2	PROCEEDINGS:
3	
4	COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: It is 1:00.
5	So, I am going to call at 1:00 the public meeting of
6	the Massachusetts Gaming Commission number 19 to
7	order.
8	This is a special meeting in the sense
9	that we only have one agenda item. We discussed this
10	at the last meeting. To put it in context under
11	section 103 of the Expanded Gaming legislation
12	chapter 194 of the Act of 2011, the Commission is
13	required to prepare a report on the operation of
14	charitable gaming in Massachusetts and make
15	recommendations to the legislative leadership for
16	any appropriate changes.
17	The Commission has prepared a report.
18	We discussed the report last week. And the purpose
19	of today's meeting is to present to the Commission
20	formally both the report in narrative form, its final
21	form, and to present to the Commission the cover
22	letter under which we are going to send that report
23	today to the legislative leadership, that is to the
24	  Speaker and the President and to the Chairs of the

House and Senate committee on Ways and Means and the 1 2 Chairs of the joint committees on Economic 3 Development and Emerging Technologies. A report that would recommend, if 4 approved by the Commission that charitable gaming be 5 6 -- the regulation of charitable gaming be 7 consolidated in the Lottery, which has the staff and 8 the experience to do that kind of regulation and is already regulating 73 percent of the total dollar 9 10 volume expended in charitable gaming in the Commonwealth. And that by the end of the year we 11 12 propose legislation and regulations in order to effect that transition. 13 14 This is a recommendation that has been 15 discussed with the Lottery, with the Treasury and 16 with the Attorney General who all have some 17 regulatory responsibilities and is essentially a 18 view being put forward by the Commission but with the 19 agreement and support of those of entities. With 20 that as background, the matter is open for 21 discussion. 22 COMMISSIONER CAMERON: I just wanted to make a comment, Commissioner, that it is a very 23 24 well done report and I thank you for the effort on

1	behalf of all of us.
2	It makes perfect sense, the
3	recommendation, after reviewing the percentages and
4	the idea that they have the staff and housing all of
5	this in one place certainly logistically as well as
6	from a regulatory standpoint makes a lot of sense.
7	So, I certainly agree with your
8	recommendation as well as it was a very comprehensive
9	report. So, thank you.
10	COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Other comments,
11	questions, concerns?
12	COMMISSIONER STEBBINS: I add to
13	Commissioner Cameron and I think it is pretty
14	apparent that because of the timeliness of when we
15	were all appointed that we were not going to make the
16	first deadline. In keeping with our ability, we kept
17	the second deadline. It falls in line with our
18	ability to incorporate racing into the Gaming
19	Commission by that deadline.
20	Hopefully, it sends the message that we
21	are keeping on track and we are fulfilling the
22	obligations of the legislation and doing it
23	thoughtfully and diligently.
24	COMMISSIONER ZUNIGA: Yes. I agree

as well with what is being discussed. I think the 1 report is very well thought out. There is clearly 2 a lot of discussion that went into summarizing the findings of fact and the background and the 4 5 discussion about the regulatory framework and the 6 substantive issues. 7 I think the conclusions really make the 8 most sense as are being summarized here as 9 recommended to the Legislature, they have the 10 discretion, that the oversight be placed in the Lottery and given what this Commission has in front 11 12 of ourselves. 13 I do want to just have a question really 14 of -- a thought that occurred to me relative to how 15 the whole gaming charitable and bazaars and beano may 16 evolve a few years from now with the presence of 17 casinos. Right now we are looking at a given point and a trend that has looked back at the history. 18 19 Perhaps just for our own discussion, 20 our own benefit and for the record to have some 21 thoughts of whether somebody should think about how 22 the introduction of casinos may factor in charitable 23 gaming. I know that was not the charge of the

legislation for this topic, but I cannot help but

wonder whether that has been a matter of discussion. 1 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: I can say in 2 3 response that there is some concern about -- in the charitable gaming community about the impact of 4 casinos on charitable gaming. 5 6 As the report notes, there are 7 commercial equivalents of each form of the charitable 8 gaming that exists in Massachusetts, beano, the 9 pull-tabs -- the charitable gaming tickets, raffles 10 and the Las Vegas or Monte Carol nights. 11 There is in Connecticut a very large 12 bingo parlor, which is the same as our beano. 13 is the possibility of more bingo or beano in 14 Massachusetts under the various regimes that exist. 15 The Commission has the responsibility 16 though under the legislation of monitoring this and 17 making periodic reports to the Legislature. And it 18 is clear it seems I think collectively to us that the 19 public and the Legislature and everybody involved in 20 this wants us to focus laser-like on getting these 21 casinos licensed, up and running -- these gaming 22 establishments licensed, up and running. 23 So, for the minute to take this package 24 of already fairly well-regulated gambling, put it in

1	one place that is capable of continuing that
2	effective regulation, concentrating on our main task
3	is the best thing for us to do. That is at least my
4	view and I think that is what the public wants us to
5	do and to stay in the deadlines as Commissioner
6	Stebbins suggested that we are on, to move forward
7	thoughtfully but effectively in our primary mission.
8	COMMISSIONER ZUNIGA: I would agree.
9	I concur. I guess I was just thinking out loud a
10	little bit relative to those or anticipating the
11	periodic reports, but we will just have to cross that
12	bridge when we get there.
13	COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: And I don't
14	think we can lose sight of it.
15	All right. Then I would accept a
16	motion to forward the report under the cover letter
17	that you have before you of July 31 to the legislative
18	leadership in fulfillment of our statutory
19	obligation.
20	COMMISSIONER CAMERON: I make a motion
21	to forward this report as is.
22	COMMISSIONER STEBBINS: Second.
23	COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: All in favor, I.
2.4	COMMISSIONER STEBBINS: I.

1	COMMISSIONER CAMERON: I.
2	COMMISSIONER ZUNIGA: I.
3	COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: The I's have it
4	and we adopt that position unanimously. We will
5	transmit that report this afternoon to the six
6	designated legislative leaders.
7	And that concludes Unless there is
8	any other business that concludes today's meeting.
9	Is there any other business that anybody wishes to
10	raise? That is the only agenda item.
11	So, I will entertain a motion to
12	adjourn.
13	COMMISSIONER STEBBINS: So moved.
14	COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: All in favor, I.
15	COMMISSIONER STEBBINS: I.
16	COMMISSIONER CAMERON: I.
17	COMMISSIONER ZUNIGA: I.
18	COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: The motion is
19	carried. The meeting is adjourned. Thank you.
