everybody. Today is Thursday, January 28, 2016. This is a public hearing before the Massachusetts Gaming Commission. I'm Chairman Stephen Crosby representing the Commission today. Also present are Commissioners Gayle Cameron at the end, Lloyd Macdonald, Bruce Stebbins at the end and Commissioner Enrique Zuniga.

This hearing is being convened pursuant to our regulation 205 CMR 118.04. We are here today to accept public comments from members of the surrounding communities regarding the Mass Gaming and Entertainment application for a Category 1 gaming license in Brockton, Mass.

Just for the record, this is not a hearing which is mandated by our law, by statute. There is a hearing that will be held in the potential host community, in this case in Brockton that is mandated by law. But we felt that there should be an extra opportunity

for folks from the surrounding communities to talk to us about this issue if they so chose. So, that's why we've scheduled a second public hearing.

Before we begin, the Commission would like to thank you all for being here today. This is a public hearing and it's critically important for you, the public, to be a part of the process to ensure that the Commission achieves the best results possible.

The purpose of this public hearing is to offer any interested person or group an opportunity to comment on the gaming license application. We also get a great many comments in writing, all of which are circulated to all of the Commissioners. I think we've got about 60 communications from the public so far. And we take all of that as seriously as we do the in-person testimony.

This is not a question-and-answer period or a debate. Once we begin, anybody who wishes to comment may come forward when called and be recognized by the Commission. We will be taking speakers by name off the sign-up

sheet, which I have a copy of so far. If other speakers want to sign up, there is a sign-up sheet in back where you can get on the list.

After you are called up and recognized by me, you can proceed to offer your comment. In order to use the available time efficiently, the Commission asks that the speakers limit their comments to three minutes. You'll see there is a clock down here to my left that will give you a heads up. When it goes off, we will ask you to stop at the three-minute level.

The Commission requests that all speakers identify themselves prior to commenting. Please be sure to keep your voices up as this hearing is being recorded.

With that we will now open up the floor for public comment. I have a list of seven speakers who have signed up in front of me. We routinely recognize elected officials to speak first if we have that opportunity. We have an Alex Bezanson who is a selectman from Abington. And if Mr. Bezanson is here, you're welcome to come forward. After that Larry

Curtis and Reverend Jill Wiley, you all could 2 come forward and take a seat so you don't have 3 to walk so far when we get ready to recognize you, Larry Curtis, Reverend Wiley, Richard Reid will be the next three speakers.

MR. BEZANSON: Thank you, Commissioners. First of all, I am in favor of this casino proposal.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Please identify yourself.

MR. BANZANSON: My name is Alex And I am a selectman in the town of Bezanson. Abington. In January 2015 prior to me being elected selectman, I heard there was a possibility of a casino coming to Brockton. Ι contacted Mass. Gaming to learn about the process of becoming a designated surrounding community.

I knew then that this was something great, something that would be good for Brockton and something that would be good for the surrounding towns.

Abington is a community with only about 11 percent industrial, commercial tax

base. By bringing the casino to Brockton, it will not only help Brockton with much-needed cash, the casino will also help towns like Abington build their commercial tax base by attracting casino supporting industries.

Abington recently signed the surrounding community agreement with the developers. And that will give us approximately \$130,000 per year which we will use to help fund our very understaffed police department. The casino will bring much-needed jobs and opportunities for Brockton and the surrounding towns. I urge you to pass the project for Brockton. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very much. Larry Curtis first on my list. The Reverend Jill Wiley, also Richard Reid and Adriano Cabral if you can take a seat. Is that Reverend Wiley?

REV. WILEY: Thank you,

Commissioners. My name is Jill Wiley. And I

am a resident of Brockton. And I am member of

the ordained clergy and I've served as a

minister to the churches in Holbrook as well as

Brockton over the past 17 years.

The three points I wanted to make have to do with the criteria by which you will be judging this application. One relates to the overview. Chairman Crosby, I trust you are still in charge of that area of the application. And the other the mitigation section, Commissioner Cameron.

Just like you've gone through the evaluation criteria with a fine-tooth comb,

I've come up with two points I wanted to make.

The first in the overview, the first question out of the box that you need to see as answered is how does the project you propose manifest an appreciation for and collaboration with the existing Massachusetts brand?

I've seen this before and I often wondered what the Massachusetts brand is. But it goes onto explain that it is our intellectual knowledge economy, our biomedical life sciences, educational and financial services economic driver and our long history of innovation and economic regeneration over the 400 years of our existence.

Respectfully, Mr. Chair, there is nothing in the Massachusetts brand that is reflected in putting a casino right in the heart of Brockton where we all live, work, shop, worship, bank and take thousands of children to school. All activities which very capably in fact do manifest an appreciation for in collaboration with existing Massachusetts brand.

Question two asked how does the project you propose embrace the Legislature's mandate to present destination resort casinos rather than commercial casinos? Calling Brockton a destination resort does not make it a destination resort.

And on the last page of your evaluation criteria page 12, Commissioner Cameron you will be needing to affirm the applicant provides the Commission with an agreement that the applicant will mitigate potential negative public health consequences with gambling in the operation of a gaming establishment, including point two providing complimentary on-site space for an independent

substance abuse and mental-health counseling service to be selected by the commission.

For ministers, social workers, social service providers, the question is what kind of toxic environment is being created that requires a mental-health counseling service onsite before it even opens.

Brockton is too vulnerable a community to host such an enterprise. The public is just now getting to voice its public objections and we appreciate that. And in the coming years we hope that you'll see a host community agreement that is really a little more than a bill of sale. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you,

Reverend Wiley. We have a new list. I believe
we have the town administrator from Holbrook,

Timothy Gordon and then Larry Curtis, if he's
here, Richard Reid, Adriano Cabral.

MR. GORDON: Thank you, Commission and welcome to Holbrook. As you can see, we are in the process of building a new K-12 school that will replace this school as well as two other schools. So, thank you for being

here.

As you said, I'm Tim Gordon. I'm the Holbrook Town Administrator and I'm a Holbrook resident. As a resident of Holbrook, which is a surrounding community and a public official in town, I'm very excited about this project.

I believe it will create a destination within the metro-south area that currently does not exist. And creating a destination creates growth. It's my hope that this proposal will bring jobs to the area and increase business activity in Holbrook, which has a very limited tax base and could use that increased business activity.

And I hope and think that it will result in a hub of activity serving as a center of entertainment for the region and beyond this region. I certainly understand some of the concerns that have been raised however, I'm confident that the developer will be fully engaged in our communities, protecting our interests and mitigating any concerns. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very much. Larry Curtis, Richard Reid. Good evening.

MR. REID: Good evening, yes, it's evening officially. My name is Richard Reid.

I'm a pastor of a small church in the city of Brockton. And I'm a representative of Stand Up for Brockton, an ad hoc group that today send me with some 450 letters of people that are concerned about a casino in Brockton.

As we look through the criteria and the evaluation process and some of the things that are needing to be discussed, one that comes to mind automatically for me is the location of next to a high school. If this casino were to go through, we would have a new title as the only city that has a casino next to a high school.

There is also some new legislation that is being drafted right now that would put some limits as to where you could place a casino or any type of gaming facility and that it would have to be at least 1325 feet away from a school. So, this particular location

will not meet that criteria.

2.1

We are concerned also about the aftermath. What happens with so many being afflicted with gambling issues? As churches, we are one of the first places that people turn to for help. I know in my case each year, the number of calls that I receive from people looking for assistance changes. It used to be just somebody needing a little bit of food or some money from their gas tank.

Last year I had six calls just simply looking to help pay their rents or their mortgages. People have gone to other casinos. We're looking at the aspect of the saturation.

The law allows for three full gaming centers, casinos. And if this were to go through and the Mashpee Tribe which now has met all the criteria puts theirs in Taunton, we would have four. And that is a violation of what the law has set so forth.

And we are concerned that with all the activity going in Rhode Island, we're going to see an absolute saturation in this area, in an area that cannot sustain this many gambling

casinos.

It is a concern for us on all kinds of different avenues. We are worried about what's going to happen. And as was brought up already about having to have a mental-health counseling facility right there on-site that is of grave concern.

So, thank you for your time. And we just ask that you would just give serious consideration to all of the aspects of the laws that already in place in this Commonwealth.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very much. Larry Curtis, Adriano Cabral? Next up would be Tracy Marzelli, Christopher Cooney, Stephen O'Brian if you wanted to come forward. Good evening.

MR. CABRAL: Good evening. My name is Adriano, resident of Brockton. And I'm here to present my witness about the proposed casino. And the reason of why I'm here is because I do believe this casino is going to benefit Brockton and its surrounding areas.

Brockton is a city with a lot of problems. And we all live through these

problems every day. We have kids needing programs. I understand gambling it might sound awful or it might sound something not positive, but only adults go gamble and there is a huge security. As far as I know, there is a huge security. Kids are not going to be inside.

But the income that will come from the gambling will have those kids the program that they need which they don't have right now. So, I have kids. My kids go to Brockton High School.

I wish when he leaves high school not just to pass by a casino but to have a program to go to. That's what I want. That's what keeps Brockton safe. We are dealing with this for many years. Can we have something that provides the opportunity to those kids?

On the other hand, we have the parents. We have people needing jobs. Why do people go to things that sometimes might not be healthy or helpful to them or their families.

Many times is because they don't have a job.

They go sometimes they go sell drugs because they don't have a job. Can we give them an

opportunity to have a job and maybe not do those things?

I am a mental-health professional.

And I know that gambling is a problem that comes not with having casino near by your house. It's an addiction that needs to be addressed in a more broader way. If you have compulsive behavior that could be gambling. It could be eating. It could be drugs. It could be anything. That's the personality things.

So, I don't think bringing casino to Brockton is really the answer for someone with gambling problems. We need all the things that will be beneficial not only to Brockton and to the surrounding areas.

So, I do believe this casino is a benefit to Brockton. As far as the casino nearby and it could be saturated, I guess it was clear. I was in the presentation. The Mayor agrees -- Is it time? Okay.

Anyway, this a good thing for Brockton. You should consider giving the opportunity of the people of Brockton to have jobs and have opportunities for their families

1 and their kids. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very much. Larry Curtis, Steve Bernard, Tracy Marzelli. Are you one of those folks, Sir?

Commissioners. My name is Steve Bernard. I'm speaking today as President of the Brockton area branch of the NAACP.

MR. BERNARD: Good evening,

The NAACP is the National
Association for the Advancement of Colored
People. And the Brockton branch represents
most of the South Shore. We are all members of
the NAACP by virtue of being citizens of the
United States. When we talk about people of
color, we talk about everyone.

When I go to a national convention and we're excited about something we say fired up, ready to go. And I think that Brockton and the area surrounding Brockton is fired up and ready to go and to invite, to encourage, the Commission to accept the license -- provide the license for Mass Gaming and Entertainment to begin their project here.

The NAACP has an economic

reciprocity initiative. We have a report card on major industries in the United States. 40 plus states in the United States have casinos. And many of them have hotel resort casinos. So, this makes it somewhat of a fabric of the United States industry.

Jobs, jobs, jobs. Unemployment, unemployment, unemployment. Brockton and the area has a very high unemployment rate and we need to improve that. There are potentially 1500 job opportunities that come along with this casino and resort destination.

economic position for individuals, it will improve our economic position from a municipal situation with tax revenue. It will also provide educational opportunities for our community colleges and colleges in the area where hotel and the entertainment industry is offered as an educational opportunity.

In addition to that it will provide a great social opportunity given that there will be not only the casino but a hotel and maybe a movie theater or maybe places where we

can have first-class entertainment come to Brockton.

It's also worthy noting that our MBTA, our commuter rail not only services Brockton with three stops in Brockton, it services neighboring towns of Abington and Holbrook and Whitman. So, it's a place where people can get to. People that employed from the general area are able to get to work.

So, given this and many more if I had time are reasons why I am in favor, fired up and ready to go to invite you to accept our application. Thank you very much.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very much. Larry Curtis, Tracy Marzelli, Christopher Cooney.

MR. COONEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman for allowing me to speak on behalf of the business community in the metro-south region.

My name is Chris Cooney. I'm President of the Metro-South Chamber of Commerce that represents 1000 companies in this region. Half of them are in the city of Brockton. Half of them are in the surrounding communities.

As we know casino gaming represents

\$3.6 billion in New England alone. That

includes two tribal casinos and racinos. The

New England market is making \$1.8 billion in

investments. 45 percent of New England's

population represents 47 percent of the

disposable income for this activity.

2.1

Massachusetts residents impact annually spend \$1.1 billion in casinos, directly underwrite 6000 hospitality jobs in casinos and indirectly contribute more than \$220 million annually to the general treasuries.

In 2008, we suffered a huge lost,
650 gaming jobs when dog racing, legalized dog
racing, commissioned by the state of
Massachusetts, supervised the state of
Massachusetts and regulated by the state of
Massachusetts was operating just a few miles
south of here.

No fault of our own, if that vote was just eastern Massachusetts, we would have maintained that gaming entertainment but it was the rest of the state that banned it in the

middle of a recession. It happens to be the same owners as the property we're talking about Brockton.

We feel it's a question of fairness in terms of returning these jobs back to this region. We think that Brockton represents a wonderful opportunity.

I think you can probably discover on your own that Neil Bluhm and Rush Street Gaming is the preferred partner of choice in the state.

We could not be more delighted to have them as a partner in this particular casino on this project. Many, many people wanted them, as you know. You saw applications.

They have already stepped up and have done vendor fairs in partnership with the Chamber of Commerce. We've registered hundreds of companies to provide possible services at this facility. We think that this facility will give people a reason to stop and come to Brockton.

One, people that maybe never would

have considered coming to Brockton and that is good not only for the gaming facility but also the city of Brockton in terms of exposure, in terms of additional room nights. We have six hotels in the city. Sometimes people don't realize that but it'll increase the occupancy rate there. We will see new hotels being built.

2.1

We also have host commitments from Rush Street to spend money locally in local businesses through a business cash program. A program that has gift certificates involved the allows both increased gaming or regular gamers to spend money in the local community but also their employees as incentives.

So, on behalf of the board I ask you to support this. And interestingly enough, the superintendent of schools is on our board and she voted in favor of it. So, thank you very much.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Who was that?

MR. COONEY: The superintendent of schools, Cathy Smith.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very

much. Stephen O'Brian, and then Dana Boardman and José Lopes could come down.

MR. O'BRIAN: Thank you

Commissioners for allowing me to speak. I urge
you not to issue a casino license to Brockton.

Attorney General Maura Healey has been quoted in the media in saying that Brockton is not viable as a casino location. I believe she is right for several reasons.

Massachusetts is approaching saturation of the casino market. A tribal casino will be built in Taunton only 18 miles from Brockton. The Plainridge Park Casino is not far away. Rhode Island is proposing a slots parlor in Tiverton on the Massachusetts border. The Wynn Casino in Everett is within 35 miles of Brockton. A Brockton casino would be excessive.

Furthermore, Brockton has a poor record when comes to managing big projects.

One, Campanelli Stadium where Brockton's minor league baseball team plays draws very small crowds. The team struggles to make its payments to the city. The stadium has become a

white elephant. This ill-conceived and poorly managed project was former Mayor Jack Units' idea.

Two, Brockton pays millions of dollars yearly to the Aquaria Desalination

Plant for water it does not use. Three,

Brockton's being sued by a developer seeking to build a power plant on the city's south side.

This controversy has been raging for years.

Four, the city is rampant with drugs and crime. The May 12 casino yes or no vote was only 50.5 percent yes to 49.5 percent no, a one percent margin. This razor thin margin was only 148 votes out of more than 14,100 cast. The deep pocketed pro-casino forces spent \$1.6 million on the election compared to \$1600 by the oppositions. Elections can be bought especially by out-of-state billionaires with unlimited resources.

Mayor Carpenter in his television commercials says that in Brockton everything is close by. But everything won't be close by if the residents of the greater Brockton area have to fight casino traffic every time they want to

1 | run an errand.

2.1

The billionaires and commercial interests have had their say and continue to exert pressure. The ordinary citizens of the Brockton area do not want a casino here and will not support it. Many people believe that Brockton is not viable as a casino location. Please do not grant a casino license to Brockton. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very much. Dana Boardman.

MR. BOARDMAN: Thank you for letting me speak. I'm not a polished speaker, just a regular citizen of Brockton. I happen to come through Holbrook through Route 37 on Sundays and some Saturdays for a men's group at St. Joseph's.

Now one of my biggest concerns is I had an open mind when this first came. So, not knowing other than having gone to Atlantic City a couple of times with my brother who loves blackjack and I tried to my have an open mind. But I do remember and it's quite a few years ago, Atlantic City is pretty down.

So, all of these great things I hear about gambling coming to Brockton, I see all the litter. Housing that people have abandoned because they couldn't afford it. The infrastructure had fallen apart because they didn't get enough money to take care of what the city needs were with these people coming.

I've since learned a lot of the casinos have pulled out. So, we may be doing a temporary good thing, a few low-paying jobs, but they'll probably be taken by the people from Atlantic City and other casinos. How much are they really going to benefit the local people?

Also, as I drive through here, when I came down Route 37, there's an intersection in Brockton just over the line that I can just imagine it's going to be five to 10 minutes just to get across that intersection.

I also worked for 38 years with the veterans at the VA, which is right down the street from the fairgrounds. I read the parking and the traffic report the best I could as a lay person, I didn't get any statistics as

what the future is going to be for the traffic there. And when was this study done? Was it done on the holidays or over the summer when school is not even in?

And the VA is growing in their population. There will be more traffic there. I just went down Linwood Street the other day. There's new developments coming in there. Were the parking statistics taking into consideration the development?

Most of the people on that side of the city were strongly opposed because of traffic. There's some concerns of property values going down. One of the things I did, I tried to have an open mind. What do I do, go to the Internet, Google casinos — advantages of casinos or economic development of casinos impact.

I was shocked at all of the negative things. We've heard from the very beginning how great this would be. Most of the citizens didn't get time to even speak at the hearings we had in Brockton, which is not very democratic.

1 And as a veteran, I think it's 2 important that you hear from the little people. 3 I don't own a three-piece suit. I'm not 4 getting any benefits. But I want to know 5 what's good for my city and not just for a few 6 people and just temporarily. I strongly think I may move out of 8 the city if the traffic from where I live to 9 get over to the other side of town is much 10 longer. And I have not seen a traffic plan 11 that takes into consideration the city. 12 People may come to Brockton once to 13 gamble. I guarantee they will not be back, 14 because they'll be so frustrated. Besides 15 losing, they'll probably also be frustrated 16 with the traffic. Thank you very much. 17 CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you. José

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you. José Lopes. And Greg Sabine if you want to come forward.

MR. LOPES: Good evening. My name is José Lopes and I live in Brockton. I go over the main thing recently in Brockton budget deficit over \$30 million. You see Brockton for lack of the opportunity, lack of hope, lack of

security.

Recently a few days ago or right now we are dealing with property tax going up. The one hope I think that mostly landowners have to have any sources of income to the city. So, casino may be good choice for the city to get more hope especially for the youths who waiting to get some soccer field, more job, more education. So, my vote is that the casino should granted the license. Thank you,

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very much, Mr. Lopes. Mr. Sabine, am I saying that right?

MR. SABINE: Yes, thank you. May name is Greg Sabine. I live in Brockton.

Thank you for this hearing. And I would like those people who are standing behind me that I'm addressing you also through this Commission.

I'm opposed to gambling of all kinds. I find nothing in gambling that we can honestly stand on to say that it is principled and moral. Quite frankly, it is immoral.

There are people in this room who

have distinguished careers. And they are for the gambling casino. And we can say well, they are the problem. We can say that Governor Deval Patrick who is pro-gambling and procasinos is the problem. Pardon me, I have a hoarse throat. But really they are not the problem.

2.1

They are a symptom of our problem as a whole nation. If you look at the moral decline that has taken this country. I am 67 years old. This wouldn't have even been a thought when I was a younger man to have something like this.

There are people sitting here that have read the National Gambling Impact Study Commission that was put together by Bill Clinton. Gay Vernon chaired it. There were people on that commission from the far left to the far right. They all agreed as to the horrors of gambling.

A few weeks ago, we celebrated the life of a great man of God, Dr. Martin Luther King. And I would say if Dr. King were alive today, he would repeat what he said about

gambling that he said about segregation and discrimination in his letter from the Birmingham Jail. He said any law that doesn't conform with the moral law of the universe, God's law, is no law at all. And it ought not to be followed.

To those sitting behind me, I would say we really are losing it. We have really what is a spiritual problem. And for those who, like myself, call themselves followers of Jesus Christ like Martin Luther King was, I would just ask you to fervently pray about this.

There was an anecdotal story in that impact study report that Dr. James Dobson told about a man who was a gambling addict at a casino and he brought his son to the casino.

And the boy was abducted and murdered I think in the boys room.

And when they brought the father in to tell him what had happened to his son, all he could think to say was he wouldn't prosecute if they would give him some more chips. Thank you for your time.

1 CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you. Has 2 Mr. Curtis showed up, Larry Curtis? 3 MR. CURTIS: Thank you. Good 4 afternoon, my name is Larry Curtis. I am a 5 resident and registered voter for the city of 6 Brockton. As part of the Mass. Gaming 8 Commission's responsibility, the Commonwealth was required to hold a special election for the 9 10 host city, Brockton, to determine if the 11 registered voters would approve of a 12 destination resort casino. 13 An aggressive campaign was launched 14 in March 2015, which generated a great deal of 15 passion and excitement in our city. For a 16 period of nine weeks, proponents and opponents 17 aggressively debated the merits of a 18 destination resort casino cumulating in a vote on May 12, 2015. 19 20 That day 14,199 registered voters

That day 14,199 registered voters cast their vote with the voters saying yes for Brockton that a destination resort casino would be a great opportunity for the city of Brockton.

Let's look at the numbers. 7171 voters said yes for Brockton while 7025 voters said no. The yes for Brockton voters won the election by 147 votes, or 50.5 percent to 49.5 percent.

2.1

Let's break those votes down even further. 20 of the 28 precincts in the city of Brockton voted yes for Brockton. That's 71.4 percent to 28.6 percent of our precincts. Breaking it down even further, five of the seven wards in the city of Brockton voted yes for Brockton again, identifying 71.4 percent of the city voters and 28.6 percent of the city against that.

Why is this important? The city of Brockton is known for close elections. In 2013, our citywide election results basically showed our mayor winning by 51 votes. Or Ward 1 city councilor winning by 56 votes. Our Ward 5 councilor winning by 20 votes and our Ward 3 school committee by 29 votes.

Just recently in 2015, our city councilor at-lodge fourth-place vote was one by 118 votes, our Ward 5 city councilor won by

three votes and our Ward 7 school committee by 31 votes.

The city of Brockton's registered voters are accustomed to close elections. We are passionate about our politics. And we are never afraid to express our opinions. The results of the 2013/2015 city elections identified were a lot closer than 141 vote victory for yes for Brockton.

The same can be said about the acceptance of our election results. As registered voters for the city of Brockton, we expect those results to be honored. And on May 12, 2015 in accordance with the Mass. Gaming Commission rules, the registered voters of Brockton answered the call and said yes for Brockton.

As one of those 14,199 registered voters, I expect nothing less from this Commission than to honor the voting rights of the residents of the city Brockton and issue the Region C destination resort casino to our great city. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you. Tracy

Marzelli, Patricia Lugo and Julio -- I'm not sure of the last name. -- Roman or Powman, both of you can come forward if you are here.

MS. LUGO: My name is Patricia Lugo.

I'm a resident of the city of Brockton. I

bought my first home in 1989. I am now in my
third home in Brockton which is the city that I
love.

I watched the city go through some very bad financial times during the 90s and have seen Brockton try to grow and expand and improve itself over the years. We're doing a great job.

I worked for the city of Brockton for the school department for 12 years. I worked for the town of East Bridgewater for six years. And I currently work for the town of Holbrook in the school departments of each of those towns.

I've watched Chapter 70 funding diminish over the years to help the school and the cities and the towns. I've watched federal and state grants also diminish over the years.

Currently, in Holbrook we are going

through the budget process for FY17, which starts in less than six months. And we are struggling to fund the school department in Holbrook in FY17. I am looking forward to the dining and the entertainment that will be brought to us through the casinos.

I think that it's a great thing that the high school students will be nearby and can get \$10 an hour and next year \$11 an hour jobs for a lot of these students which currently don't have many opportunities for jobs in Brockton.

The adults in Brockton as well need job security and health insurance. I'm not positive of this statistic, but I believe the average annual income for Brockton residents is in the forty-thousands which is very low.

I've seen families struggling in
Brockton and we have a high unemployment rate.

I would like to see the economic and financial boost brought in by this casino help the city of Brockton and the surrounding communities who all need this opportunity.

I think it's going to help

1 revitalize Brockton. We need money for the 2 schools, for the fire, police and safety 3 issues. We need money for infrastructure and roads in Brockton. And I'm looking forward to 5 having the casino near my home which is 6 practically across the street from the casino. I will be able to look out my windows and see 8 this every day. And I'm looking forward to this boost in the economic revitalization for 9 10 Brockton. Thank you. 11 CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very 12 Mr. Powman. much. 13 MR. POMAR: My name is Julio Pomar, 14 I apologize I don't have a prepared 15 But after hearing what I'm hearing, statement. 16 I feel like I have to say something. 17 I am opposed to this casino in 18 I live in Brockton. Brockton. I grew up in 19 Brockton, graduated high school in 1984. I see 20 a lot of things out there that I don't like. 21 And I see a lot of things that would be good 22 for any city. 23 But the people that are going to be 24 going to this casino are not the high-roller

people that can afford to lose because their chance of winning. These are people who are going to be spending what little money they have to try to better who they are, try to get more money to survive.

So, I don't see how when they lose what are they going to do? What are they going to do when they lose their money to the house, which it happens. It happens all the time. Are they going to look to crime? Are they going to look to try augment what they lost by doing things that they shouldn't do?

As of right now, we all know there is a huge opiate epidemic, and people who have problems on a day-to-day basis just trying to make it for the day. And people having addiction problems, it's all over the state.

I'm a paramedic. I see that on a day-to-day basis. I think that putting a casino in Brockton and trying to substitute one addiction to try to fix another by getting jobs, I think it's a wrong thing to do.

I ask that you do not grant this to Brockton. Thank you.

1 CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you. Ann 2 Hunyadi, something like that. Sorry if I'm 3 butchering the name, my apologies. 4 MS. HUNYADI: My name is Ann 5 Hunyadi. I'm a resident of the city of 6 Brockton and I also work in the city as well. I want to thank you all for your thoughtful 8 consideration to this issue. It's very 9 important to many people. 10 Since the city of Brockton voted, 11 the landscape has drastically changed. 12 Atlantic City has gone into receivership just 13 this week. And fantasy football and online 14 gaming has blossomed. Like Mr. Lopes who spoke 15 earlier, I too am interested in the youth of 16 our city, but I have a different spin. I want 17 more for them than an entry-level job. Again, 18 I thank you. 19 CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very 20 The first name on here we can't quite much. 21 make out. The pen didn't work too well. It 22 was the most recent sign-up sheet. It's like 23 Jim Morales, is that you? My apologies. 24 Please come forward, also Stephen Abrams and

Brian McElhinrey can come forward.

In the third place, the area very nice area. Now is destroyed after the casino come over, the house drop 10 percent. In my street, 10 houses went for sale under the price. And they are all nice people. Why are you destroying this city, this area of Brockton? We fight for them.

The last item I want to tell you guys, it is bad to hear this meeting. Many people who even here and is in favor of this casino I saw in all of the notice, big, big announcement. How much more do they spend? How much more do they want to put in order to get this casino? Not casino in Brockton, please. Not the casino in Brockton.

We have enough problem. One week ago a shooting was bad. One of the kids ended up in the hospital. And we don't count a lot of problems in this south area and the west area and the north area. Please no casino. Thank you.

22 CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you.
23 Stephen Abrams.

MR. ABRAMS: Yes. My name is

Minister Stephen Abrams. I've been in ministry over 30 years. We have a church. I live in the city of Brockton. Our church is located at 184 West Elm Street less than a mile from the casino.

2.1

But let me tell you a quick story concerning the city of Brockton and true Brocktonians, how they feel about their city and how they love their city. We have a serious opiate epidemic. There were 124 deaths last year of overdose. There was 1200 saves with Narcon. The city has been overrun with this type of epidemic.

Now, they want to part 90 percent of the student body at the city of Brockton High School English as their second language. So, what does that tell me? They're telling me that there's a social experiment once again that would like to try to come up and prop up a problem that a casino would definitely not do.

What is that telling me? That's telling me those who are for the casino have a greater gain than those who are not. Anyone can prop up a vote and promote it to get their

numbers skewed.

2.1

My main concern is not that our children have low-paying jobs but our children have a future. The future doesn't stop at the casino. The future stops after they receive their master's in college. So, why do we have to sell our community short with a casino?

Being a minister, I see the plight of those who did not come home because they're gambling. Those who have to stop by and buy scratch tickets because they got the itch.

This is the day that they're going to hit. And it never happens. It's chasing smoke. It's chasing smoke.

And I'm really concerned about our law enforcement. If we lose one person in uniform to the violence that will come to the city, because it's here now because I've seen it firsthand. Twenty-three years in the United States military, one deployment I've seen the worst of humanity.

And I can see also going to seeing the statistics in Vegas, Plainville, Atlantic City, we all know what comes about. We all

know. But once you put drugs, money and illicit activities, we got a problem.

2.1

So, I'm just asking everyone as you come to the different churches and you hear these confessions of what has happened to Brocktonians, to Brocktonians -- they adopted me in some 26 years ago. Bought property all across the city, seen the city change. But now, they want to bring in another gorilla that will suck from our resources.

One child gets hurt, it only takes one to negatively affect this. So, I ask you please reconsider. Think of your own neighborhood. It's right here. Why Brockton? So, I ask the question, why Brockton? It's another social experiment. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you. Brian McElhinrey.

MR. MCELHINREY: Good evening. My name is Brian McElhinrey. I'm the principle officer at Teamsters Local 653. We represent 2300 members on the South Shore and the Brockton area. I was born and raised in Brockton.

And I've seen the struggles of the city. And I've experienced those struggles with my 2300 members today. Today, we toured two plants. We were at one of our liquor distributors where 20 people had to go home because there was no work. And we just left the food processing plant in Brockton that 40 are losing their jobs.

2.1

And we've been going through this for the past four or five years in the city. Enough is enough. We worked with the Carney family for over 50 years in our local. They give great contracts to our members. They are good jobs. Hopefully, these casino jobs will be union jobs.

And this city needs good solid jobs. More than anything, we need the work for our people. We need the community to be brought up to a level where they can have real sustained lifestyles.

Right now, the city of Brockton is in a bad way. The people of the city are struggling to survive. And my members are struggling to survive. These jobs will start

off with good solid union construction jobs, building the casino and all of the surrounding areas in constructing the roads.

2.1

And then they will continue on to all of the jobs inside the casino which will raise this community up to a standard where it used to be when I grew up here.

Also, the surrounding communities will be helped by all of the members, my members who deliver food, beverages, beer and all of the services that this casino will need. We have companies that deliver every product in there with the local communities and local agreements that will be reached hopefully with this casino. All of my members will be lifted up. And our people will be able to get back to work.

We also represent the school bus drivers in Brockton along with the Brockton school custodians. They're facing a \$10 million budget shortfall this year in the school department. Most of my members are at home right now worried about whether or not they're going to have work in September.

So, the city needs this. They need the funding. They need this proposal. They need the Carney family there to use this land for a good reason to boost up this city.

And we are in support of this. And we ask that you do support this casino amendment. And we'd appreciate your support in putting this casino in Brockton and helping these people, helping my people, and making sure that good jobs land here where they belong. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you. Djidji Monteiro. And Larry Curtis signed up. I think we've already had Mr. Curtis.

MS. MONTEIRO: Good afternoon. My name is Djidji Monteiro also a Brockton resident for 19 years in the city of Brockton and a business owner as well. I'm here today to tell you guys and I didn't see any opportunity living in Brockton city what I love. I didn't consider go anywhere else in United States than Brockton. I do love Brockton. I raised two kids age 15 and eight and my son attend Brockton High School this

1 | first year.

I don't see why that in Brockton right now we don't have absolutely nothing.

People struggle. There's no job.

5 | Manufacturing gone out of Brockton. It's

6 layoff everywhere. Even if you have a degree,

7 it's hard to find a job to go back. Things are

8 going up higher, rent, real estate. They are

9 trying to survive. It's so hard.

10 When I heard about casino coming to

11 | Brockton -- As a matter of fact, it was last

I'm proud to say I am from the city of

Brockton. My mother raised 11 children there.

2 | We all do okay. We have our problems.

I know we get a lot of negative
Brockton's done this, Brockton's done that,
shootings here, opium there. It's the fifth
largest city in the state. So, we are going to
get news. We are going to get pinpoint for
certain things. It's just a shame that all of
the good stuff doesn't hit the newspapers. It
just doesn't sell.

I'm not really sure why we are here. The people voted in a binding vote. Whether it's one vote or a thousand votes, it's still a binding vote. They elected and chose to have the casino in the city of Brockton.

It's not up to the board or up to the Governor or any individual to say we worry about our children. It's up to the parent to worry about their children. It's up to the morals that you instill in your children.

I am confident that my children will do what's right for them. My son goes to the high school. He'll be going to the high school if an when the casino is built. It's what we

instill in our own children that's going to be right or wrong, not what government says we should and should not do. It's not up to the qovernment. It's up to us.

We hear casino, casino, casino.

It's not just going to be the casino. It's going to be a resort destination. You're going to have more than just gambling. People had a fair chance to vote. They had a fair chance to speak up and they didn't. Those who did just were in the majority.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very much. I believe we have a Ward 5 city councilor.

MS. BEAUREGARD: Hello. I am the Ward 5 city councilor that won by three votes. Every vote does count. And I am grateful that you are here today.

Ann Beauregard, and I am opposed to the casino. I'm not opposed to casinos. I am not for a casino that is near three schools, and that's near a hospital that serves our

veterans that have served this nation. I am not for a casino that is near a church, several churches actually in the local area. I am for bringing good businesses to the city that increase and demonstrate the value of the community.

Brockton is a great city. It has challenges like all cities and will continue to have challenges. There is no place where there aren't any challenges.

We have a remarkable school system. And like many taxpayers, I want to see the schools grow and strengthen. But a casino to me is not where the revenue is coming from.

It is going to come from industries that establish and the needs of individuals whether it's the biomedical industry, the education industry and so on. I hope that you consider the safety of the community, the individuals of the community and vote in opposition of a casino close to the schools, the churches and to the veteran's hospital.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you. We

have Shyra Barnes and Peggy Curtis could also come forward and Paul Kearney.

2.1

MS. BARNES: Good evening. It's Shaynah Barnes actually. Thank you for having this hearing and thank you for allowing me to speak.

I am one of the four city councilors at-lodge in Brockton. I come before you to speak against this particular project in this area. I came out early against the project. I made sure that I let Mr. Carney know my feelings. And we spoke about that. And it's just business, not personal.

But I do just want to make everyone aware of a particular practice that happens in other areas where there are casinos. And it's a practice that's called capturing every dollar.

What does is or the concept is if people are going to be at the casino where they have a buffet and all other kinds of things besides gambling like one of the proponents said they are not going to leave that particular area to maybe go out to the mom-and-

pop shop to have a chicken Parmesan someplace else. Or to go and take advantage of some of the other businesses in the area.

And if we are trying to build our city and we're trying to build business, it's going to totally desecrate everything that's going to be around in its area, because nobody is going to leave. They're going to stay right there.

We have mom-and-pop shops around there. We have restaurants. We have little stores that rely on the commerce of the people in Brockton.

Personally, I think that we should probably look at a different kind of project something along the lines of a Patriot Place situation where people -- If you're going to say that people have this disposable income in Brockton, let them spend it on something that they can go home with. Let them spend it on something that is durable not to have ATMs and check-cashing machines in the bathroom.

That's one of the things that I really want people to take a look at. Take a

look at what is going to happen in a long-term setting not just right now.

2.1

Again, what my colleagues said about the schools that is a very real thing. Before I was a city councilor, I worked for DCF. And every year I'd have a few girls on my caseload that would go to the Brockton Fair and run off with a person that worked at the Brockton Fair.

They'd be gone a week, two weeks.

And by the time they came back or they were captured or found they'd aged 10 years in the time that they were gone. And God knows what kind of things they were exposed to.

So, that is my concern that we may not have the kind of supervision that we would like to have in a utopia for our children. And they sneak off and they go there and they get wrapped up with the wrong person. It's just a snowball effect. So, that is what I would like to say. And thank you very much for having me.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very much. Is it Peggy Curtis?

MS. CURTIS: Hi. My name is Peggy
Curtis. I'm a resident of Brockton. Thank you

for being here today.

2.1

I'd like to clear up a little misconception that I believe has been established today about addiction. I am a parent of two addicts of heroin addiction. In the 14 years that we've struggled with our sons' addictions, we found that if you were born with that disease, it's a disease of addiction of anything.

It could be marijuana. It could be alcohol. It could be gambling. It could be anything. That if you are born with that disease that does not mean just because there is a casino here or there, it doesn't mean you are going to become an addict. You are an addict already no matter what it is that you are around. And you would be predisposed to that.

I don't have heroin in my house but my kids found it anyways. So, if you have that addiction, it's there already. And whether there is a casino there or not doesn't make a difference.

I believe the money from the casino

would help the addiction crisis that we are
having and we're struggling with in this area.

I feel that the monies that we could earn from
the taxation or the revenue from a casino would
help the addiction problem.

2.1

We are experiencing a shortage of beds, a shortage of facilities and social workers and adjustment counselors. And we also have a lot of problems with people who go to jail because of their drug addiction. There are no jobs available for them to start their road to recovery.

And I feel that the casino itself would offer some of the younger people a path to a different career, have a job right out of school. It's close by. I know that gambling casinos are closely monitored for the people that come in. I personally have gone to casinos. I'm not an addict, thank you.

Just because I go and I like to see the entertainment. I like the restaurants. I like the shops. Those are the things that appeal to me. And I think that's what the people who voted for the casino are looking

forward to also.

2.1

Again, I just want to reiterate if you are an addict whether there is a casino around you or not doesn't make you a gambling addict. If there is alcohol around you -- if you were born with that disease of addiction, you are going to fall into it no matter what's around you. And I'd like to say thank you.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you. Paul Kearney.

MR. KEARNEY: First of all, thank you for your time to come here and address our small community here.

I just want to say as a small business owner that this is really going to affect us as a small business and as a parent, mostly as a parent. I come here as a parent first.

And the idea that we're going to put a casino next to a school is the craziest thing I've ever heard. The idea that children are going to have to be subject to casinos in their backyard every single day, it just horrifies me. And when people come up here and tell me

1 that this community already got to vote on 2 this, this is actually not true. We were told 3 That's a fair question. 4 CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Excuse me. Hang 5 on just one second, Sir. There is one speaker at a time. You've had your opportunity. 6 MR. KEARNEY: And I just want to say 8 If you look at the voting when the 9 casino was done, first of all, Brockton was 10 voted the slimmest of margins that you can 11 I think it was by 70 votes. imagine. 12 The casino folks over here, they 13 spent \$1.5 million to \$3000. That was the 14 game. So, when we talk about what was voted 15 That is true. It was 49.5, but they were on. 16 outspent --17 CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Mr. Kearney, speak 18 to us. 19 MR. KEARNEY: And that said, the 20 other (INAUDIBLE) 2.1 CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Mr. Kearney. MR. KEARNEY: I know but I want to 22 23 talk to the folks top because this is 24 important. We should all know this.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: They can hear you,

Mr. Kearney.

2.1

MR. KEARNEY: We weren't able to vote on the casino because the third casino wasn't going to say where it was going to be. So, the folks that were for the casinos, as you know, if you look at the areas that knew where the casinos were going to vote -- In Springfield, Springfield voted for the casino but everywhere around it didn't. Same thing in Everett. People around the Everett area voted for the casinos, but Brookline, Cambridge that area didn't.

We weren't given the opportunity to find out where the third casino was going to be. So, folks that live in Easton where their property values are going to decrease by the way because the casinos only bring in crime, domestic violence and they bring out the worst in people, okay.

So, that said who is going to send their kid to Stonehill College? I'm not going to send my kid to Stonehill College knowing that there's a casino a mile away.

That said if this was anywhere else in any other community -- because I live in Cohasset. I drove here from Cohasset. If this was going next to Cohasset, it would be an absolute riot out front that the idea that we were going to put a casino in a school zone.

Because this is minority children nobody is up here protecting the kids. We've got 4500 kids going through that school. And when you talk about jobs, if people want to bring in jobs, you know what Brockton is good for hospitals and schools, not strip clubs and casinos. Okay? We've got the best hospitals in Brockton. And people got to know if you get hurt or sick --

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Mr. Kearney, did you hear the time?

MR. KEARNEY: I'm sorry. I just want to finish this point. If you get sick, you're not going to go into a casino because they're not going to make you well.

Brockton is a good city. It's a city of champions. So, please don't put a casino next to school zone. Thank you. And by

the way, this is a bill that bans casinos for school zones.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you, Mr.

Kearney. Thank you. Are there anymore? We don't like to stop even though there are no other speakers here now. We know that a lot of people were working. There's a possibility that people won't have been able to get here in time. So, we want to wait until at least 5:30 and see whether other people come to sign up.

Are you raising your hand as a speaker? Do you want to come forward? Give us your name, please.

MR. SHARNELL: Jeff Sharnell. I am a Brockton city resident. I've been here since the sixth grade. So, I went through elementary, junior high school and college and now I'm an adult in the city of Brockton.

And as an adult in the city of
Brockton, I am in that tweener where I can live
anywhere. I can live in Easton, Braintree, go
to Newton, live anywhere. But I decided to
stay in Brockton.

Some of the reasons I decided to

stay here are for things that possibly can happen here revenue, schools, casinos. When someone first asked me if the casino was a good idea I said I don't know, because I didn't have enough information.

2.1

But you can't do anything without funding, money and jobs. And as a resident of the city, this is something that you have to take the pros and the cons and outweigh them.

To me after having the correct information, I was able to make an educated decision that this would probably be a very good thing for the city, and would not negatively impact us in a way that is portrayed in the media and is portrayed in other cities.

To me you only get one crack at it, one opportunity here and then it moves on. So, for me this is one of the things that may keep me here in the city. This is one of the things that may improve the place for us, improve the fire force, improve many of the things that we don't have in the city.

I'm not a politician at all or anything like that but I'd like to have you

guys really take a real look at the city needs something. People have told me the casino can get up and move tomorrow. I tell them someone that is making a \$650 million investment in the city is not looking to leave tomorrow. That's pretty solid.

much.

So, for doing a lot of business in the city as well as a commercial lender, my clients and customers want to see this as small business as well, because the more people that flux through this city, the more opportunities they have to either meet more people or gain business or sell their goods to the casino itself. That's all I have to say. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Peter something who just signed up, Peter Jean.

MR. JEAN: Good evening. My name is Peter Jean. I live in Brockton for almost 15 years, 15 years, one-five. I have four kids. All we need, we need yes for Brockton because we deserve it.

Anyone could against something is

significant will. For someone don't have any education about life, what life is is a risk. It's a risk, it's a risk. I stand right here and anything could happen to me. It's a risk because we are human beings.

Back in the day way, way far to be Los Angeles. Los Angeles right here. No one can enforce Los Angeles. A scientist 10 years if you buy that land we're going to build movie star there. We're going to build LA you see right now. What they do, they make all colors being famous to reduce the crime.

If you here, we here for something.

Significant time, I don't want to say nothing anymore. Let's go forward. Let's build it in my backyard. Build it today in my backyard even my kids not going to go there because they have a father going to go further. Not the kids, my father, I get it for my

1 brother. 2 I been here. I study criminal 3 I learn it from my professor give me 4 all the details about LA. There wasn't LA between black Latinos, I don't want to talk I 5 6 don't want to offend anyone. It's good. I'm so happy to listen to all of you against it. 8 If you go any church on Sunday, bingo. Every 9 church is bingo. MR. JORDAN: Just one last thing.

If you are familiar with you wherever you go,

if you are working in Boston, it takes you at

least an hour by public transportation to get

back here.

So, if you're leaving at 5:00, the earliest you should have a meeting is six, and then run it whatever hours. Because if you do it before that you're really not going to get the input for the community. I want you to take a look at that.

And that's above and beyond whoever's on committees like this, and I've done it for years, that's something that you buy into. You're only doing it a few times and

then you're done. So, to include it within the regular time, please think about that.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you very much. We'll do that. Thank you very much.

MS. SIEBEN: Hi. My name is Elsie Sieben. We moved to Brockton during the Blizzard of '78, believe it or not. So, 38 years we've been in the same house.

I just wanted to say a couple of things that I haven't heard much about during this hearing. One, I'd like to quote my little granddaughter. I have a little granddaughter, 10-year-old granddaughter that I brought down from Cambridge. She's actually the daughter of a former foster son of mine.

I said you know they're going to build a casino in Brockton. She said what?

Are they crazy? More traffic, more gambling problems. She went down the whole list.

And the one that she said something about that has been on my mind too, more people driving buzzed in Brockton. We have traffic problems so bad now. You try to go in that area where the casino would be, try to go even

out of PriceRite at any time of the day, the traffic is bad already. What are we going to do with all this traffic? I am sure we are not going to have all kinds of new roads and new streets and everything.

Besides what Kaylani was saying,
people driving buzzed, more people driving
buzzed, we already have to watch out for them
on the roads especially at night. I've been
thinking though, why are we doing this? Who is
making money out of this? Who is being paid
off to have this come to Brockton?

A poor area, we are a poor, poor city here. There are people who can't afford to feed their kids and they'll be sitting in the casino gambling away what little they have. It doesn't make sense to me.

So, I would just like to say please don't do it. Take it somewhere else out in the boonies somewhere where people can travel to it and then come home and be free of all the problems that it will bring more crime, etc. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CROSBY: Thank you. I

1 think that's it. Nobody else signed up. 2 Nobody else wants to speak. Then I think I 3 would have a motion to adjourn. 4 COMMISSIONER MACDONALD: So moved.
