers and the BHIA would like to see the number of visitors to the Islands doubled in the next five years, and to do that and also maintain affordability will require broader subsidization of the water transportation system. BHIA has been the recipient of past mitigation and successfully implemented park enhancement amenities, in partnership with our local, state and federal partners.

We applaud the project proponents for the exemplary environmental design components of their plan. Linking the development of the proposed project with support for affordable access and improvements to the Boston Harbor Island park system , is a unique opportunity to advance the regional recreational and tourism economy, consistent with the purposes of the gaming statute.







My name is Mary Bagarella. I'm a lifelong resident of Everett, and now live at 66 Main Street. I was raised in Everett in the Village, which runs from Kelvin St., to the railroad tracks, which is in close proximity to where the former Monsanto Chemical Company was. I recall being a young girl of about 6 or 7 years old, about 1932, when I used to spend my summers at Sandy Beach; that is now Sacramoni Park. There were so many little waterways that we would rowboat in, and have picnics in the shade under the trees. Sandy Beach had a bath house with showers, and even a diving board. In September there would be gatherings for Labor Day, and churches held baptisms right there in the water. We would also swim in the creek and off the drawbridge.

Sometimes there would be a layer of yellow film on the water or a layer of black soot. I also remember on particular mornings we would wake to a thick layer of soot covering our porches and window sills, and everything in the neighborhood. It was customary in the evenings to have to close up the windows to our homes to try to keep our eyes from burning. As kids we would play in the neighborhood and once it became evening our eyes would stream tears and we would feel the burning, and we never thought much of it. It was par for the course living in close proximity to the Monsanto Chemical Company. So many of our neighbors and friends of our close knit neighborhood became ill with Leukemia. I am witness to all of this. I grew up there, and members of my family still live there in the home I grew up in.

I very much loved growing up in that neighborhood. We didn't have much but what we did have was a close relationship with our neighbors, and access to recreation on the Mystic River. Lately, I think back now to those days, and strongly feel there just may be some connection to the environment in which we were living, and how these individuals passed too soon. Most of which were never to have lived to be fifty years old.

I'm hopeful that this area will be cleaned up, and transformed into a waterfront that the public will once again enjoy like the summers I fondly remember. It's a shame that a large corporation was allowed to leave behind pollutants that are still harmful to the residents today even after all these years, and was not held accountable. Many developers have since shown interest in developing that brownfield, only to walk away because of the cost of cleaning it up suitable enough for public use. It wasn't until Steve Wynn came to Everett, that I actually had faith that I would once again enjoy the waterfront of my memories. When this becomes a reality, and I walk among the trees and flowers, I'm sure my tears will be streaming, but only from joy. Thank you for taking time to read my later, and I strongly support this project, and it's plans of remediation.



With overwhelming approval by the city voters, this project offers substantial benefits to the city and state. In over 4 decades no cleanup of the Monsanto site has been funded or proposed. It will be done with the Wynn project, relieving the city and all surrounding communities of long term responsibilities. The city of Everett has been a perennial mention in the state's most economically depressed cities. The addition of the Casino in Everett will make a substantial difference in upgrading the entire city. These things are true of Boston Harbor, and are true of the state highways which cut across Boston land. It is also worth noting that your sewage is treated in Winthrop, your water comes from central and western Massachusetts and the primary source of your electricity is provided by, wait for it, facilities in Everett, Massachusetts.

We are one state, Mr. Mayor, separated by only municipal boundary; many of the things for which you claim sole ownership of the City of Boston have been and are paid for by citizens only across the commonwealth but across the nation. However, is it only these boundaries for which host status can be determined, otherwise there would be no end to the claims of host status; Stockbridge and Provincetown laying equal claim under the arguments you lay forth.

We are hopeful, Boston will realize that there is great opportunity before them in working with and not against Wynn Resort's proposal. In truth, Wynn represents great opportunity for all us.

Moreover, the money proposed by Mohegan Sun to fix Rte. 1A is more than \$450 million less than a study commissioned by State Senator Anthony Petruccelli said was needed to fix the Logan Airport access point with or without a casino. Don't believe us? Believe this:

"In 2009, an independent study commissioned by Petruccelli showed that regardless if a casino is built at Suffolk Downs costs to improve the infrastructure along the Route 1A corridor from the Sumner/Callahan Tunnels to Copeland Circle in Revere would cost the state almost \$500 million." – East Boston Times Free Press

But at least Mohegan has a detailed plan, right? Sure. And if you enjoy fairytales you should pick up a copy sometime. Perhaps you can read it next time you're sitting in the Ted Williams Tunnel trying to get to Logan Airport and knowing that the gridlock you're sitting in means you'll have to book another flight.

Let's put a bow on this. There's no such thing as a quick fix. Facts matter. The truth is important. Wynn Resorts is committed to working with the City of Boston to find a solution to the Sullivan Square problem. What Wynn Resorts will NOT do is put forth a plan completely disassociated from the reality of the current situation, but Mohegan did.



#### Mohegan's Connecticut Conflict Is A Raw Deal For Massachusetts:

The point of casino gaming in Massachusetts is to feed the tax base with money from outside of the region. # Copper, ash, arsenic, lead, dangerously low pH levels, and leaching contaminants made this site seem like a total loss.

For decades, the former Monsanto Chemical site in Everett has sat abandoned, chained-off, and dark, packed full of dangerous left-over pollution, blocking access to the Mystic River and Boston Harbor.

The site is well known – and remembered – by residents of the city and surrounding communities. A prime waterfront spot, once played on and enjoyed by children and grownups alike, the cost of remediating the terrible mess left there has been too prohibitive for any developer to take on the challenge...

#### Until Wynn Resorts came to town.

Wynn's 5-Star resort and casino proposal calls for a complete remediation of the site – see the plan here – and Wynn is planning to spend a cool \$20 Million to \$30 Million to make sure the site is cleaned up properly, to open up this waterfront property for visitors to enjoy once again.

Cleaning up a horribly polluted former chemical plant site is only one of the many benefits that the Wynn will bring to the region, but it's one that has brought the project closer to the hearts of many Everett residents.

Wynn's cleanup plan helped fuel the city's overwhelming 87% vote in favor of the project in the city-wide referendum in June of 2014 (and by comparison, Mohegan Sun's self-proclaimed "overwhelming" vote was only 63%).

This clean-up plan will be led by Chris Gordon, a veteran engineer with many major capital projects under his belt, both locally and worldwide. Mr. Gordon not only teaches at Harvard and MIT but also was instrumental in the cleanup of other brownfields over the course of his career.

Cleanup will not delay building or construction and will be totally safe for neighbors. Despite what some people would have you believe, the cleanup effort will run concurrently with permitting and construction, and there is no reason why the Wynn would not be built as fast as any other proposal before the Massachusetts Gaming Commission.

Further, there will be no impact on public health or air quality during the remediation (which will be monitored by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts), and when the work is done, the site will exceed government standards for public use.

This transformational project will be more than just a victory for the region's economy – it will be a victory for the environment.







I am writing you in regards to the proposed construction of a resort-casino in region A. What will benefit the entire Commonwealth of Massachusetts the most? I believe the answer is a corporation that has a good business plan, the resources needed to finance the plan, and full independent control over the entire project. If the corporation meets these requirements, they would be highly motivated to create a successful and profitable business. They would be assuming the full financial risk. They would have absolute control and could do whatever is necessary to make the project successful. They would be fully committed and not influenced by outside investors or partners who may have other objectives. I am convinced that the Wynn Corporation meets these requirements and is the kind of corporation that is most likely to succeed. The Wynn Corporation has a good business plan. Specifically, they will independently finance the project, construct and manage the facility, and out right purchase the property with no obligations to any outside investors, partners or landlords. Wynn is highly motivated to establish a successful business that will create new employment opportunities and additional tax revenue that will benefit the entire Commonwealth.

In contrast, the Mohegan Sun group has a very different business plan that is financed by an unrelated high risk hedge fund corporation and requires access to property that is leased by a private party rather than owned. As a result, Mohegan Sun does not have full independent control over the project. Each of the group members has their own specific objectives. I believe that Mohegan Sun's primary objective is to eliminate competition to their current facility located in Connecticut. Consequently, they don't have to create a successful and profitable business. They only have to prevent someone else from doing that. The hedge fund corporation that is funding the project is in the business of investing in high risk ventures that produce potentially high profits with a short term turn around. That could pressure Mohegan Sun to cut costs by reducing quality to meet investment expectations. The property is owned by a business that has been declining for many years. Therefore, the owner of that business is simply seeking an alternate source of revenue. In short, you have three separate "partners" who each have their own specific objectives. There is a very real potential for conflicts of interest that could degrade the quality or success of the overall project.

So, in conclusion, which business plan is most likely to succeed? With the Wynn plan you have one developer, manager, financier, and land owner. With the Mohegan Sun plan you have three separate entities that include a developer and manager, a finance corp., and a landlord. I am convinced that the Wynn Corporation plan is the one that is most likely to succeed.

#### Greetings:

I am a lifelong resident of the City of Everett whose grandparents settled in this city in 1908. Last June, I voted in favor of building a destination resort hotel-casino in Everett and urge that the Massachusetts Gaming Commission award the Region A Gaming License to Wynn Resorts because Wynn will remediate the Monsanto brownfield site, one of the most contaminated sites in New England, and give the public access to the Mystic River. This will do much to promote action to restore the river and bring it back to life in much the same way that two other rivers that empty into Boston Harbor, the Charles and Neponset Rivers, have been cleaned up.

The seven-mile Mystic River has played a pivotal role in the civic and commercial life of the Boston area for centuries. Its proud history is now overshadowed by the legacy of the industrial age, which has left its waters too polluted to drink, swim, or fish. At times, portions of the river have been deemed unsafe for boating.

The Mystic River Watershed is home to 8% of the Commonwealth's population—500,000 people—yet covers less than 1% of the land, making this watershed one of the most densely populated and urban watersheds in the state. But the Mystic River remains largely hidden behind fences, industrial sites, and old buildings; and for that reason it suffers from a lack of public attention on its current condition and the remaining blighted, toxic sites along its banks. The river consistently receives a low EPA rating due to stormwater runoff, industrial process wastewater, sanitary sewer overflows, combined sewer overflows, and legacy contamination from long-abandoned industrial sites containing toxins. The last includes the Monsanto brownfield site, a major obstacle to the cleanup of the Mystic.

#### Monsanto Site Cleanup

The Monsanto site is located in a waterfront area that consists of inactive former industrial properties and underutilized parkland. In comparison to neighboring cities, Everett is severely lacking in recreational boating facilities, public landings, and public access along the waterfront. Although the remediation of these contaminated sites has been for many years a goal of the city, the expense of remediation makes it cost prohibitive and remains a major obstacle to any kind of redevelopment of this neglected area. As a result, much of

the Everett waterfront remains unsafe and inaccessible. Nevertheless, the city has persevered in its efforts to achieve the highest and best use of this property. To fulfill the objectives of the state waterways regulations, working with the State Office of Coastal Zone Management, the City has developed a state-approved *Everett Central Waterfront Municipal Harbor Plan* to improve public access to the river, promote water transportation and recreational boating, manage and improve environmental resources, and support public and private investment along the waterfront.

Wynn's proposed development of the Monsanto brownfield provides an opportunity to completely transform this part of the Everett waterfront and help achieve the goals of the Municipal Harbor Plan and the Lower Broadway Master Plan to maximize the site's redevelopment feasibility and its potential to substantially improve the public's ability to access and enjoy the waterfront and the river. The Wynn Project will transform this vacant and neglected property into an environmentally and economically sustainable operation that will provide public access to the waterfront and attract substantial additional investment into the surrounding areas and thereby augment municipal and state tax revenues.

However, the site's current contaminated state has proven to be a barrier to achieving the highest and best use of this property; and the cost of remediation is an expensive burden that—much to the frustration of Everett's mayors—has even discouraged large national retailers like Walmart and Home Depot when they learn about its history.

To current and former Everett residents who are of a certain age, the name *Monsanto* conjures up unpleasant memories of:

- a yellowish haze hovering over sulfur piles that stank like rotten eggs
- hot summer days when windows were shut to minimize irritation to the respiratory system
- a dust that settled on and cursed garden plants and automobile paint

The expression "a picture is worth a thousand words" is a well-known one. With this in mind I have enclosed 3 photographs taken in January 1972 of drainpipes disgorging waste matter in the Southwest Everett waterfront area that illustrate the industrial waste disposal practices in this area throughout most of the twentieth century prior to passage of the Clean Water Act of 1972. (A friend of mine described these as "the images of vile industrial defecation and environmental desecration; of odious, odorous orifices excreting their deadly mix of ghastly fetid gases and industrial grade diarrhea from the bowels of polluters into a stygian watercourse now teeming with the wretched refuse of the toxic shores.") Along with these photographs are 2 photographs of the Monsanto facility as it existed in 1972. Finally, I have enclosed newspaper articles that reported chemical spills, gas leaks, sulfuric acid fogs and fires at the Monsanto site so that you can see what prospective developers of this site see when they research its history. Rest assured, that over the course of a century there were many more industrial accidents and spills at this site that never made it into the newspapers when it was owned by Cochrane Chemical, Merrimac

Chemical, and Monsanto Chemical—to say nothing about all the intentional dumping of unwanted chemicals and hazardous waste like lead, arsenic, and cyanide that occurred at this site.

With all this bad history of how these bad neighbors dumped their detritus on the people of South Everett, with all this bad history of a site "forgotten by those who poisoned it," as Mayor Carlo DeMaria stated in his inaugural speech, no wonder potential developers of this site choose to look elsewhere.

But Wynn Resorts remains unfazed. Wynn will remediate this contaminated site and open the Mystic Harbor Waterfront that has been publicly inaccessible for over 100 years. With the construction of a five-star resort hotel there will be a "resort for all—where families can celebrate, businesses can congregate, and both locals and visitors can recreate" as Wynn stated in its application.

Wynn represents a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to transform this contaminated site into "an environmentally and economically revitalized area habitable and useful to humans, flora, and fauna" as it stated in its application. And if not Wynn, then who? Who else will undertake such a massive and expensive cleanup? Who else is willing to spend the \$10 million or \$20 million or \$30 million or whatever it takes to do the job without the expenditure of any public funds? Must the people of Everett and the surrounding communities in the Greater Boston Area wait another 100 years for the same opportunity to gain access to this area for their recreation and enjoyment?

Will the Gaming Commission award the gaming license to Wynn Resorts which will:

- Clean up the Monsanto Mess and remediate a toxic brownfield
- Dredge the harbor and replace the toxic sediment with clean soil providing a viable habitat for natural organisms
- Create a "living" shoreline with native water plant species
- Install a harbor bulkhead wall and docks for water transportation
- Add shellfish in the harbor to promote natural regeneration
- Create a lavishly landscaped public esplanade with pedestrian and bicycle paths
- Build a shoreline outdoor amphitheater, viewing deck and picnic park
- Build a five-star destination resort hotel-casino

Or will the Gaming Commission throw away this golden opportunity and award the gaming license to a competitor which will:

- Build on land already accessible to the public in order to subsidize an unprofitable racetrack
- Build a three-star destination resort hotel-casino

Thoroughbred racing has been in serious decline for the last twenty years with the closure of many racetracks nationwide and faces an uncertain future. Its heyday was decades ago

before the proliferation of alternative forms of legal gambling. It patrons are an aging and diminishing crowd. As for this particular racetrack's environmental concerns, it is a matter of public record that this racetrack was fined \$1.25 million by the EPA in 2012 for illegally dumping horse manure and horse urine into tributaries of Boston Harbor. Sure, this competitor says that its proposal offers "a landscape design that is both restorative and transformative, creating an ecological experience that our guests, neighbors and the public can enjoy." But which of these two competing proposals is the more ambitious one? Which of the two offers the greater potential to achieve long-term environmental objectives from which the public stands to gain more in the long run? One that offers a middling three-star facility at a racetrack and the greenest racino in the country? Or one that offers a top quality five-star facility at a prime waterfront location that will spur action to restore and transform an entire river that runs from the Mystic Lakes through the communities of Arlington, Medford, Somerville, Everett, Charlestown, Chelsea, and East Boston? If the once heavily polluted Charles River and Boston Harbor are now national models for the rejuvenation of urban waterways, then why not favor a proposal that will promote the cleanup of the Mystic?

#### Mystic River Cleanup

42 years after the enactment of the Clean Water Act and almost 30 years after Boston's sewerage-laden Boston Harbor and Charles River began their transformation, the Mystic River lags far behind largely due to a lack of concerted efforts of a broad array of stakeholders—communities, businesses, stakeholder organizations, regulators, policy makers and elected officials—which were all instrumental and essential in the cleanups of Boston Harbor and the Charles and Neponset rivers. What the Mystic needs is more visibility, a visibility made possible with more public accessibility as a way to build public, and then political, support to clean it up. The Wynn Resort will provide the needed accessibility. Bringing thousands of visitors to the river's edge will focus more attention on its current condition and the remaining blighted, toxic sites along its banks. The Wynn Resort can serve as a catalyst for action on the Mystic River that will help bring together the broad array of stakeholders to build the vision, find the resources, and rejuvenate this important local asset. In a Boston Globe article State Representative Paul Brodeur wrote:

Accelerating efforts to clean up the Mystic River will enhance the entire region and create additional opportunities for sensible development, active and passive recreation, and a better overall quality of life all spurred by a commitment to environmental stewardship of this great resource.

No one is satisfied with the slow pace of cleanup so far, but making additional progress will require a concerted effort by the broadest possible coalition of communities, businesses, stakeholder organizations and elected leaders. This approach has proven to be effective in the past and it's time we tried it for this neglected, but important resource, to ensure that we leave a better Mystic River for future generations.

In 2009 the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation released the Mystic River Master Plan which provides a long-term framework for restoring and preserving areas along the river; protecting natural resources and wildlife habitats; and determining the areas most suitable and desirable for recreation, education, and preservation. In recent years the EPA has stepped up enforcement to prevent illegal discharge of pollutants. Court-ordered work is underway to separate sewer pipes from storm drains. Assembly Square in Somerville and River's Edge in Medford, Malden, and Everett, which remediated a blighted brownfield, are examples of successful development along the banks of the river. Yet, despite these efforts and the efforts of environmental advocates, the water quality of the Mystic has not changed in recent years; and although it offers the same promise as the Charles River and Boston Harbor, it has a long way to go. To address this problem, State Senators Denise Provost, Patricia Jehlen, and Sal DiDomenico have co-sponsored legislation to establish a Mystic River Water Quality Commission, which will be charged with the investigation and study of ways to improve the conditions while determining the feasibility of bringing the water quality in the Mystic River to a level that supports fishing, boating, swimming and wildlife. In their comments about this legislation in a Globe article, Jehlen and DiDomenico mentioned the following:

Boston Harbor and the Charles River are national examples of successful clean-ups of vital waterways.

What were once regarded as unsafe, polluted and forgotten, are now centerpieces of economic, recreational and educational activity. In both of these cases, local activists, businesses, elected officials and government regulators came together to develop a comprehensive plan to realize a vision for the future. They then took action and as a result today we can swim, run, duck boat, cruise or sail the harbor. This has encouraged responsible development that maximizes these wonderful natural resources.

The Wynn Resort will serve as a catalyst for action. Building the Wynn Resort on the Mystic will help build the coalition needed to build the vision, find the resources, and prioritize the cleanup and revitalization of the Mystic River.

The Wynn Resort will aid efforts to transform a river with an unacceptable EPA "D" Rating into a cleaned-up waterway that will provide opportunities for economic, recreational, and educational activities for the Greater Boston area.

In closing, I will mention that at the Gaming Commission hearing on December 16, Steve Wynn stated that "It's very important whether you're in Boston or in Macau that you have to become a good neighbor. You have to take a real interest in the community....Our role in the community is very important to the people who work for us." The cleanup of the Monsanto site will demonstrate commitment to the community as Mr. Wynn stated "not because I'm altruist or that I'm particularly liberal. I do it because it's good business." And the people of Everett agree it's good business. That is why they gave Wynn an overwhelming vote of confidence last June with an 87% vote in favor of the host city agreement with Wynn Resorts.

Other developers have looked at this site, looked at the cost of its cleanup, looked away and ran away after deciding the cleanup was not good business. Wynn is ready, Wynn is willing, and Wynn is able to do the cleanup.

Let's clean up Monsanto.

Let's clean up the Mystic.

Let's not allow this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to slip away.

Award Wynn the gaming license.

Honorable Members of the Massachusetts Gaming Commission:

I am writing to express my support for the Wynn Everett Casino proposal as I am unable to attend the meeting set for today, due to a work commitment. The designation of the "best" location for such an endeavor usually proves difficult. Potential host communities are often bitterly split over such a momentous issue. Fortunately, the residents of Everett have demonstrated their overwhelming support for this proposal with eighty-six (86%) percent voting in favor. In a world where majority vote is generally the course of action to pursue, eighty-six (86%) percent is practically unheard of and is nothing short of a mandate. As a lifelong Everett resident, and as the city councilor representing Ward 1, my focus for Everett as a community is one of long-term, beneficial development. Ward 1, in large part, borders the City of Boston and is the gateway into the City of Everett. Moreover, this portion of Ward 1 is located directly across from the proposed site and would be the most impacted area of our community.

I am keenly aware of some negative aspects of such a project, for example increased vehicular traffic and a potential increase in criminal activity, etc. However, I am also cognizant of the many favorable aspects of this proposal. Tax revenues are crucial to any community. Without sufficient funding, even the most basic services rendered to residents can be compromised. Clearly, this project would result in a tremendous influx of tax revenues, but that is not my main reason for support. There are several other serious considerations that have led me to support the proposal.

Everett has traditionally been a working-class community with a large presence of heavy commercial and industrial activity. Over the years, many of these locations have become

stagnant. The stimulus the Wynn proposal would have on the local economy, both in and outside the City of Everett, is beyond measure. Stagnant land would become productive once again. Employment opportunities would increase at an unparalleled rate. The beneficial impact not only to the City of Everett, but to the neighboring communities and the entire New England area cannot be overestimated.

Perhaps the main reason for my support, and the single most important factor that demonstrates why Everett is a "better" choice than Revere, is site remediation. Given the nature of the industrial activities that have occurred in Everett, our city constantly experiences issues regarding varying degrees of contamination. It is my understanding that much of the land in question is contaminated. Everett waterfront is a forgotten resource and is currently inaccessible. This proposal would remedy the contamination issues in the designated location and would make much of the Everett waterfront safe and accessible to the public. We have seen a similar rebirth to an adjacent parcel in the City of Everett. Gateway Mall stands on a portion of the former Monsanto Chemical Company site. At the time of the remediation and transformation of that location, I served as an elected official representing that area (Ward 6). Many years later, the project continues to demonstrate that it was in the best interests of the City of Everett and the surrounding communities. This prior experience will prove invaluable throughout every stage of the Wynn project.

If the Wynn proposal does not proceed, it is very likely that the land in question will remain stagnant and contaminated. It is equally likely that the local economy will continue to struggle, rather than flourish. Should the proposal move forward, I understand that this is just the beginning and that there will be many challenging issues to address along the way. The Wynn Corporation has made significant investments in time and other resources to explain its proposal to the residents of Everett. Numerous public hearings have been held to discuss the impact, both positive and negative, of the project on the community and the intended course of action to address the concerns of Everett's residents and elected officials. At these meetings, and in writing, Wynn has continuously expressed its commitment to the City of Everett. As the city councilor representing Ward 1, I intend to be an ever-present proponent on behalf of the community to ensure that the Wynn Corporation makes good on all it has promised.

For these reasons, I express my support for the Wynn Everett Casino proposal.





Hello.

I am a resident of Burlington, Massachusetts, and I would like to provide the Gaming Commission with my comments on the Region A casino applications.

First, some important points about my background:

- For the past 11 years, through my employer Epsilon, I have delivered marketing services to Ameristar Casinos, a casino company which was recently acquired by Pinnacle Entertainment. Neither Ameristar nor Pinnacle has ever directly competed with the Region A applicants. Through the work that I have done for Ameristar, I have become very familiar with the casino gaming industry and its pursuit of customers.
- I am a native of Connecticut who lived there when the Foxwoods casino opened and when the Mohegan Sun casino was first proposed.
- I have lived in Massachusetts for more than 20 years, but I have no family or friends in Everett, Revere, or East Boston.
- I have traveled to Mohegan Sun many times to attend music performances.
- I have business degrees from Boston College (BS in Operations Management and Information Systems) and Bentley University (MS in Information Systems).

For the following reasons, I have concluded that the Wynn proposal in Everett is a better choice for Massachusetts than the Mohegan Sun proposal in Revere:

- A primary goal of the casino legislation is to reverse the existing imbalance in which Massachusetts residents generate casino revenue in Connecticut and social costs in Massachusetts. The Gaming Commission should work to maximize casino revenues in Massachusetts and minimize the resulting social costs.
- Mohegan Sun already operates a gigantic, costly facility in Connecticut that is within driving distance of the Region A sites. Mohegan Sun's marketing department will have no incentive at all to redirect existing customers from its Connecticut facility to its Massachusetts facility if the customers live in the southernmost parts of Massachusetts, in Rhode Island, in Connecticut, or in the (by some measures, 20-million-person) New York City area.
- The Wynn casino in Everett will have no geographic limitations to its marketing. The Wynn company's only facility east of Nevada would draw people from the entirety of New England and from the New York City area. Wynn's global reputation for luxury will also generate new trips to the Boston area -- trips that would not otherwise happen -- from wealthy visitors around the world.

- The Revere site (which can be reached with the Boston subway system) and the Mohegan Sun brand (which is not nearly as upscale as the Wynn brand) would maximize social costs in Massachusetts by drawing lower-income individuals to its slot machines and table games. People in this economic category are more inclined to damage their own lifestyles because so little of their income is disposable. Their financial problems are also more likely to kick off a downward spiral involving family issues, substance abuse, and/or criminal activity. Besides increasing social costs, revenue from Mohegan Sun in Revere is much more likely to cannibalize the lucrative Massachusetts State Lottery than revenue from Wynn in Everett.
- An overwhelming 86.5% of Everett voters approved the Wynn casino, while only 63% of Revere voters approved the Mohegan Sun casino.
- The people of East Boston voted with a 56% majority against a casino being located on the Suffolk Downs property that crosses into their community. If they were given the opportunity to vote on the later proposal that shifted the casino to another part of the property and severely limited casino payments to their municipal government, their vote against the proposal would be a landslide.
- The Commonwealth has already done more than enough to prop up the horse racing industry, and it does not need to do any more by favoring the Suffolk Downs racing operation that would serve as Mohegan Sun's landlord, next-door neighbor, and virtual partner. Horse racing is a dying industry that will eventually disappear as a result of either its continually shrinking customer base or legislation similar to our ban on dog racing. The Commonwealth should not be putting any more effort into preserving jobs at Suffok Downs than the effort it put into preserving jobs at Blockbuster Video stores or Borders Books stores in recent years.
- The Suffolk Downs complex in East Boston and Revere is more valuable to Region A communities and the Commonwealth if it is used for other purposes. One example would be the location for an Olympic facility, if Boston chooses to pursue a bid for the Summer Olympics or Winter Olympics. More realistically, the complex would be an obvious site for a new stadium for the New England Revolution soccer team that currently plays at the New England Patriots football stadium in suburban Foxboro. The Kraft family -- the owners of both teams -- would surely be thrilled to relocate the soccer team to a stadium (1) that is not primarily designed for enormous, 8-times-a-year football crowds, (2) that is very close to the region's population center, (3) that is surrounded by citizens and immigrants with heritage in the soccer-loving parts of the world, and (4) that is accessible via the Boston subway system. The ratio of soccer fans to horse racing fans -- in Greater Boston and in the world -- will never stop growing.

I sincerely hope that the Gaming Commission makes the right choice by approving the Wynn casino in Everett.



Sullivan Square – Update to March 26 Comments to the Mass. Gaming Commission

My name is William Lamb. I am Chair of the Charlestown Preservation Society Design Review Committee, for whom I speak today. Since I spoke to you on March 26<sup>th</sup>, I have been further informed about the Wynn Casino proposal in three small-group meetings with members of the Wynn planning team.

The Design Review Committee remains opposed to the selection of Wynn to build a Resort Casino in Everett. As you know, the proposed Casino is dependent on the transportation of the majority of its patrons through Sullivan Square and on Rutherford Avenue in Charlestown. The resulting great increase in traffic will adversely affect the smart growth transit oriented and primarily residential development we have been planning with the City of Boston for well over a decade.

Now, we ask you to consider these four issues.

- 1) We still do not have the traffic Information we have been asking for: This includes up-to-date traffic numbers with delay times and level of service for Sullivan Square intersections, hourly traffic volumes on Rutherford Avenue in Sullivan Square for no-build and build options, and expected benefits of trips mitigation. We need to receive and be able to respond to these numbers which have been promised to us in the upcoming FEIR. We trust that we all will be able to digest them before you make a decision on a casino proposal bordering Boston.
- 2) Sullivan Square modifications prior to casino opening: Wynn has proposed to provide coordinated traffic signals and restriping of ramps and roadways in the Cambridge Street and MBTA station area. These include restriping to create three inbound lanes and one outbound lane on Cambridge Street at the traffic circle. These changes alone will not solve all the anticipated traffic problems at the time of Casino opening. For example, the Main Street and Rutherford Avenue intersections at the traffic circle remain a substantial unresolved problem.
- 3) Long term Sullivan Square and Rutherford Avenue solutions: Wynn calculates that one traffic lane in each direction needs to be added to Rutherford Avenue in the immediate Sullivan Square area for either the surface or the underpass design to function. These lanes will

significantly increase the density of traffic and the difficulty for pedestrians to cross it. They will affect the quality of life in the planned Sullivan Square area.

And these lanes are rekindling pressure on the City of Boston to maintain a Rutherford Avenue underpass through Sullivan Square. Along with other problems created, the underpass would greatly compromise beneficial green space along Rutherford Avenue and development options at the MBTA bus yards adjacent to the Mystic River. We do not want to see the approved surface design abandoned to accommodate casino traffic.

4) Casino Building Design: Apart from its praiseworthy use of the Mystic River, the Wynn project has no apparent beneficial connection with its urban surroundings. The project is not located on a street where it could contribute to the life and economy of the street and neighborhood. It is instead an oversized and isolated building complex with a design that is unrelated to any buildings in the vicinity. Its twenty five story hotel tower rises above the surrounding neighborhood in order to focus on long views of the city. The design of the tower is uninspired. This project does not appear to advance the state of the art in casino design as requested in the MGC request for proposals.

To address some of the architectural issues with the project, we request that the project undergo a public design review process. This casino will dominate Charlestown's skyline to the northwest. We need to see the exterior of the tower with its stone facings and diamond grillwork reviewed. And, we need to know the nature and brightness of lighting proposed for the site, the Wynn logos, and the exterior of building. Will the Commission provide this review?

In summary, the Wynn proposal is grossly inappropriate in size and character for its location. Its transportation impacts damage the newly planned and long-established Charlestown neighborhood at whose edge it is proposed. We urge you to reject it.

On behalf of the City of Somerville, I hereby submit the following written comments relative to the proposal of the applicant Wynn MA, LLC ("Wynn") to build a gaming establishment in Everett, MA.

**Building and Site Design** 

With respect to building and site design, this Commission must evaluate whether the project will "comply with state and local building codes and local ordinances and bylaws, including sections 61 to 62H, inclusive, of chapter 30" MGL c. 23K, s. 15(12). The Commission's regulations make the "permitability" of a proposed casino an important criterion in determining whether to issue a license. *See* 205 CMR 120.01. One significant problem in that

regard for the Wynn Everett proposal is its need for a very considerable variance from the height limitations that apply to buildings in areas that are protected by Chapter 91 of the General Laws, the statute that protects the rights of the public in the Commonwealth's tidelands.

The Wynn Everett casino is proposed for an area on the banks of the Mystic River where the applicable Chapter 91 regulations limit building height to 255 feet. The proposed building is approximately 400 feet tall. To deal with this problem, the City of Everett has adopted a "municipal harbor plan" one of whose variants (which will go into effect only if the Commission awards a license to the Wynn Everett casino) permits a building as tall as 400 feet in the area where the casino tower is proposed. Such a municipal harbor plan has been approved by the Secretary of Energy and Environmental Affairs. Once a plan is approved, the limitations it contains (for building height, as well as for other development parameters such as lot coverage) supersede the limitations in the Chapter 91 regulations.

The Secretary's approval of the Everett Central Waterfront Municipal Harbor Plan is the subject of a legal challenge in a civil action filed by the City of Somerville. See City of Somerville v. Richard K. Sullivan, Jr., in his official capacity as Secretary of the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs, Middlesex Superior Court Docket No. MICV2014-04839-J. Chapter 91's regulatory limits derive ultimately from the Public Trust Doctrine, which reserves for the citizens of the Commonwealth as a whole certain rights in land abutting the state's waters. The courts of the Commonwealth have been the principle guarantors of those rights, see Boston Waterfront Development Co. v. Commonwealth, 378 Mass. 629 (1979), and

they have overturned governmental action (both legislative and executive) when that action unduly interfered with public rights, *see* Moot v. Department of Environmental Protection, 448 Mass. 340 (2007); Beverly Port Marina vs. Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Protection, 84 Mass App Ct 612 (2013); Further Appellate Review denied, 467 Mass. 1104 (February 28, 2014). Somerville's judicial challenge to the dramatic relaxation of height limits necessary to construct the Wynn Everett project raises serious questions about whether the project can be built at all and, if it can, on what schedule.

With respect to clean up of contamination at the site of the proposed Wynn Everett project, the Secretary's Certificate on the DEIR states that, "[t]he DEIR did not provide a detailed assessment of contamination and remediation activities nor did it specifically address previous comments requesting information regarding costs and schedule." DEIR Certificate at 23. (Emphasis added.) And, after an enumeration of the very significant contamination at the site and noting DEP's disagreement with the project proponent about the extent to which the site is contaminating sediments in the Mystic River, the Certificate concludes, on this topic, that "[p]ublic review and understanding of the project, its potential impacts and benefits, would be well served with a more detailed discussion of the [Massachusetts Contingency Plan] process,

remediation plans, associated <u>costs and a schedule for achieving compliance</u>." DEIR Certificate at 24. That "discussion" has not been forthcoming.<sup>2</sup>

The Wynn Everett project has been touted as an enormous benefit because, among other things, it will accomplish the cleanup of a heavily contaminated piece of land. But, as the Secretary's Certificate demonstrates, it is not at all clear how, to what extent, and on what schedule that cleanup will occur. This both raises questions about the asserted benefits of the project and, as is the case with the potential difficulty in permitting such a tall building at the site, it raises questions about the schedule on which the project can be constructed.

Questions about the project's benefits should be especially sharp because of the emphasis that the proponent places on providing public access to the Mystic River and its shoreline. See Wynn Everett DEIR at 8-25. As the Secretary notes, "[t]he DEIR outlined response actions to address contamination . . . for the upland portions of the project area but it does not include any discussion of response actions necessary to achieve a Permanent Solution or Temporary Solution for sediment contamination." DEIR Certificate at 24. Some of the purported benefits of the project occur in river sediments, and all of the areas of public access to the riverfront are adjacent to those sediments. See Wynn Everett DEIR at 8-15. Thus, quite apart from the scheduling uncertainty that stems from the incomplete explanation of the proponent's cleanup plans, it is at

least possible, perhaps likely, that the project will ultimately be unable to deliver on all of its promised benefits.

### Mitigation

As part of its evaluation of gaming license applications, the Commission will consider the quality of surrounding community agreements and the applicant's approach to mitigation in surrounding communities. 205 CMR 119.03(2)(e)5. Wynn expressly declined to name Somerville a Surrounding Community in its RFA-2 application. See Wynn RFA-2 at 5-15-03. After Somerville filed a petition with the Commission, Wynn assented to Somerville's designation as a surrounding community to its proposed gaming establishment. This delay resulted in Somerville requesting a short extension, which Wynn opposed, while stating an intent to continue to negotiate a resolution. Wynn did not accept any of Somerville's requests thereafter to so negotiate. Wynn and Somerville proceeded to arbitration regarding the terms of a surrounding community agreement. Notwithstanding the difference in the parties' respective positions as to what mitigation measures or community impact fee was required, there was serious disagreement about the nature of the identifiable impacts from the Wynn Everett project – which the Commission should be aware of when considering the applicant's approach to mitigation and surrounding communities.

Despite the arbitration decision and subsequent surrounding community agreement pursuant thereto, Somerville maintains there are a number of impacts that Wynn has not agreed to acknowledge and mitigate. These impacts include: traffic at certain intersections not required

to be studied under the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act process (see 205 CMR 119.03(2)(3)7); a loss in restaurant sales valued at approximately \$10,000,000 annually in Somerville and a corresponding loss of \$214,000 annually in Somerville local meals and real property tax revenue (see 205 CMR 119.03(2)(c)); the impact on the availability of affordable housing in Somerville due to rising property values and increased demand arising from the Wynn Everett project (see 205 CMR 119.03(2)(3)9)); and the visual impact of the Wynn Everett tower on Draw 7 Park across the river in Somerville (see 205 CMR 119.03(2)(d)4).

On the last point, the Commission will consider a project's "[c]ompatibility with [its] surroundings..." The manner in which a tower, which Wynn describes as "a dramatic and iconic feature to the Everett skyline and Greater Boston. Designed to be viewed from the nearby highways, waterways, and the Boston skyline, the unique and striking hotel tower...visible from the Mystic River and beyond", located in Everett, where it is out of scale and isolated in its environment, as opposed to downtown Boston or Springfield – areas which currently have buildings of such height – should be strongly weighed in the scoring of this project on compatibility.

While understanding that the decision of a majority of the arbitration panel has determined the terms of a surrounding community agreement, I urge this Commission to consider the dissent of Arbitrator Douglas I. Foy in this proceeding when considering the

applicant's approach to mitigation, the extent to which the surrounding community agreement has in fact provided for appropriate mitigation, and scoring Wynn's application accordingly.<sup>4</sup>

Dear Massachusetts Gaming Commissioners,

If you have ever tried to cross Sullivan Square, you know that the area is treacherous for all users--pedestrians, motorists, buses, bicyclists and the disabled. You also know the importance of the Redesign Plan for Rutherford Ave/Sullivan Square (RA/SS) that our community worked on for years. The plan improves traffic flow, provides far better access to transit for pedestrians, persons with disabilities and bicyclists, adds open space, and makes possible vibrant mixed-use development at Sullivan Square.

I have given you detailed comments on the Wynn Casino transportation plan in my letter of April 10, 2014 to the Commission included with this letter. What I want to say today is simply that if you approve a Casino in Everett you need to make sure our community isn't a "loser" and assure us in the various agreements that:

- Traffic Impacts are mitigated. Any adverse traffic should be mitigated and the
  traffic from the casino should work with the surface street network of the Redesign
  Plan. Particular attention should be given to further ways to reduce peak hour trip
  generation and to improve traffic flow in the vicinity of Main Street and Sullivan
  Square near the Schrafft's Building.
- RA/SS Redesign is funded and the schedule is accelerated. There should be a commitment that the Wynn Casino and the City/ State fund the RA/SS Redesign construction, build the project in phases and accelerate the schedule. The commitment should include that the construction of Phase 1 Sullivan Square start as soon as possible so that the roadway(s) will be in place close to when the Casino opens. Interim improvements should be just that—interim.
- Transit Improvements are made. There should be an agreement with the MBTA to make Orange Line improvements to complement the new orange line cars the MBTA intends to buy. These improvements are track and signal improvements as needed

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the proposed Wynn gaming establishment in Everett.

As a Charlestown homeowner, I am extremely concerned about the impact of the gaming establishment on our small neighborhood, in particular, the expected increase of traffic through Sullivan Square.

The residents of Charlestown have already made their voices heard by agreeing to proposed changes to raise Rutherford Avenue in an effort to reduce traffic volume through Sullivan Square. We all recognize the problems with traffic through Sullivan Square which are echoed in the death of a cyclist just this spring. The Wynn establishment in Everett is absolutely incompatible with the plans to change Sullivan Square; the increase in traffic could not even be handled under the current system according to the presentation by Stantec, and the Wynn proposal makes assumptions about the current capacity which aren't true.

Many of us live in Charlestown, including myself, for quick access to jobs north of the city. As a physician who trained in Boston and now works north of the city, I must often respond to emergencies on nights and weekends. With the increased traffic estimations, I am concerned that I will be cutoff from quick access to 93 North. Increased traffic loads in Sullivan Square will also cut off residents from the new shops at Assembly Square and other shopping centers in Everett as well.

Lastly I am fearful that drivers returning home from the casino, after having a few drinks, will be unable to safely navigate the rotary as it stands now or in the future. This is even more unsafe for residents, especially pedestrians and cyclists.

I strongly urge the members of the commission to take into account the small neighborhood of Charlestown who currently has the most to lose, in quality of life, accessibility, and property value, from the installation of the Wynn establishment.

### Commissioners:

I offer this, not as a technical document but from my personal perspective as a native of Revere and as a driver. I do have education and training in the field so it is not without technical merit. I have a Bachelors of Science Degree from UMass Amherst from the Regional Planning Department and was the Revere Building Department Head under former Mayor Hass for 8 years and a member of the Site Plan Review Committee. Before that I had reviewed, edited and even authored parts of environmental impact statements when I worked for a time in Brooklyn New York.

My comparison is one from "30 Thousand Feet" sort to speak; from a "bird's eye view" and a logical perspective devoid of high price and high sounding technical spin. I believe what I am presenting is eminently obvious to anybody looking at a map and anybody haven driven the routes described for any length of time.

### My Purpose:

To compare and contrast the traffic impacts of both proposals, but even more importantly to me and to my fellow Revere Residents, to make the Commission aware that the Everett Proposal has just as great of a traffic impact <u>if not More</u> to the City of Revere.

Please let me begin by giving a series of descriptions of directions to both developments, I shall start with the routes to the Revere Resort and Casino. I will try not to be tedious.

Attached please find several maps you can follow with hand drawn routes which I describe below:

### Directions to the Revere Resort and Casino (RR&C) from:

### North East - Routes 1-A & 107. South

Rt. 1-A Marblehead, Swampscott, Salem and Lynn down Rt. 1-A South into Revere directly to the RR8C.

Rt.107 South from Danvers, Salem and Lynn down Rt. 107 South into Revere onto Rt.60 directly to Rt. 1-A South directly to the RR&C

### North - Routes 1 and I-95 South

Rt. 1 & I-95 South from New Hampshire & Main; from Salisbury down through Saugus Mass Into Revere onto Rt. 60 East to 1-A South directly to the RR&C.

### North West - Interstate I-93 South

1-93 South from New Hampshire and Dracut though Cambridge onto Rt. 1-A North through the Callahan Tunnel into Revere directly to the RR&C.

### West - Interstate 1-90 East

1-90 East from New York State; Western Mass all the way through Boston through the Ted Williams Tunnel onto 1-A North into Revere directly to the RR&C

### South West and & South & South East Mass

I-95 North & Rt. 24 North & Rt. 3 North from Rhode Island and New Bedford/Fall River and from Cape Cod onto I-93 North onto I-90 East through the Ted Williams Tunnel onto Rt. 1-A North into Revere directly to the RR&C.

### Directions to the Everett Casino (EC) from:

### North East - Routes 1-A & 107. South

Rt. 1-A Marblehead, Swampscott, Salem and Lynn down Rt. 1-A South into Revere EXACTLY THE SAME AS TO THE RR&C TO THIS POINT; except (a) instead of "directly to the RR&C"; continue South on 1-A through the Sumner Tunnel onto a plethora of a mixture of overcrowded and thoroughly confusing local streets and highways onto Rt.99 North OR: (b) as an alternate from 1-A South exit onto the Revere Beach Parkway continuing THROUGH REVERE into Chelsea and Everett to Rt. 99 South.

Rt.107 South from Danvers, Salem and Lynn down Rt. 107 South into Revere onto Rt.60 directly to Rt. 1-A South EXACTLY THE SAME AS TO THE RR&C TO THIS POINT; except (a) instead of "directly to the RR&C": continue South on 1-A through the Sumner Tunnel onto a plethora of a mixture of overcrowded and thoroughly confusing local streets and highways onto Rt.99 North OR: (b) as an alternate from 1-A South exit onto the Revere Beach Parkway continuing THROUGH REVERE into Chelsea and Everett to Rt. 99 South.

### North - Routes 1 and I-95

Rt. 1 & I-95 South from New Hampshire & Main from Salisbury down through Saugus MA. Into Revere EXACTLY THE SAME AS TO THE RR&C TO THIS POINT; except instead of switching onto Rt. 60 East to 1-A

South directly to the RR&C; (a) continue South on 1 over the Mystic River Bridge onto a plethora of a mixture of overcrowded and thoroughly confusing local streets and highways onto Rt.99 North OR: (b) as an alternate from 1 South exit onto Rt. 16 the Revere Beach Parkway continuing **THROUGH REVERE** into Chelsea and Everett to Rt. 99 South.

There is the opportunity to not enter Revere by picking up Rt. 99 directly from Rt. 1 South in Saugus but anyone familiar with traffic conditions would most assuredly avoid this route through the entire length of Broadway Everett due to heavy traffic conditions most times of the day including local School Bus Traffic several times a day and a gauntlet of traffic signals and multiplex intersections. By passing Rt. 99 South at this point and continuing **THROUGH REVERE** on Rt. 1 to pick up Rt. 16 West, the Revere Beach Parkway in Revere to pick up Rt. 99 South in Everett is a much preferred alternative of drivers familiar with local traffic conditions.

### North West - Interstate I-93 South

1-93 South from New Hampshire and Dracut though Cambridge onto a plethora of a mixture of overcrowded and thoroughly confusing local streets and highways

### South West and & South & South East Mass

I-95 North & Rt. 24 North & Rt. 3 North from Rhode Island and New Bedford/Fall River and from Cape Cod onto I-93 North onto a plethora of a mixture of overcrowded and thoroughly confusing local streets and highways onto Rt.99 North

### Please note at a glance two things become eminently obvious:

- 1. IT IS MUCH SIMPLER AND EASIER AND SAFER TO GET TO THE REVERE RESORT AND CASINO: This is obvious by just looking at the brevity and simplicity of the description of Routes from all locations DIRECTLY TO THE ENTRANCE OF THE Revere Resort & Casino as compared to the voluminous descriptions of routes to the proposed Everett Resort and Casino Please further note that I did not include an exact description of how to transverse the local streets and highways from the major routes to get onto. Rt. 99 North from Down Town Boston where the Ted Williams Tunnel, the Sumner Tunnel, The Mystic Bridge and interstates 1-90 and 1-93 enter Boston. TO describe the switch to the exact route to the front door of the Everett site would have been even more voluminous by comparison. I call it the "NIGHT MARE SENARIO"!
- 2. From the North and North East the routes to the EVERETT site are EXACLTY THE SAME! This means that either location will draw all traffic from the North and North East through Revere so the traffic impact of both proposals are IDENTICAL at this point with one major exception; The Revere Resort and Casino proposes to spend millions of dollars in highway and local street and infrastructure improvements to mitigate their impact on Revere.

The EVERETT proposal proposes to spend NOTHNG to mitigate any traffic impacts of their proposal; nothing in Revere and more importantly to the Commonwealth and the City of Boston, nothing anywhere else despite the undeniable fact that their

development no matter how you spin it will make an already nightmarish congested urban area far WORSE! It epitomizes the ole Main proverb; "Ya Can't Get There From Heah"!

My purpose has been to demonstrate to the Commission that the Revere Resort and Casino proposal makes far more sense and has much less of an impact to the City of Revere, the Commonwealth, and the City of Boston than does the Everett proposal; and <u>for Revere the impact of the Everett Proposal is EXACTLY THE SAME OR WORSE with no mitigation proposed whatsoever. 

Wynn has met five times with select small groups about the impact of casino traffic on Charlestown, and in particular the implications for plans to improve Rutherford Avenue and Sullivan Square that they have been working on for fifteen years. These meetings left people feeling empty handed with regard to Wynn's intentions.

Wynn has not sought the opinions of other Charlestown residents. To the contrary, they did agree to a "public" meeting in Charlestown on May 28<sup>th</sup>, their agreement being predicated on <u>not using local news</u> sources to publicize this meeting.

Wynn cannot justify its claim to be informed about local concerns when it comes to Charlestown. I recently spent three days collecting signatures for a petition to place a vote on casinos on the November ballot. I can honestly say that almost 90% of the people I spoke with did sign the petition, and their first concerns were for the negative social impacts of a nearby casino, not traffic.

Transportation is a significant consideration when a huge, heavily trafficked development is contemplated for a dense community. In fact, Governor Deval Patrick remarked recently on the Jim Braude and Margery Eagen radio show that he could not see putting a casino in the middle of a city. That makes good sense, and you would find widespread agreement in Charlestown. Traffic is a concern, but it certainly does not represent all that concerns the people of Charlestown.

To Mr. Crosby and the Mass Gaming Commission,

By now you have certainly heard from countless Somerville residents regarding the proposed Everett casino. You have no doubt heard concerns about environmental issues, traffic, crime, and a lack of support for casinos in general. I share all of these concerns, and greatly fear the detrimental effects of a casino so close to Somerville. However, as the ward 1 alderman, whose district is right across the river from the proposed casino, I have another fear that is being overlooked. That concern is the economic impact the casino will have on our newly burgeoning East Somerville business districts.

It took nearly 50 years for our work at Assembly Square to finally come to fruition. Businesses are only now opening in what has been heralded as the biggest development on the eastern seaboard. We are also in the midst of a complete renovation of lower Broadway, which promises to turn East Somerville into a hot destination for restaurants and social events. My neighborhood fought for generations to finally get the financial respect it deserves. Now casino executives from Las Vegas arbitrarily picked a contaminated Monsanto site to drop a towering structure that will siphon all the expected revenue from our efforts.

Dear Chair Crosby and Massachusetts Gaming Commissioners,

This month there were several bad accidents in the Sullivan Square area, including the death of a bicyclist. These accidents were not surprising. The streets in Sullivan Square are treacherous for walkers, bikers and cars and access to the MBTA Transit and Bus Station is unsafe.

For the past four years many of my Charlestown neighbors and I have devoted countless volunteer hours to help the City of Boston develop a plan for Rutherford Ave./Sullivan Square that makes our community more transit, pedestrian and bicycle friendly and that improves the traffic flow. The plan will create a vibrant transit-oriented mixed-use development in Sullivan Square and far safer and more attractive access to the MBTA.

I appreciate that the Wynn proposal will create jobs, generate tax revenues, remediate this contaminated site and activate the Mystic River waterfront. Nevertheless, the proposed development will generate a high volume of traffic that poses a potentially significant adverse impact to our Charlestown community, particularly at Sullivan Square and along Rutherford Ave. The traffic plan proposed by Wynn Casino does not mitigate sufficiently the impact and greater mitigation is required. Specific suggestions for that mitigation are:

- 1) Better community engagement by Wynn Casino and the City so that the community has a clearer understanding of the traffic impacts and the mitigation. As there are changes to the plan and to the mitigation the community should be informed. .
- 2. Agreement on the trip generation. The trip generation for the casino should be carefully reviewed with respect to the similarity/or dissimilarity of the two casinos used as the "prototype" and to the appropriateness for excluding the Sugarhouse Casino. Trip generation numbers agreed to by Wynn Casino, the City and State should be developed
- 3) A second access to the site and better distribution of the traffic. The mitigation should include consideration of a roadway that connects to Gateway Plaza and Mystic View

Road. This would redistribute some of the traffic that now solely enters and exits to Lower Broadway, reduce congestion at the entrance and could reduce the traffic through Charlestown. The City of Boston's traffic consultant for this project should be involved in that analysis. There should also be a congestion management plan that provides for real time management of traffic at the access points and on the nearby roads.

- 4) More car sharing, alternative modes and less parking. The mitigation should include a far more robust program to serve the site by sustainable alternative transportation modes. The Wynn team indicated that Wynn runs a first class resort/casino. Today a first class resort/casino in a city location requires a first class transportation plan that includes an emphasis on alternative transportation modes. Wynn Casino, working with MAPC, the State and Cities of Boston and Everett, can develop a far more imaginative plan. Elements of that plan should include a) goals that the Wynn Casino agrees to achieve, b) a Transportation Management Association that has representation not only from Wynn and Everett but from Boston, the other affected communities and the State, c) a pricing policy. appropriate parking garage sizing and management policies for the patron garage and the employee garages that encourages public transportation, discourages single-occupancy vehicles and encourages carpooling and d) a commitment to bus and subway service and efficiency improvements by the State. There should also be annual monitoring and an annual public report for a 10-year period with the option for extension. In addition the City of Everett should commit to a traffic management plan in Everett that reduces the traffic going to Sullivan Square.
- 5). Funding for RA/SS Redesign construction. The mitigation should include that Wynn Casino and the State both agree to fund the RA/SS construction. It also should include that the design and subsequent construction start as soon as possible so that the roadway(s) will be in place close to the opening date of the Wynn Casino. It is unacceptable to have the new Wynn Casino built with the existing roadway configuration in Charlestown.
- 6) Co-operation between Wynn Casino, the Cities of Boston and Everett, the State and the affected communities. Projects of this magnitude can only serve well all their stakeholders if there is trust and co-operation. Our Charlestown community will only get a traffic plan that works in our neighborhood if that trust and co-operation happens.

I hope someday to be able to walk safely with my grandchildren to Sullivan Square, ride the orange line train easily downtown and back, have lunch at Sullivan Square and watch my grandsons play along the Mystic River. Your thoughtful decisions on this project will protect our citizens and the environment and help make our dreams happen. Thank you!

As a leading steward of Boston's oldest neighborhood, the Charlestown Preservation Society proudly exists to preserve the architectural heritage and quality of life here in Charlestown. I, Nicholas Kraman, am its current president and a neighborhood resident. CPS appreciates this opportunity to comment on and bring to the Commission's attention a few of the more relevant reasons why we urge denial of the Wynn proposal and The City of Everett to construct the Wynn casino.

Since 1967, our Society has successfully sought to salvage a once blighted place and offer Charlestown a path spotlighting our neighborhood as a restored destination of historical significance and beauty. Having retained pride-of-place of our beloved community, we see the Wynn|Everett proposal as a threat to our long-standing endeavor and a choice that turns away from that path. From a Charlestown preservation perspective, the Casino bid is recognized as a clear hazard to our quality of life. How we live and what we are able to offer posterity, especially to our very own children, as a way of life, might best be summarized as the valuable heritage we shall pass on to them. To a profound extent, the proposal you are evaluating interferes with contributions of preservation work that spans generations. This diversion will be the ruin of Charlestown.

As our Design Review Committee has already commented, this proposal must account for insufficient material submitted, or the lack there of which should leave the aim ineligible for further consideration as it fails to meet the specified criteria requirements. Also, since the plan is found to be neglecting a neighborly sense of civic responsibility, we request that the Gaming Commission invite the Historical Commission to comment on this proposal. Relating to the intrusive enormity of the scheme, we additionally encourage that the Gaming Commission understand the proposal as an ambition that will overburden this entire area, upsetting a delicate balance currently in place. Our view of the casino is that, as a facility, it utterly fails to recognize itself in the context of its surroundings. What is proposed is both an imposition and unnecessary risk to our historic peninsula and frankly, to much for a fragile place like Charlestown to bear. The building itself is anticipated to adopt a design that purposely avoids addressing the nature and cultural character of our local heritage. Alienated through this process, we have been left incapable of gathering any sense of how this ambition is of five-star caliber or how it has been held to any 'higher standard'. Additionally, the proposal team has failed to comply timely with the Commission's expectations and has rendered their DEIR, greatly inadequate.

More specifically, traffic should be the leading cause of concern for the Commission. With low estimates of roughly two-thirds of the Casino traffic flowing through Charlestown, it is the key issue that exposes the immediate project flaws. The transportation objectives outlined by the casino proposal fail to integrate the anticipated future of Sullivan Square already in play. The Everett proposal makes no attempt to conform to Charlestown priorities. As our arterial evacuation route, emergency-services are concerned about a plausible solution, and as Charlestown residents, we echo this concern strongly.

The casino is positioned to disrupt our enjoyment and use of precious existing open-space. The planning, from the new Sullivan Square to the Alford Bridge, is recognized by Charlestown as a recovered open area. It is, through the Boston Redevelopment Authority, evaluating how to approach the reformation of this invaluable greenway. The thoroughfare's future use has been public conversation advancing by a community-driven effort. Also, in Ryan Park, along the Mystic River, our children are encouraged to spend their recreational time. Here, they enjoy league baseball and so forth. However, with a gambling monolith proposed as the children's new backstop, its looming presence shall arrive at their cost, as we sit in gridlock staring at it too.

Either stated implicitly, or barely sufficient, within the DEIR, upon recognizing these significant problems with traffic and open-space, there remains extensive reading left difficult to fully interpret. Ultimately, the location's intended land-use requires a more extensive study - with critical issues not relegated to mere appendixes. The information provided regarding the project-site remediation lacks the necessary clarity to help readers grasp quantities, measures, and costs of direct concern. Looking past an underassessment of normal environmental concerns, or more directly at the attempt here to transpose unleashed-toxins for gambling, we feel this is clearly an unwelcome measure of risk-taking that our community should avoid. CPS has worked too hard since 1967 to preserve the neighborhood to see valued residents leave and families deterred to move here and occupy our historic houses all because of a gambling concern.

With all this hoisted upon us and pitted against Wynn's tower-casino, our hope is for you to deny the proposal, rather then enshrine it in the many rearview mirrors of gamblers passing through Charlestown. We sincerely implore the Massachusetts Gaming Commission to spare our historic neighborhood with its unique skyline of Bunker and Breeds Hills and nurture our quality of life with a decision to reject the scheme in Everett.

The Charlestown Preservation Society respectfully thanks the Gaming Commission for it's time and interest toward these remarks.

Dear Members of the Massachusetts Gaming Commission,

My name is Charlotte Hamill, and I am resident of Charlestown. I am writing to express my concerns about the Wynn project in Everett.

To start, I'd like to say that I desperately wanted to like this project. I adore Wynn's towers in Las Vegas. I think he does a wonderful job creating beautiful spaces and that his vision for the old chemical site and Mystic River are fantastic.

I just wish he had thought beyond the boundaries of the property. The traffic in Sullivan Square is unbearable. I encourage you all (and I would encourage Mr Wynn as well) to go for a drive through the area around 5pm on a weeknight. Or 6pm on a weeknight. I have experienced the traffic in that area first hand; and it was pretty astonishing. And it is a bottleneck that the vast majority of Wynn's visitors will have to go through.

Furthermore, a lot of work has been done by many organizations to re-imagine this area and the New Rutherford corridor. New Rutherford - an eight-lane monstrosity that is a hold over from the Big Dig - is meant to be transformed into a more modest four lane road with an extension of the greenway. This development is really important to a lot of people; and unfortunately, I see Wynn's plan as a barrier to the implementation of this vision.

I am a Harvard graduate with a degree in Applied Mathematics, but it does not take that level of education to realize that there is no way his visitors will not affect traffic. Furthermore, I would think that failure to address this issue properly is detrimental to business plan. I work in a hedge fund in the city, and have a strong background in commercial real estate. In my experience - accessibility makes a big difference. My husband and I have a decent disposable income. If we could easily head up to his property on a Thursday night for a fancy dinner; we would absolutely do it (remember - I wanted to like this property). But if the traffic is as bad as it is now (without any other casino goers), we simply won't bother. And we live 2 miles away. I think it would have been to Wynn's benefit to convince Charlestown his casino was worthy of being just across the river. We don't want any traffic - and I can't imagine he does either.

So it is with a twinge of sadness that I must say I do not support the Wynn project. Not in its current form. The team at Wynn needs to think beyond the borders of their property and give a good answer as to how they plan to handle traffic issues. Maybe they've got a fantastic plan they've shared with you; but nothing that I have seen has been very impressive.

I'm also yet to see any support for Wynn for the plans to redevelop Sullivan Square and New Rutherford, to which many people have been very dedicated. If his casino derails those plans - he will never get my patronage, and I imagine many other Charlestown residents would feel the same. Angering your increasingly wealthy neighbors does not seem like a good business plan to me.

It is both for the health of my home, Charlestown, and the prospective health of a casino in Massachusetts that I recommend you reject Wynn's proposal unless he comes up with a better answer to the question of traffic (and honestly - I really hope he does)

Hi! I'm a condo owner on Auburn St. in Charlestown and I was a renter in Charlestown from 2000-2011.

To move the conversation between Wynn and the communities around Everett in a positive direction I urge the Wynn team to share their thoughts on how they can contribute to improving the infrastructure that's needed to support the number of customers they hope to attract. The Wynn casino won't hit its revenue goals if all of its customers are sitting in traffic, and I do think that's a likely outcome unless a modern traffic plan is drawn up.

Boston hasn't maintained/improved Sullivan Square or the MBTA to the standards that any of us expect from a modern world-class city; this isn't anyone's fault but our city/state government's and our own for not pushing for it and not getting fully engaged in problem-solving. However, if Wynn wants to insert an operation that will create 30-35K of daily vehicle trips within this already strained system I think they should invest in the infrastructure improvements that'll create a customer experience worthy of their brand. I fully applaud the idea of water transportation to/from the casino and suggest that a T stop be created and highway access be improved so that cars can get to the casino straight from 93. Let's brainstorm some non-automobile modes of transportation, integrate them into the overall design up front, and make them economically appealing. I like Charlestown's raised boulevard idea for the future of Rutherford Ave. and think we should keep that and add speed bumps, traffic lights, or whatever else it takes to make that an unappealing way to make a through-trip from the city to the casino.

I think Boston and Wynn should stop pretending that Everett is far away from Boston. The communities within a 5-mi radius will all be directly affected by the casino due to the densely packed nature of this area. The casino will take advantage of transportation systems that the taxpayers of Boston and MA have paid for. But our infrastructure investments have not even kept up with what the area currently needs in terms of traffic and commuting throughput, let alone if there's a casino on our doorstep in the near future. I do think the Wynn casino can be seen as a positive addition to the Boston area if Wynn is required to submit some realistic transportation options for the Boston area communities to review. We have authorized casinos to operate in the state but that needs to be on terms that preserve (or improve) our quality of life.

I think Charlestown, if not Boston, should be recognized as a host community for the Wynn casino in Everett. There should not be a casino in Everett, period, without a clear picture of how people (including me) would get to it without having to sign up for a 3 hr. traffic jam. For me, the ideal conclusion to this casino debate is that we create a partnership between Wynn and the surrounding communities to collaborate on how to bring a casino to Everett while in the process fixing some of the transportation bottlenecks that we know are going to become frustrating for all of us, including Wynn.

## Dear Mass Gaming Commission:

I unfortunately was not able to attend the meeting earlier this week at the Convention Center - but was with many who did come earlier in the week.

I have lived in Charlestown for 15 years - this is my adult home. We are worried to say the least - as we feel we have almost no control over what will happen if the Wynn Casino comes to Everett. No doubt Steve Wynn has quite the reputation when it comes to Casinos.

My personal feeling towards all of this is #1 - I wish the law would get repealed. I realize it is an opportunity for the Commonwealth to get some of the share of the dollars going toward this type of entertainment...but I feel if feeds on the people who are most vulnerable. So I am not a fan to begin with.

#2 - IF we have to have Casino's - do we really need to put them in Boston (adjacent to) - where there is so much congestion already. There are many other things for people to come to Boston for - if they really want to go gambling - couldn't we use this as an opportunity to take a community that would benefit even more and has less opportunities???

You might say - that both East Boston and Everett could benefit from these Casino's - and yes, that is true - but to get there other communities are affected as well - and we need to be able to have a voice.

Mr. Wynn's comments that he will put \$30M toward infrastructure costs is almost laughable. I am an architect and have been involved in construction projects for over 20 years - \$30M is a drop in the bucket for the kind of infrastructure costs that are needed.

Having been a part of the dialogue about Rutherford avenue and Sullivan Square for several years - all the work we have done would be irrelevant if the Casino comes to Everett. If it is the best place to put it - ok, we just have plans - but it is what the additional Casino traffic and related development would do to the nature of our community that is one of my biggest concerns. In 15 years, the # 1 change in Charlestown, has been the improvement of schools and the subsequent rooting of families. Many families are making the choice to live here and raise their children vs. the suburban flight that was more prevalent when I first moved to Charlestown.

This longer term look for the residents has absolutely changed the neighborhood. This I fear would be reversed with a Casino and subsequent development looming over the river.

It will take a project of this scale and upside potential for the developer to clean up the land and make the necessary changes - but I am concerned that the communities that will most directly be affected do not have a voice. Most of the traffic will come from 93 - there is no entrance to 93 south at that location - so how will the cars get out...? The traffic is a mess during peak times as it is now for traffic coming off of both north and south bound 93. The Alfred Street Bridge which has been under construction for seemingly ever - will not meet the load it will need to! - And really - what will happen to Sullivan Square? - Our plans - though the Mayor says nothing will change - will have to change. We need to be able to have a voice in what happens to Sullivan Square and Rutherford - both access points to an Everett development.

I realize of course that the improvements to both of these areas could happen faster because of such a development, we need to lead that process, not be led by a developer with deep pockets and contacts - allowing him to get what he wants - and we have to live with it.

Again, my first personal choice, is no casinos. 2nd choice is not casinos in the Boston area - and 3rd - clearly that it is not here - but honestly getting to East Boston - has other issues too... If we are stuck with it - we need to have a voice to ensure that our community is not sacrificed - and my fear is that there will be plenty of "sales pitches" now - but as soon as you award the license - it will be a different story....it will be all about the race to build. The proposed images of the architecture itself has no sense of place. It looks like it was taken off the strip in Las Vegas and dropped in Everett. I hope that this is an early schematic - and more attention will be paid to architecture if this is the chosen site.

The people and tax payers of Boston need to be a part of this conversation as it will very much affect the quality of our lives. I am not worried about the short term of construction, but the longer impact. As a resident of Boston's oldest neighborhood, we need to protect the historic character that makes it a destination for visitors and our home.

I look further to additional dialogue and trust that you will take all our voices into consideration. All my best,

While I am quite passionately OPPOSED to a casino anywhere in Massachusetts and, especially, in a location that adds so significantly to the traffic problems in and around Charlestown, I was unable to attend a 4pm meeting.

I have three young children and am a homeowner in Charlestown where I have lived for the past 5.5 years. My family is committed to Boston and Charlestown and hope to be long-time residents. Whatever happens with the casino development, it is imperative that the surrounding communities, especially Somerville and Charlestown, have the opportunity to provide input into any development of this site. I am writing as a resident of Charlestown and parent of three young children to express my opposition to the Wynn casino proposal in its current form. I have lived in Charlestown for the past eight years and am committed to raising my family here. During my time here, I have seen more and more families who are also choosing to stay and raise their families in Charlestown because, in part, of its walkability, easy access to other parts of the city, and strong community.

The Wynn casino, as currently proposed, will hurt the Charlestown community in several important ways.

The most troubling impact on our community is the projected increase in traffic through Charlestown, especially through Sullivan Square and Rutherford Avenue. At this point, Wynn has been silent as to how this area will accommodate the huge increase in traffic generated by their casino. As I am sure you are aware, the community has just concluded a multi-year process to redesign Sullivan Square and Rutherford Avenue to better integrate them with the existing community. I cannot see how the redesign will survive the addition of 1,000 cars an hour, and Wynn's suggestion that they will figure it out once they have the license in hand is far from reassuring.

Gardens for Charlestown, Inc. (GFC) is a volunteer community garden in Charlestown, MA that has been in continuous operation for 37 years, formed by a committed group of residents in 1976 for the purpose of promoting community pride and gardening, and to encourage the beautification of Charlestown. The garden is located at the intersection of Main and Bunker Hill Streets in Charlestown adjacent to Sullivan Square. We are including two photographs with this letter to illustrate the appearance of the location 'before' and 'after' the development of the garden.

We have two serious concerns about the potential environmental impacts of the Wynn Casino project and associated negative health impacts on our community garden and its patrons. Our first concern is the increase in traffic that will be using the local streets of Charlestown and the Sullivan Square area immediately adjacent to our garden. According to one expert opinion by a City of Boston consultant, there will be significant queues of idling vehicles along the streets which border the garden; this will result in an increased amount of pollutants emitted into the air. No mitigation measures have been presented to ameliorate this condition.

Our second concern is the significant amount of contaminated soils that will be transported off the site during the construction of the Wynn project. If these soils are transported over local roads there are potentially significant negative impacts from the release of noxious chemicals into the air and ultimately impacting the soil of the community garden. Many of our gardeners use their garden plots to grow vegetables for their family's consumption. There is the potential for the GFC to become unusable for such purposes due to the impacts of the Wynn project.

The GFC is used not only by participating gardeners but by local residents as a urban oasis, a park-like place to relax and enjoy the atmosphere of a healthy green space in the city. We urge you to take these concerns under consideration as you review the appropriateness of situating the Wynn Casino in the vicinity of the Charlestown neighborhood without having received an effective mitigation plan from the proponent to address these important health and environment issues.





I regret that I wasn't able to attend the hearing today but I do want to make you aware of my deep concern over the prospect of a casino going into Everett. I have lived in Charlestown since 1990, during which time I have seen it go through a wonderful transformation with parks being added, people taking pride in where they live by investing in their homes and hundreds of families move to the city to raise their children. We love the historical nature of our town so you can appreciate how appalling it is to try to envision what life would look like with a casino in our backyard!!

As you are probably already aware, traffic is a huge issue in Charlestown, which lacks adequate infrastructure to accommodate traffic as it exists today. There was a lot of input and time spent on the new surface option for Rutherford Avenue, and this will be jeopardized by the casino project.
- Health issues:
  - Dust leftover from trucks carrying dirt laced with arsenic, lead and petroleum hydrocarbons from years of sulfur manufacturing on what was once a Monsanto chemical site would likely blow from west to east toward Boston.
  - The air pollution from all the extra traffic will have a significant impact on asthma, which is already above the state average in Charlestown.
- The inevitable collateral issues that accompany gambling including prostitution, excessive drinking, drug use and theft.
- The impact of all of the above issues on property values, but more importantly, on the desire of current residents and families to remain here and continue to improve our community.

I am very active in my community and in local politics and will vote against the urban casinos and politicians that support them. I hope that you will listen to my input and the input of the many others in my neighborhood with the same concerns.

Thank you very much for holding this hearing (on March 26, 2014) at which I may or may not get a chance to speak. My name is Lynne Levesque, I am a resident of Charlestown, specifically on Austin Street and two blocks from Rutherford Avenue. I frequently use the T and although I believe that age is a figment of the imagination, my birth certificate says I qualify as a senior citizen, even as "elderly."

My concerns with the Wynn Proposal are several:

- 1. Traffic and Pollution. There is already plenty of dirt and pollution from cars on Austin Street and Rutherford Avenue traffic that permeates my home and the air we all breathe in Charlestown. The proponents of the Wynn casino themselves state that there will be a significant increase in traffic going through Charlestown. They project that at least 60% of the traffic going to the casino will go through Charlestown. Such a huge increase in cars, buses and trucks trying to go through Charlestown or being backed up and emitting noxious fumes and pollutants will not only increase the many times I have to clean my condo, but also affect the quality of air and the environment that I and all the other residents of Charlestown share. We already have a high level of asthma in Charlestown, and this traffic increase will only make it worse.
- 2. Rutherford Avenue and Sullivan Square Redesign. Talk of the Rutherford Avenue and Sullivan Square redesign has been percolating ever since I moved into Charlestown 16 years ago. A redesign of both areas, which has had tremendous community input, now appears to be much closer to reality. I am particularly concerned about the Rutherford Avenue redesign, since the proposal includes 50 additional feet of grass and trees that would block traffic pollution and improve the quality of air. It would also make the crossing to the T which is now often quite tricky, much safer and would make Charlestown truly a neighborhood. The Wynn proposal and its increase in traffic will most likely jeopardize these designs and I believe would set the timetable back several years. And from everything I have read and heard, Wynn expects the Commonwealth to pay for all major improvements to Sullivan Square and the Rutherford Avenue corridor. I can't figure out first, how this expectation! is acceptable to the taxpayers of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and secondly, how the revenue stream that they propose for funding such work would fit into anyone's construction schedule.
- 3. Impact on Charlestown Businesses. For several years I was involved in efforts to bring more retail businesses to Charlestown. Progress has been slow, but there is progress. To date, I have seen or heard nothing about how the Wynn proposal would impact our fledgling businesses and, more importantly, how the Wynn representatives would help mitigate any negative impact.
- 4. Lack of information. On several occasions, I have asked for a list of benefits to Charlestown from the Everett major who claims in the Charlestown Patriot Bridge that the proposal is a Win for All and from the Wynn folks with their WynnForAll advertisements, website and Facebook page. I have received nothing in return. The City of Boston has also asked for responses to their many major concerns re air quality, traffic, and construction plans. As far as I know, they also have received nothing in return. I can only assume: 1) there are no satisfactory responses and no benefits to make this a win for Charlestown, or 2) they just don't care about us! Neither response is acceptable in my opinion.

I just read on line that there is a hearing this afternoon on the Wynn Casino with the Gaming Commission. Since the notice was so short I am unable to attend.

However, I felt it critical to let you know that I am opposed to the Wynn Casino in Everett in any form, and my reasons.

1. I live in Charlestown. The estimates of traffic going to the Wynn Casino are that over 60% of the traffic going to the Wynn Casino will go thru Sullivan Sq. in Charlestown.

As things stand now, most of the residents in Charlestown stay away from Sullivan Sq. whenever possible. The morning and afternoon traffic is horrendous. There is only one bridge into the area of the casino thru Sullivan Square. It is continually backed up with traffic.

3. Everett never did anything to include Charlestown in the discussions about the proposed Casino. Now they are starting to advertise in our local paper. The Charlestown/Boston community should have been part of the discussion from the start with Wynn.

Where was our Mayor – getting ready to take a job at BU and on the Board of various other businesses. He lives in Roslindale and doesn't have to deal with the traffic that we do.

My sister and I actually tried one Friday evening to cross Rutherford Avenue to go to East Boston for dinner at 4:45. We could not get across Rutherford Avenue because it was completely jammed up with traffic that wasn't moving.

4. There is a whole new large shopping and residential complex opening in Somerville in May of this year at Assembly Square. Again, the traffic has to go thru Sullivan Square.

For all of these reasons, I think the Wynn Casino should be rejected by the Massachusetts Gaming Commission.

#### Dear Commissioners;

We the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) write to oppose the Wynn/Everett casino project as currently proposed. Since 1987 as designated by the Mayor of Boston, our organization has worked with the citizens of Charlestown and government agencies on issues affecting our community including real estate development, the environment, traffic, and quality of life concerns. The majority of our members are elected by Charlestown residents with the remainder representing local non-profit organizations active in civic affairs. It is imperative that our constituents' voices be heard in this proposed development, which is within a mile of our neighborhood. The proposed hotel and casino resort severely impacts our Sullivan Square access, increasing vehicular traffic by more than 14,500 trips daily, raises serious environmental issues, and negatively affects our safety and quality of life.

We, along with the City of Boston and other neighborhood advocacy groups, have presented our concerns to the developer with no acceptable response to date. The following issues have been largely ignored by Wynn Resort.

#### **Traffic Concerns**

Charlestown is a peninsula with only three points of access: south at City Square and the North Washington Street Bridge to Boston, west at Austin Street and the Gilmore Bridge to Cambridge, and north at Sullivan Square to Cambridge, Somerville, and the Alford Street Bridge to Everett. Charlestown is a major corridor for commuters from Boston and Cambridge who access routes I-95, I-93, and Mass-99. There is currently significant gridlock at connecting intersections, especially Sullivan Square. Our community has-worked since 1990 to address these traffic impacts as they relate to the Central Artery North and the Central Artery/Tunnel projects. We have spent the last four years specifically redesigning our through roadways and the three access points, with major proposals for changes in Sullivan Square. Our goal has been to reclaim land that has been previously dedicated to traffic islands, parking lots, and wasteland. Our plan is to disperse traffic and recover developable parcels in the community for housing, businesses and recreation.

Addition of a casino resort in the adjacent town of Everett with over 50% of its customers passing through our community via Sullivan Square and the Alford Street Bridge was not in our plans. Also, our carefully designed improvements along this route are only partially funded and will not be completed for many years, out of phase with the proposed casino development. Representatives of the

Wynn Resort have responded by saying that the added traffic will have "minimal" impact and the state can address our traffic concerns when they arise. In response to Wynn's Draft Environmental Impact Review (DEIR), the City of Boston outlined several inaccuracies and misjudgments of traffic volume and overall impact, especially with respect to Sullivan Square and Rutherford Avenue. We know from long experience that backups of traffic at Sullivan Square result in vehicle travel through the neighborhoods and more congestion at our other two access points creating more traffic problems with the unplanned and increased use of the traffic corridor as the casino is built and then becomes fully operational.

#### **Environmental Impacts**

On February 10, 2014, the CNC sent a letter to the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection in response to the DEIR presented by Wynn Resorts. Again, representatives from the City of Boston cited there is no adequate roadway or public transit system to support this project. Residents and businesses of Charlestown would be greatly impacted by exhaust fumes associated with increased and delayed traffic. With investment of over one billion dollars, this is a huge undertaking and in our letter we urged that much more dialog was needed with all stakeholders to promote informed decision making for a project with such significant ramifications. We have been all but ignored.

There will be at least a 13% increase in air pollutants from cars and other traffic traveling to and from the casino through Charlestown and passing Ryan Field, the largest green space used continuously in our area. Extra traffic will make it difficult to access, exposing children daily to exhaust, dust, and dirt from heavier and more delayed traffic.

Although Wynn development proposes the benefits of their cleanup of the contaminated site in Everett, they have not produced adequate plans on how that will occur. Their officials have admitted that 120,000 cubic yards of toxic fill will be transported away from the site over three years, but the routes of waste removal have not been-identified. From a traffic perspective, this additional trucking is unacceptable. This route currently accommodates wind turbine blade transport and large automobile transporters. Trucks spilling their waste, potentially spreading contaminated materials onto our streets, the Mystic River and the tidal waters of the inner harbor is equally unacceptable. Much has been done to recover these waterways from industrial waste, and we do not feel confident that our concerns for the future have been taken seriously.

#### **Public Health and Safety**

Delayed ambulance, police and fire response due to traffic flow failure is a perpetual concern of our community. Additionally, state and local authorities have designated Route 99 from Rutherford Avenue to Sullivan Square through Charlestown to Everett as the Metropolitan Boston Evacuation Route. With a proposed casino located on Route 99, it appears that these traffic and safety concerns have been completely ignored. Our public health and safety would be further compromised by increased traffic.

#### Conclusion

Charlestown will be impacted by both the construction and operation of the Wynn casino as much if not more than the host city, Everett, yet the developers have not acknowledged or addressed our concerns. Many in our community who were originally in support of the casino have reconsidered their position. Charlestown is a vibrant, largely-residential, family-oriented and densely populated neighborhood of about 16,000 residents. We have a long and active history and are dedicated to maintaining the advances we have made in recent years improving infrastructure, reducing pollution, and creating a livable community. Discussions with Wynn are, at the very least, incomplete. Construction impacts have been ignored. Potential mitigation plans are non-existent. Road widening and traffic light adjustments are not the answer to the progressively degrading quality of life produced

by the construction and operation of this casino. Therefore, the CNC does NOT support construction or operation of a casino in Everett.


