COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Good afternoon

4 and welcome. I'm going to begin with some

5 formalities here just to set the stage and

6 | remind everybody what we're about. Today is

7 | Monday, August 11, 2014 and this is a public

8 | hearing before the Massachusetts Gaming

9 | Commission relative to the application for a

10 | Category 1 resort casino gaming establishment

11 submitted by Mohegan Sun Massachusetts, LLC.

My name is Jim McHugh. I am one of

13 the Commissioners. I'm joined by Commissioner

14 | Gayle Cameron on my right, on my immediate left

15 | Commissioner Enrique Zuniga and on my far left

16 by Commissioner Bruce Stebbins.

We're located that the Revere High

18 | School Auditorium, 101 School Street in Revere,

19 and are here today to conclude the public

20 hearing that began on June 24, 2014. This is

21 the third session of that hearing.

22 As you may recall, we left the

23 | public hearing open so that interested

24 | individuals who did not previously have a

chance to provide comments would have a chance to do so, and to allow individuals an opportunity to comment on any event that has occurred since we began this hearing on June This is not, however, intended to provide 24. individuals with a second opportunity to offer the same comments but we are looking tonight for comments about matters that have occurred since we began.

The Commission's scheduled, as many of you know and indeed probably all of you know, to begin final deliberations for the award of the Region A gaming license the week of September 8. The public support for Mohegan Sun proposal or the lack of support will be an important factor that the Commission will evaluate in making the final award of the license.

Accordingly, your presence here today, at the previous hearings and the written comments you've submitted will play an important role in the decision we ultimately make. So, thank you all for being a part of this process.

Before we begin, I'd like to remind everybody what the process is and establish the ground rules that we'll follow tonight. The hearing is intended to provide the Commission with the opportunity to address questions and concerns relative to the applicant's proposal to build a gaming establishment as those plans were set out in its RFA-2 that is the second stage application.

The inquiry may include topics related to the scope and quality of the gaming establishment, the amenities, the integration and additionally the Commission will receive input from members of the public and any impacted community.

At the previous hearing, we heard presentations by the applicant as well as presentations from representatives of the host community of Revere and from surrounding communities. We then began by taking public comments and we'll pick up at that point today. At the conclusion of the comments from members of the public, we will afford the applicant an opportunity to make any closing comments it

would like to make.

In an effort to make the best use of our time, we ask that any member of the public proceed as follows in addressing all of us on the stage here. First, any member of the public who would like to address the Commission must be on our list of speakers. If you sent an email to the address on our website or signed up as you came in the building today, your name has been added to the list.

If you haven't, please be sure to add your name to the list which is located near the entrance to the room. We ask that only people from the host or surrounding communities speak here today.

Second, when I call your name, please come to the microphone and state your name and tell us where you are from. I'm going to call two names initially. And then I'm going to call somebody always to the on-deck circle which is right behind Mayor Rizzo. It's the seat marked reserved. That way we can get people to transition from the audience to the podium quickly. So, that will help us make

sure the hearing proceeds smoothly.

Third, in order to ensure that everybody wants to speak and gets an opportunity to do so, we ask that you please limit your comments to four minutes in length. We have a clock up front that will count down the time so you'll be able to tell how much has elapsed. Please be sure your comments or questions relate to the particulars of this proposal and not to your views on gaming and casinos in general.

With those remarks, -- I forgot and will add this. For those of you who have submitted written comments about this project, please understand that all of those comments have been read. Many of them are in the packets that we received tonight, and we've read many more. All of the comments that were submitted by any of you and those of you not in attendance have been read by all of us.

At the conclusion of the hearing and the one we'll conduct tomorrow in Everett, the Commission will officially close the mandatory statutory hearings. And the law says that the

- Commission must take action on the applications
  between 30 to 90 days from the date that the
  public hearings have closed.
- So, with those preliminaries, I'll
  begin calling the names of individuals who have
  signed up to speak. I note here among the many
  representatives of the city, Mayor Rizzo, did
  you want to speak first, Sir, or were you going
  to go toward the end? All right.
- Then I'll begin Anthony Zambuto, a member of the Revere City Council, Mr. Zambuto.
- 12 Mr. John Powers of the Revere City Council.
- 13 Mr. Ira Novoselsky of the Revere City Council.
- 14 And let me call Arthur Guinasso of the Revere
- 15 City Council to the on-deck circle, seat I
- 16 guess I should say, if I might. Mr.
- 17 Novoselsky.
- 18 MR NOVOSELSKY: Thank you very much,
- 19 Commissioner. I'm not used to being the
- 20 leadoff hitter on the team, but I am proud to
- 21 be in this position right now.
- 22 Good afternoon, Commissioners.
- 23 | Welcome back to Revere. The last time I
- 24 appeared before you, I brought to your

attention my personal and immediate impacts of the Mohegan proposal to my neighborhood as the Ward 2 councilor of which the area directly abuts the proposed site. Today, I appear before you to relate the overall impacts of the proposal.

As a former city council president, I am familiar with the various cities and towns in the area with their respective issues.

Clearly, the Mohegan Sun project with a dozen surrounding community agreements totaling over \$50 million per year is the superior project.

On every level, this project reaches out to the region.

In our own host community agreement, 20 percent of the jobs will go to the Revere residents but 75 percent will go to folks within a 15-mile radius of the project. To that end, Mohegan Sun has been conducting outreach efforts around the neighboring towns of Salem, Saugus, Chelsea, Lynn to mention a few and down to the city of Boston itself and Dorchester, Mattapan, Roxbury as well as within that 15-mile radius.

In terms of small business development, nearly 400 businesses have signed up for the Momentum Points program, a program that pushes player points out into the community, potentially millions in revenue, compared to gift cards on Main Street and with other projects. There is no other proposal that goes to this level. There is no comparison.

And on the subject of small business and local vendors, there is proposed \$10 million in buying commitments from vendors in Revere, backed up by commitments for \$50 million in buying commitments for businesses within 15 miles, again, in neighboring cities, towns and the city of Boston.

In terms of traffic, I have been working with the traffic engineers for the past four years to assist in developing a traffic plan to ease the flow of traffic in, around and out of the project area. I believe that the \$45-\$60 million committed by Mohegan Sun will help alleviate the traffic impact, although we know that nothing is perfect. Also, we know

that there will have to be some tweaking once we get rolling and realize that things have to be adjusted in many of the solution locations.

In the end, in my mind one must ask which project does the least amount of harm for the most good. Weighing it much like plotting it on a graph on the X and Y axis, if you were to do that, the solution point, the point where those lines cross would point to our project in Revere.

Everything I have mentioned shows the potential economic impact for not only our immediate region but the entire Commonwealth of Massachusetts. I consider the Mohegan proposal far superior of any proposal that is before you. Together with Suffolk Downs as our home team, we hope to be excited to deliver the Mass. Gaming industry signature project.

Please take all of this into consideration to allow Mohegan Sun to be the choice for the casino gambling license in Region 1. Thank you for consideration in this matter. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you Mr.

Novoselsky. Mr. Guinasso and Steve Reardon,
Councilor Steve Reardon is next to the on-deck
seat, please.

MR. GUINASSO: Mr. Chairman, members of the Commission, good afternoon. My name is Arthur Guinasso, city councilor representing Ward 3 in the city of Revere.

I have lived in Revere my entire life and appreciate the opportunity I've had attending several of these hearings. Why I'm about to say may seem presumptuous and I apologize if it does so, but to me the answer and selection seems obvious.

I realize that you have heard and will hear from many people today. It is not my intent to restate all that has been said or all that will be said. Instead, I would like to briefly summarize much of what I've thought about and heard at hearings over these past several months.

The fact is Mohegan Sun Resort

Casino at Suffolk Downs will offer a much

greater benefit on a regional basis than our

opposition. It's not even close. From our own

host agreement to the various surrounding community agreements, to the tens of millions of dollars being spent on locally bought goods and services and Mohegan Sun reward club point program. Mohegan Sun will transform not just Revere but the entire region.

As dramatic as that is, we must also consider Mohegan Sun's location. Is proximity to Logan Airport and accessibility by public way transportation is unparalleled. And has been said that the preservation of a 78-year history of thoroughbred racing and the hundreds of jobs and supports.

In addition to all this, the proposed infrastructure improvements and traffic solutions that will accompany this project will propel the city of Revere and our regional neighbors into a bright and prosperous future.

I'd like to emphasize the word traffic solution. It has been said but bears repeating, our traffic plan improves every intersection and roadway directly impacted by the resort. The same cannot be said of our

1 neighbors to the West. Again, it seems obvious 2 to me, Mohegan Sun and Suffolk Downs is the 3 right choice for not only the reasons that I 4 have described but for the numerous other ancillary benefits that we in Revere as a 5 6 region can reasonably anticipate. We have the right location. We have 8 the right transportation plan. We have the 9 right mitigation package. Mohegan Sun is the 10 right operator for Massachusetts and the North Shore. Now is the time for Revere and the 11 12 region to move forward. Thank you. 13 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Mr. Reardon 14 and next is Representative RoseLee Vincent. 15 MR. REARDON: Thank you, 16 Commissioners, Ward 4 City Councilor Steven 17 Reardon. I have not had the opportunity to 18 speak to you before. But I do want to thank 19 you all for the tremendous work that you've 20 been doing. 21 I think few people appreciate the 22 difficulties with instituting a completely

novel program, novel legislation, a novel idea

to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

people think that these things can be done with no bumps in the road and that's virtually impossible. I think you folks have done a great job especially in keeping this an open debate for everybody to engage in, especially the people that you see here tonight.

I also appreciate your patience because I know what you've heard is somewhat redundant. So to avoid that, I am hoping to elucidate a little bit on the historical perspective of the gaming industry in Massachusetts particularly here in Revere.

Prior to the 1930s, Revere was
essentially a bedroom community for Lynn
workers who thrived in the factories of Lynn
and Chelsea. We also had a seasonal, obviously
a seasonal tourist industry at Revere Beach.
And believe it or not, we actually had farms in
the city at that time.

Then came the racing legislation in the 1930s. And within a few months of each other, Wonderland and Suffolk Downs both opened to throngs of people coming in and visiting at that time was the only legalized gaming in

Massachusetts, in fact, other than Las Vegas most of the rest of the country.

So, Revere having Suffolk Downs and Wonderland I think I'm not stretching it when I say Revere is the birthplace of the gaming industry in Massachusetts. For many years thereafter the industry thrived. The industry provided great paying jobs, allowed citizens to feed their families, to buy homes in the city, to educate their children and it offered financial security for our residents as well.

As late as the 1970s, the businesses -- the gaming business in Revere was thriving through both of these complexes both at Suffolk Downs and at Wonderland in Revere. And although I was busy working in the family business, most of my friends at that time put themselves through college working at Wonderland Park. And again, the other businesses that thrived were the local businesses including the restaurant café that I worked in.

At one time, in fact, over 30 police officers worked at Wonderland Park and were

able to get overtime pay paid for by Wonderland to address the traffic issues that we dealt And we dealt with those traffic issues without too much complaint. Just in preferences for gaming, unfortunately, including the proliferation of the lotteries and casinos in other jurisdictions made it very difficult to maintain a racing facility and maintain the level of racing that it once had. 

This also coincided with the decline in our tourism on Revere Beach. These phenomena are not unusual. It's fairly true nationwide that racing facilities without the support of gaming revenue in some way, shape or form have difficulty thriving.

So, you can see that this industry

-- And I hate to use the word gaming because

it's sometimes considered to be only gaming. -
this is an industry that has grown much more

than gaming. And this is what Mohegan Sun is

offering.

This marvelous facility that they are proposing to build just a mile or so from here -- And this is what it'll do for our

community. I ask that you grant this license to this project for the city of Revere and Mohegan Sun and allow the rejuvenation and revitalization of the gaming industry here in Revere, which again is the birthplace of the industry in the Commonwealth.

This industry is the very fabric of our community. It is our history and it is our destiny. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you very much, Mr. Reardon. All right, Representative Vincent.

MS. VINCENT: Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to speak today. My name is RoseLee Vincent and I am a proud lifelong Revere resident. I'm here today to voice my wholehearted support for Mohegan Sun's proposal for a Revere casino.

The basic intent of the expanded gaming legislation was to create jobs, generate local aid and be a source of economic growth for the Commonwealth. As a legislator, it is my firm belief that Mohegan Sun Massachusetts meets and exceeds the intention of that bill

better than any other applicant.

Mohegan Sun will be providing 2500 construction jobs and 4000 permanent jobs with preference to local applicants. I'm excited that Mohegan is committed to providing 75 percent of these permanent jobs to people residing within a 15-mile radius. This project will be exactly the type of facility that will fuel sustained economic development for the entire North Shore for generations to come.

The surrounding cities and towns recognize this as well. They've embraced the notion and have all reached generous agreements with Mohegan Sun. This targeted regional economic growth was a driving force behind the legislation. And this proposal ensures just that.

On a personal note, as a lifelong neighbor of Suffolk Downs, I know there are hundreds of jobs at stake, in fact, thousands more across New England dependent on the horse racing industry. A Mohegan Sun Casino would not only preserve those jobs but create job growth within the industry.

1 The bottom line is that a Mohegan 2 Sun Casino in Revere makes perfect sense 3 because of Revere's rich history with Suffolk Downs, its superior location and most 4 5 importantly because Mohegan Sun's proposal not 6 only meets but surpasses the guidelines set forth in the expanded gaming legislation. 8 In closing, thank you for your time 9 and your consideration. It is my hope when all 10 things are considered you will look favorably 11 upon Mohegan Sun Massachusetts. Thank you. 12 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you. 13 MR. ZAMBUTO: Good evening, 14 Commissioners. My name is Anthony Zambuto. 15 am the City Council President. I apologize for 16 being late. I understand I was called while I 17 was still in my car. 18 I want to thank you for an 19 opportunity to speak to you once again. 20 decided what I probably should do is summarize 21 some of the things I talked about before. 22 I told you in my first appearance 23 that I was thrilled to speak after 15 years on 24 this city council to speak for the entire city

council. I don't know if we've ever been in unanimity on anything before, but we certainly are on the fact that Revere, Mohegan Sun should be the casino awarded in this area.

I told you in my first appearance that this is obviously transformational for the city of Revere with economic development and the fact that it will give us more than 20 percent of our budget in growth every year. As someone who served on the city council, I know how important growth is because when I first came on the city council, I learned that you need a certain amount of growth just to sustain what's going on without raising taxes.

This will truly be wonderful for the city of Revere. But more important, it will bring Revere Beach back to the destination it always was. The fact that this is such an outreaching proposal and all of the surrounding communities are really excited about this is because it truly is a rising tide that lifts all boats.

I talked about the traffic solutions in my last appearance. I told you about the

1 Route 16 interchanges that you go on Route 16

2 West to a ramp right to Route 1 North and

3 | eliminate all of that traffic from Bell Circle.

4 | The ramp coming off Route 1 South to Route 16

I talked about the Boardman Street overpass. And really what this will do not just to mitigate the traffic that's going to come to the casino, but to really improve our existing traffic situation here.

We just had the National Sand
Sculpting Festival. I think the estimates were
6- to 700,000 people in three days. We had no
trouble getting them here. One of the reasons
were the Blue Line. A lot of people took
public transportation.

We all know that there's a stop at Mohegan Sun on the Blue Line at Beachmont Station. There's no other casino anywhere that has that kind of an amenity. I just think it's unbelievable what it will do for this region.

All of our partners in the surrounding communities have all truly been

1 cheerleaders because they know what it's going 2 to do for the surrounding communities. 3 bring back -- The Mohegan Sun proposal will 4 really be a destination not just for Revere Beach but Suffolk Downs and Revere Beach have 5 6 always been destinations. It's just going to revitalize it. 8 I guess I know you have a tough 9 decision, but the way I see it you have two 10 different proposals. One's an outreaching 11 proposal that is Mohegan Sun. You see all of 12 our partners and the wonderful agreements 13 they've made with all of the surrounding 14 communities. 15 The other is a Las Vegas model that 16 seeks to keep everybody in that casino and no 17 outreach to anybody else. I hope you decide on 18 Mohegan Sun. Thank you. 19 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr. 20 Zambuto. 21 MR. POWERS: Good afternoon, ladies 22 and gentlemen. I'm sorry for being a little 23 late today. 24 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Mr. Powers?

MR. POWERS: Yes. Councilor Powers,
Ward 5, city of Revere. First of all, I want
to thank all of you as well as Chairman Crosby
for your diligence and all of the input that
you've received and had from residents of the
area.

I'm a little partial towards Suffolk Downs. I was born the day Suffolk Downs opened July 10, 1935. I guess I shouldn't be dating myself.

As Representative Vincent said, the intent of the Legislature when casino gambling was enacted and authorized in Massachusetts was to bring additional revenue into our Commonwealth and to provide jobs for those who are unemployed and those who were to come in the future.

And I think to do that you have to make a casino and an entertainment complex convenient, easy to get to. Otherwise, people won't come. And I'm going to tell you now why I believe that Suffolk Downs, Mohegan Sun is the best location for this casino.

First of all, it'll be built much

There will be no contamination on 1 quicker. 2 that site whatsoever. Secondly, there is no 3 question as to the ownership of that site, 4 who's involved with it and who isn't involved with it. Thirdly, there is a direct rapid 5 6 transit line just four stops from the proposed There's a direct link through the Ted 8 Williams Tunnel from the Mass. Turnpike which will bring tourists in from the East, the South 9 10 and the West at a very good speed.

The potential to build a commuter stop at the rail of Wonderland over in back of Wonderland that would have a walk over similar to what they have at station one over in Medford where people could come from the North Shore, get off there, walk over North Shore Road and go two stops to the proposed casino site. That would not only mitigate traffic to the casino but also traffic that's going to the airport currently.

Recently, a 1900-car garage was built at Wonderland just two stops from the casino site. Eight hotels, five in Revere and three in East Boston and one under

construction, the Hilton Garden Inn, are all on this side of the Callahan, Sumner tunnels. There are three hotel sites in Revere ready to go, the Shaw's site directly across from the proposed casino, the Lido which is two stops away from the proposed casino. And also the trailer park which has been a burden on the

Let me say this, Mohegan Sun has an excellent record of providing gaming, concerts and other entertainment venues, which have resulted in revenue, jobs and services for local businesses in the areas where they operate.

city of Revere for many years that will become

a hotel if this casino license is awarded.

Suffolk Downs for 79 years has provided millions and millions of dollars in tax revenue to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. In addition, countless families in East Boston, Revere and the region through employment at Suffolk Downs have had the necessary income to send their children to college, purchase homes and make life a little better.

Suffolk Downs has not only 4 been a good neighbor, but also has an excellent track record, if you'll excuse the pun. 5 6 time for the Commonwealth to say thank you. do otherwise would be defying logic. 7 8 you. 9 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you very 10 much. All right, I'm going to ask Frank 11 Stringi to come to the podium please. And then 12 the next speaker is John Festa. Mr. Festa, 13 let's use that seat right there next to Councilor Zambuto if I could as the on-deck 14 15 circle, good. Thank you, Councilor. 16 MR. STRINGI: Good afternoon. My17 name is Frank Stringi and I'm the planning 18 director for the city of Revere. I've spoken 19 before the Commission a number of times 20 regarding the merits of Mohegan Sun proposal 21 and what is being done to improve 22 transportation and infrastructure as well as 23 the urban design benefits of the proposal and 24 commitment to open space and green initiatives.

But today, I want to talk about the intangibles. You can't quantify these. You can't put a statistic on them or a rating and they can't be analyzed or evaluated. The first time we met with Mohegan Sun team, we told them our urban design and planning mission was to view this development as an exercise in planning that when completed will demonstrate how a resort casino can not only improve but enrich the quality of life with an urban setting and enhance the economic, cultural and social aspects of the Greater Boston area.

This mission has been very important to the city of Revere as well as the region and to the Gaming Commission. This mission has been the main theme throughout our discussions and during the development of the host community agreement.

I can tell you Mohegan Sun has
listened not only to the wishes of Revere but
to our neighbors in Chelsea, Winthrop, Boston,
Malden, Lynn, Saugus, Salem, Medford,
Cambridge, Everett and Somerville. I
personally have learned from my experience

during many meetings with the Mohegan Sun team that they are willing to go above and beyond the requirements not just to make this project right but to make it acceptable to all parties.

They have addressed each detail with compassion and they've addressed all interests. Throughout every design and site plan review meeting we've had, the Mohegan Sun team has been genuine. The Mohegan Sun team has been understanding. The Mohegan Sun team has been compassionate. And above all, the Mohegan Sun team has listened.

This is what has distinguished this team of professionals from all others from my own personal experience. So, really all of the elements are in place to deliver a high-quality resort casino at this site.

Let's face it, the right development team is here. The history is there. The jobs are there. The infrastructure is there. The regional highway system is there. The public transit system is there. The regional local support is there. And above all, who could be a better neighbor than Revere Beach and Suffolk

Downs and be minutes from Logan International
Airport and downtown Boston.

So, when you look at it in its entirety, there is no other location within the Commonwealth that can deliver like this one.

Again, thank you for coming to the city of Revere. And really, I thank you for the enormous time and personal sacrifice each one of you have put into this process.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: John Festa and Bob Hass, Councilor Bob Haas is the next speaker if he could come the ready chair there.

MR. FESTA: Thank you, Judge McHugh and members of the Gaming Commission. My name is John Festa and I am Director of Economic Development in the city of Revere.

And I'm here once again to let you know just how important the approval of the gaming -- of the Mohegan Sun gaming license would be to our city and in particular to our economic vitality. My family has lived here and invested here for over 60 years. It is a city we love. It is also a city that is at a crossroad.

I have seen Revere's best days, the days when thousands flocked to Revere Beach during the summer months maybe to have a hotdog at Joe and Nemo's or a pizza at Bianchi's or have a roast beef sandwich at our famous Kelly's Roast Beef. Families from near and far would wait patiently in line to ride the bumper cars, the Himalaya or the Virginia Reel. Those were great days.

However, just after the devastating Blizzard of '78, the beach seems to have lost its way. The rides have been destroyed.

Maintenance of the beach went through a decline as a result of state budget cuts and water quality has suffered for many years from neglect prior to the Boston Harbor cleanup.

Today, after years of decline there is a reasonable optimism. Interest in our city has never been stronger. To be clear, a lot of this interest is predicated on what happens at Suffolk Downs. That is why I am here tonight once again to help you understand what this project will mean to our community.

You see, we're not trying to create

and turn ourselves into a tourist town. We
have always been one. The days when Revere was
a thriving tourist destination filled with
opportunity can once become a reality.

However, I am fearful that the interest and
potential resurgence that I've identified may
be for not if Mohegan Sun has not earned the

Let me just cite one example. Prior to November 4 last year, a large existing hotel chain in Revere, eager for expansion had made a proposal for an additional 110 rooms in the city. As a result of the November vote, they withdrew their proposal. They cited their reason for withdrawal as a defeat of the referendum.

Obviously, they did not understand that Revere may have had options, nor did we, until we got final approval from the Commission and holding a second successful referendum.

And you may have seen the recent
MAPC report that indicates that Revere offers
much more in way of collateral investment
opportunities. They visited Revere Beach and

licensed.

seen firsthand what this project could mean to Revere and our region. The opportunities that exist mean more tax revenues to the city and Commonwealth, more jobs and more investment in infrastructure and transportation.

Now that I just mentioned how this will impact regional development, you may know Mayor Rizzo and I have always viewed this as a destination resort style casino as a regional development project.

Let me give you two examples. I spoke with Jay Ash, Town Manager of Chelsea.

And he expressed to me that he has a potential \$150 million commercial project in the waiting if the license gets granted to Mohegan Sun.

Second, I spoke with James Cowdell, Executive Director of Economic Development in Lynn. And he expressed to me that he has two multimillion dollar developments waiting if a license gets granted to Mohegan Sun.

We believe that this type of partnering and regional view have earned us the support of many of our neighboring cities and towns. It is this type of cooperative spirit

that clearly separates us from our competition.

Members of the Commission, I've seen what closing down one track can do for revenue and jobs. And in one day, we saw hundreds of people put out of work, and a 36-acre parcel put dormant where it continues to sit vacant five years later. I don't want to see this happen again.

To help revitalize the Wonderland dog track location, our host community agreement calls for a massive plan to be delivered to the city within one year of the license being granted. In addition, we will benefit a continued interest in development on ongoing Wonderland TOD project and transform an empty nine-acre piece of land formerly occupied by the Shaw's Supermarket site.

In closing, I respectfully ask you members of the Commission to look favorably on the application as presented to you by Mohegan Sun. And I want you to look at all of the aspects of their proposal and compare all of the criteria to the competition. I'm confident you will see they are a clear choice from jobs

and economic development. Thank you for your time.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr. Festa. All right, Councilor Haas and then next will be Mayor Judith Kennedy of Lynn. Mayor Kennedy if you'd come down and be prepared to take the next step.

MR. HAAS: Ladies and gentlemen, my name is Bob Haas. I reside at 350 Revere Beach Boulevard. I'm a city councilor currently and I served eight years as mayor of this fine city.

I'd just like to review a lot of issues that we addressed in the past. First of all, jobs, jobs, jobs, jobs. We're all talking about the jobs. They're going to be 75 percent within the 25-mile radius of Revere. That's economic stimulus at its best.

Grant economic development as I spoke be reaching out to all of the people who have joined Mohegan Sun in their awards program. And that's another stimulus factor.

Then you look at the quick-end resorts no long-term environmental concerns.

If you look at Revere, we have no major environmental concerns. Where if you look at the other company they have major economic and environmental concerns.

Also, all of the abutting citizens and towns they are all committed to this area. You have all of the surrounding communities namely, Everett, Revere, East Boston or Boston, they all of them have joined the agreement to go forward with this project. And they're going to work in partnership.

They're going to bring the city and state roads up to date, something the city of Revere cannot afford to do. We're talking about this will keep live racing. We talk about live racing. If we do not get Mohegan Sun approved for this site, live racing will die. At least it guaranteed it to continue for at least 15 years. And I think that's a major consideration.

Also, transportation is already as indicated before we have four stations within a mile of it, two on the property of it. And also, we're looking at what happens now if you

1 look at what's going on.

The jobs, jobs and jobs. The best boost of the economy will be Mohegan Sun a quicker end results. No economic cleanup of the environmental in Revere compared to our opponent. All surrounding communities have agreed to this. So, I basically say as a former mayor, city councilor, I think it's a great opportunity for the city of Revere, for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and for the general area.

I believe it's a no-brainer, but you people have to look at all of the facts and figures here. I mentioned a couple of things but I didn't want to be redundant and mention a lot of things that were already said in the past.

So, I thank you as a lifelong resident of the city of Revere. And hopefully when you make your decision, it will be Revere and Mohegan Sun. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you,
Councilor Haas. Mayor Kennedy and the City
Manager Ash, Jay Ash will be next if you'd come

forward. Good afternoon.

THE HON. JUDITH KENNEDY: Good afternoon, Commissioners. I have spoken to the casino commission before. And I will reiterate today my unqualified support for the siting of a casino in Revere.

However, there is one aspect of siting the casino here and specifically in choosing Mohegan Sun that I did not touch on in my earlier testimony. I have had an opportunity to go with a delegation from Lynn down to Mohegan Sun in Connecticut to get a look at how the casino operates behind the scenes.

And the reason why I wanted to go there was not to learn the inside secrets of the gaming industry, but to look at how the employees are treated. Because we all know that there are a lot of things that go into defining a good job.

And one of those parts of that definition is how the employees are treated. And I can tell you, there were people with smiles on their faces everywhere I went from

the food prepares to the custodians to the people who worked in maintaining the hotel.

The gentleman from upper management who was taking us through the casino and through the hotel operations knew many of these employees by name.

So, while it is important to bring jobs to the area, and very much so in the case of my city of Lynn, I also think it's important to bring good jobs where people are treated with dignity from the top down to the bottom.

I have seen with my own eyes that Mohegan Sun does this. And I would like you to take that fact into consideration when you're deciding to whom to grant this casino license. Thank you for listening to me.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you very much. Mr. Ash and Kate Fox will be the next speaker. Mr. Ash.

MR. ASH: Thank you. The gaming law mentions region or regional 45 times. That's significant because the Region A license should benefit more than just the host community of either Revere or Everett. It should also

benefit the entire region.

Since we last spoke, it has become evident that one of the two casino applicants has continued a decidedly regional approach to their potential development while the other continues to ignore regional equity.

The former is Mohegan Sun with 12 voluntary surrounding community agreements negotiated and no arbitration petitions needed to address its responsibilities and desires to have a positive impact on the greater Revere region. Mohegan easily outdistances Wynn.

Wynn has only one-third of the voluntary agreements Mohegan does, only four. And Wynn chose to take the legal route to beat back the concerns of its most proximate neighbors, Boston, Somerville and Chelsea, while Mohegan heeded those concerns and found a way to alleviate them including in Boston, Somerville and Chelsea.

For years, I have said that our communities being overrun by the potential negatives associated with casinos is not inevitable. Combating that inevitability

requires a true partnership and a genuine respect between all of the communities to be impacted and our casino host.

I am most concerned and deeply disappointed by the refusal of Wynn to accept the obligations they have to address impacts in our region and to ensure that the development is at least a neutral if not a positive in surrounding communities.

Conversely, as evident by the sheer number of surrounding community agreements

Mohegan Sun was able to negotiate, it is obvious to me who is looking out for surrounding communities, namely Mohegan Sun.

And who could care less about surrounding communities and I truly believe that is Wynn.

As you've heard me say before, if we and I can't get Wynn now to want to be cooperative with us when arguably we're needed the most, then what shot do we have collectively when they are awarded a license and need nothing from us?

And let's not agree to allow lip service of the support of the region to be

acceptable evidence when it is so much more easily quantifiable by the financial commitment each proponent is making to its surrounding communities.

I would respectfully suggest that evidence is these following numbers that should absolutely guide your decision-making. Mohegan Sun has committed \$25 million annually in payments to surrounding communities to mitigate potential impacts and ensure that our communities are positioned to grow along with its operation. \$25 Million compared just \$3.5 million by Wynn, \$25 million versus \$3.4 million.

In today's dollars that's \$325
million less for surrounding communities if you
are to accept the Wynn proposal. I say in
today's dollars, because the gap is even wider
when you consider that in what can only be
interpreted as an act to punish those who were
not as supportive of the Wynn proposal. The
Wynn arbitration proposals did not include
inflation adjustments, while the Mohegan Sun
voluntary agreements do so.

1 So, the \$325 million gap is going to 2 work out to be significantly more all at the 3 expense of those surrounding communities that 4 have been ignored by Wynn while championed by 5 Mohegan. 6 I'm for Mohegan because their core business is here in New England and they've 7 8 been part of us for 400 years. I'm for Mohegan 9 because Mitchell Etess thought it important 10 enough to visit my office to talk about how we 11 can promote the region's vitality instead of 12 sending the lawyers. I am for Mohegan because 13 they'll be located in a place that has been a 14 center of regional economy for 75 years and not 15 a toxic wasteland. 16 So, I would ask you to support 17 Mohegan Sun. The region supports them and we 18 hope you will as well. Thank you. 19 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: All right. 20 Kate Fox and the next speaker is Patricia 21 Gentilli. Ms. Fox. 22 Thank you for the MS. FOX: 23 opportunity to speak today. My name is Kate 24 Fox and I am the Executive Director of the

Office of Tourism and Cultural Affairs in

Salem, Massachusetts. I'm also on the Board of

Directors of the North of Boston Convention and

Visitors Bureau. But today, I am here on

behalf of Mayor Kim Driscoll. And I'd like to

submit her remarks as she is unable to attend.

Mayor Driscoll submits, dear members of the Commission, I would like to express my support for the proposed resort casino to be located in the city of Revere at the current Suffolk Downs site.

Salem is located just a few miles north of the proposed location. And I look forward to collaborating with officials from Mohegan Sun and Suffolk Downs as well as my colleagues in the city of Revere on areas of shared concerns, specifically the economic opportunities this developer would provide to our region.

The new jobs that will come from the proposed resort casino will help many people in the construction industry here on the North Shore who have suffered higher unemployment over the last economic recession than many

1 other types of workers.

In addition, once up and running the proposed development will create many new permanent and stable jobs with good benefits for residents of our region.

Finally, we anticipate the proposed casino development will have positive impact on the growth of our own local tourism and hospitality industry.

clearly, a multimillion dollar expenditure to improve the area of Revere will be a boost to the entire North Shore region. Support the efforts to appropriately redevelop this site and know that it will provide extensive benefits to our local economy, increase job opportunities and enhance the growth of our hospitality, travel and tourism industries. Very truly yours, Kim Driscoll, Mayor, city of Salem.

And as the director of Destination Salem, I couldn't agree more. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Ms.

Fox. President Gentilli and the next will be Vincent Ragucci.

1 MS. GENTILLI: Good afternoon, Commissioner. My name is Patricia Gentilli. 2 3 And I'm the President at North Shore Community 4 College with a campus in nearby Lynn. 5 I had the pleasure of testifying 6 before your committee on behalf of the statewide community colleges in June. At that 8 time I explained that I started with North 9 Shore in January 2014. But prior to that I was 10 the dean at Atlantic Cape Community College in 11 Southern New Jersey who oversaw the Casino 12 Career Institute as well as other 13 responsibilities. 14 In that position, I worked closely 15 for 14 years in partnership with all of the 16 casino and hotel resort properties in Atlantic 17 City. During my tenure with Atlantic Cape, I 18 traveled extensively to many new gaming venues 19 to help higher public education, gaming 20 commissions, enforcement agencies and other 21 entities with education programs geared to the 22 gaming industry, including domestic and 23 international partnerships.

One of the public community colleges

I had the pleasure of helping was Three Rivers Community College in Connecticut with its education program in collaboration with Mohegan Tribal Nations Mohegan Sun Resort. It was through that work that I first got to know the human resources executives, culture and educational interests of both the Tribe and the casino and hotel operations.

Then in the fall of 2012, Resorts

Atlantic City partnered in a management
operations agreement with Mohegan Sun who
became the first Indian-owned casino operator
to enter the Atlantic City market.

Due to the positive relationships already established by Atlantic Cape Community College, the new management quickly became a collaborative education and training partner in the Atlantic City Casino Consortium that my community college had established in 1992 and which continues to bring education and training services to both potential and incumbent gaming and hospitality workers.

As Mohegan Sun looks to establish a presence in Eastern Massachusetts due to its

positive past collaborative agreements with

public community colleges, I look forward to a

strong public/private endeavor to ensure that

area residents are given opportunities to get

the training and education needed to take the

thousands of jobs that would be created with a

casino resort in Revere.

Thank you for the opportunity to address the Massachusetts Gaming Commission on the Mohegan Sun project.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you,
President Gentilli. Mr. Ragucci and Jay
Campbell is next. Mr. Ragucci.

MR. RAGUCCI: Thank you, Mr.

Chairman, thank you Commissioners. My name is

Vincent Ragucci, Jr.

And as an Everettite, I want to tell the people of Revere, especially the Mayor of our condolences for the loss of one of your people last night in the fire. And also we hope for a speedy recovery from your tornado and the damage that it did to your city. I hope the correctness happens as quickly as the tornado went through.

1 Think about this for a minute.

Everett and Revere look like we are preparing for a World War III. Many of the people here remember the great football team and football games that were played between Everett and Revere for many, many, many years. Thanks to the MIAA that doesn't happen any longer.

I personally have attended almost every hearing and I've been involved with Everett United for over two plus years. The point is at every single meeting, somebody is there from the Wynn group. They explain to us every piece of business, everything that is happening so that the entire group knows exactly what's going on.

When we attend these hearings, it's not personal against the people of Revere.

It's against Mohegan Sun and the people at Mohegan Sun for not telling the people of Revere everything that they should know about the agreements that have been signed.

I'm a former retired banker. And in my banking career, hedge funds were the last place you went for financing because of the

extreme high payments that have to be paid to those funds. Just as important Mohegan Sun has set up a number of individual corporations.

So, what happens is if the corporation hits a breakeven point and there is no place other than from gambling profits for the hedge fund to take its income from, guess what, the cities and towns that have all of these great, according to what some of the speakers have said, have these agreements are not going to get paid. That includes the city of Boston.

Those are the important things that I wish and I hope that the Commissioners review. Wynn is going to build a five-star hotel.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: No, no, no.

Just a minute now just a minute. We are here
to listen to everybody who has something to
say. So, let's do that please. Mr. Ragucci,
go ahead.

MR. RAGUCCI: Thank you. Wynn is going to build a five-star resort. Mohegan Sun is going to build a three-star resort. At the

1 same time, it's \$100 almost a \$200 billion 2 commitment. Profits from Wynn are guaranteed. 3 Money will come into the cities and towns for 4 the duration that they are in business in this 5 So, Commissioners I hope you take all state. 6 of that into consideration. COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you very 8 much, Sir. Jay Campbell is the next speaker to 9 be followed by Jim Buckley. Mr. Campbell.

MR. CAMPBELLL: Thank you very much for allowing me to speak here tonight. My name is Jay Campbell. I work in Charlestown. I live in Medford. I'm one of those poor people that are going to be stuck in traffic if Wynn builds the casino. That's the standard thought process.

I've spoken to the Commission

before. I actually think Wynn is a better

hotel, a better development than Mohegan Sun.

And I really never planned on speaking here at

the Commission. One of the reasons -- There's

a whole bunch of reasons why but I just believe

that it's better.

But I never planned on speaking at

the Commission here until I read a week ago or
two weeks ago about the financial reports and
how Wynn did and how Mohegan did. I've never
been to the Wynn Casino. I've been to the
Mohegan Sun Casino. I never really thought much
about it until I started looking into it.

And I was really alarmed when I started to research it and surprised for a whole bunch of reasons. The biggest surprise to me was Brigade the 60 percent owner with the capital. Looking into the developments that they're involved with Trump which is now being shut down. They're being sued. And they have stock shares.

Out in Las Vegas, they attempted to do the same type of thing they're trying to do here. They were one of the financial backers of a resort out in Las Vegas that never was built. And I looked at the court records because they just won an appeal and now they're going back to sue. There's 44 venture funds involved with this lawsuit.

So, I asked myself how many people are going to own this project? Mohegan is

1 doing something that I think makes sense. 2 New York they're hoping to get one of the 3 licenses to build in upstate New York. 4 they're doing a 50-50 ownership with the landlord, with the owner, with the developer. 5 Here you have an owner that won't do 6 7 anything for the development. And the people 8 who are going to be running it are minority They only own, I believe, 40 percent, 9 10 30 or 40 percent. You have the 60 percent 11 owner, which is venture-capital firm, which 12 one of the ones that they're involved with have 13 just been downgraded by Moody's to basically 14 they're not returning any of their financials. 15 At least that was the last thing Woody's had 16 reported in 2012. There's all of these red flags to 17 18 I don't understand how it's going to work. 19 I don't understand from reading one of the 20 articles saying that Mohegan in Boston will 21 have nothing to do with Mohegan in Connecticut. 22 They won't be allowed to advertise or promote 23 in Revere. Does that mean they can't have any 24 advertisements?

1 If you go in the North End, you'll 2 see displays, billboards on some of the 3 different items saying we're closer than you 4 think. We're only 90 minutes away. Springfield is 90 minutes away. It just 5 6 doesn't make sense. The Fitch ratings, Moody's have all talked about downgrading some of the 8 casinos because of regional. 9 The Wynn casino brings in 10 international plus being a local. I just think 11 there's a lot of questions. A lot of things 12 that to me that just don't make sense. One of 13 the biggest things that didn't make sense was, 14 you probably know about this group, Keep Vegas-15 Style Casinos Out of Neighborhoods. That's in the state of California. 16 17 They're putting on a proposal right 18 now that they want to save that any Indian 19 owners, Tribal owners have to stay on their 20 reservation. They cannot build casinos outside 21 of the reservation. That's what Mohegan Sun 22 wants to do. 23 This group is funded by Brigade

Capital. They spent over a million dollars on

- this initiative. Over \$1 million on a

  statewide ballot that they got on there to say

  that casinos shouldn't be in neighborhoods,

  which this one is. And it shouldn't be run by

  tribal organizations, which this one will be.

  I just all of the way around it just doesn't

  make sense to me.

  I just want thank you. I'll leave
  - I just want thank you. I'll leave it with that. And I just wanted to leave my binder with somebody that shows the stuff that I pulled up and why.
  - COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Right there.

    Thank you very much. All right, Mr. Buckley,

    Mr. Jim Buckley and John Vitagliano will be the

    next speaker after Mr. Buckley.
  - MR. BUCKLEY: Good evening everyone and thank you to the Commission for allowing me the time to speak this evening. My name is Jim Buckley and I'm a lifelong resident of East Boston.
  - My grandmother was born and raised on Leyden Street. She married my grandfather and built a home on Ashley Street, where they still reside today. And my mother has owned

and operated a business in Eastie for over 30 years. So, my roots are strongly entrenched in this community.

I grew up playing Pop Warner in East Boston Stadium, baseball at Noyes Park and basketball at the Orient Heights Community Center. As an adult, I'm active in the community as a board member for two separate East Boston organizations. And in my personal work as a financial services professional, my business runs over 30 percent through clients that have ties to East Boston.

For these reasons and many more, I'm very passionate about East Boston and about the North Shore community. Just like every other person who is passionate about a cause or a community, they have both pros and cons when discussing that passion. The pros to me are the community atmosphere, the close-knit environment, and the neighbor type mentality where people are always willing to help others before themselves.

Cons to living and working in this community are mostly based around

infrastructure. The schools need work. And in turn, great young families who love it here move to the suburbs for better school

The public fields, such as Noyes

Park where I played as a kid, are neglected due

to budget cuts and are now unattractive to kids

who want to play sports at the park.

And of course, everyone here can tell you that traffic is terrible. Whether it is in the morning when you sit on Boardman Street as a cop lets five cars at a time through the light only to turn it back to red. Or whether it is evening as you sit in traffic out at the tunnel, dreaming of a four-lane highway on a two-lane street.

Thanks to the partnership with

Mohegan Sun and Suffolk Downs, we have found

our solution. You want to fix the traffic

problem, how about \$45 million in road

improvements including an overpass to relieve

that cop and his five-car rule at Boardman

Street. How about additional lanes alleviating

the backup in the tunnels? I would vote yes to

districts.

that.

Need to improve the school system, how about \$18 million directly towards educational programs and process improvements including job training for school staff. How about an additional \$30 million to improve the infrastructure of the Umana Middle School along with building a brand-new youth center for the kids to go during the winter and remaking Noyes Park for the kids to play in the summer. I would also vote yes to that.

In college, I studied as an economics major where I learned the difference between micro versus macroeconomics. At a micro-level sure there are cons to a casino as there are in any business.

But at the macro-level there are cons to not getting this casino. Without this license, Suffolk Downs, a staple in our community and an economic engine for jobs could close. Not only will 4000 jobs not be created, but 2000 jobs could be lost. That's 6000 families affected negatively by this decision. Without our license, our schools continue to

age, the parks will rot away and yes, traffic will still suck.

Over the last decade the city has grown in pockets, first in the explosion of Somerville, biotech companies and young professionals. Then it was Charlestown and the renewed vigor at the Navy Yard. And most recently, it's been South Boston and the Seaport district was completely redone.

Well, now it's East Boston's time to shine. The harbor front is ready to be built on. The ferries are adding their stops.

Orient Heights T stop has been overhauled. And the signature business of East Boston, Suffolk Downs, is bringing a casino to this great city.

And I would vote yes to that. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: John
Vitagliano and next is Morris Morris. Mr.
Vitagliano.

MR. VITAGLIANO: Commissioners, my name is John Vitagliano. I live in Winthrop. I was born in Winthrop. I've lived there for most of life except for 12 years when I lived --

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Just a minute,
just a minute. Quiet please so that we can
hear Mr. Vitagliano. Thank you.

MR. VITAGLIANO: Thank you,

Commissioners. I live in Winthrop. I was born
in Winthrop. I've lived there for most of my
life except for 12 years when I lived in East
Boston.

And I am a strong supporter of the Mohegan Sun Resort Casino proponent for Revere. And I urge the Commission to vote affirmatively for the Mohegan Sun design. There are many, many benefits for this proposal for the city of Revere that you've already heard. From the standpoint of the town of Winthrop, we would benefit enormously from the very generous surrounding community agreement that has already been agreed to. \$2 Million a year to my town would be of enormous economic benefit to our town, which has been somewhat stagnant economically.

Another issue for example that we've all thought about is what would this proposed casino actually look like. That question was

answered today very well, far better than I could by the American Institute of Architects in their letter to you. And I happen to see the Boston Business Journal article that referenced this issue.

This is a major issue for those of us who live around here and will be looking at this structure for some time. And the assessment of the American Institute of Architects when they did their comparative analysis of the Mohegan Sun design proposal versus that of the Wynn proposal speaks for itself.

It's basically night and day. The Wynn proposal was actually recommended by the American Institute of Architects to be dismissed and urging Wynn to simply start out all over again because it is such a bad design. And I would concur with that.

And I think that's an important consideration for all of us who live in this region, because again your decision will be a decision that affects the entire region not only the great city of Revere.

Also by the way, I've been involved in transportation projects for a long time. I was a member of the Massachusetts Port Authority for 14 years on the board for a record. And I am thoroughly familiar with the transportation issues in this area.

And I am completely convinced that the transportation proposals that Mohegan Sun has put on the table as part of their proposal will completely resolve any of issues that are attendant on their proposed casino.

In fact, go actually two or three steps further and actually relieving a number of existing transportation bottlenecks that have not been able to be resolved through the standard public sector funding sources.

So, with that again, I urge you to approve as soon as possible and completely the Mohegan Sun Casino proposal for Revere. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr. Vitagliano. All right, Morris Morris. And next to speak is David Coombs, if you'd come to the on-deck chair. Mr. Morris.

MR. MORRIS: Thank you for letting me speak before you. First of all, I want to thank Mayor Dan Rizzo right here who did a terrific job when we had the tornado. Thank you Mayor, God Bless you.

I want to thank Mr. Danny Goodwin from public works that helped clean up the city in two or three days when some towns take months. Thank you, Danny.

And I want to thank the fire department that came down to our senior center to shut off the gas, because I was there when the tornado hit. I also want to thank Chief Cafarelli of the police who did a beautiful job coordinating it.

But most of all Mayor Dan Rizzo set up a fund to help the people that lost their homes. Some people lost their businesses and they lost their jobs. So, he's helping to make a contribution to that.

But you people can make the best donation to the city of Revere by giving us the casino. That would be your contribution. I would also like to thank the casino, Peter

- 1 | Schultz, Chip Tuttle, they made a donation to
- 2 the tornado fund. Nobody asked them to do it.
- 3 They did it because they give us community
- 4 | service and not lip service.
- 5 Also, I heard people talk about
- 6 | Everett making a five-star hotel and Mohegan
- 7 | three-star hotel. When I look at this book and
- 8 | I look at the pictures of this hotel, to me it
- 9 looks like a 10-star hotel.
- 10 Also, I would like to say, unless
- 11 I'm wrong on this one, Everett is going to
- 12 donate \$50,000 to businesses, Mohegan Sun \$10
- 13 million. That's a 200 to one ratio, my friend.
- 14 | So, for one dollar you're going to make \$200.
- 15 And that's what the city of Revere is going to
- 16 do. We're going to get that casino.
- 17 Also, before we go ahead with
- 18 | Everett we have 850 plus jobs now, now not
- 19 tomorrow but now. These people at Suffolk
- 20 Downs with Chip Tuttle in charge have done a
- 21 fabulous job. They've hired veterans. And
- 22 | that's what we need more jobs, more veterans to
- 23 do it. So, I hope they take care of that.
- 24 And last but not least, I happen to

be a senior. I was there during the tornado
when it was hit. We lost a lot of things that
day at the senior center. And when the casino
comes in, the first thing they said to us they
would help us. So, they do give us community
service and not lip service like I always say
to them.

I've got 57 seconds. I just want to repeat to you again, the Gaming Commission, when you vote make sure you vote for the city of Revere because we are way ahead of every city in Massachusetts to have the casino here. You've weighed the pros and the cons and I hope these people that win the casino give themselves a big hand for coming here.

I want to thank you each and every one. I know you don't answer questions. But if I can ask you one, I would like to know what happens if there's a two-to-two vote, how does that work out?

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Oh, it's not going to happen, Mr. Morris.

MR. MORRIS: Okay, thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: It's a tough

act to follow. Mr. Coombs and then Lorene Schettino.

MR. COOMBS: Thank you. My name is David Coombs. And I'm the Executive Vice

President of Steve Connolly's Seafood Company.

First of all, I appreciate the opportunity to come and speak to you about the casino proposal. But I also think I might have found a new salesman. That guy has more enthusiasm than anybody that I deal with.

We're a fresh seafood company with plants in Boston and Gloucester and Nantucket Island. And our customers are primarily fourand five-star and diamond clients in the hotel, resort and high-end cruise line and private club business across the country and down in the Caribbean.

And I'm proud to say we have sold seafood to Mohegan Sun down in Connecticut since 1996. We consider Mohegan Sun to be a great client and a pleasure to do business with. They are professional in their approach to buying, pay within terms. They're really an ideal customer from both of those standpoints,

especially the economy the way it is these days. And our experience with Mohegan has been nothing but positive since day one.

Coincidentally, our plant in Boston is at 34 New Market Square which is a main area for wholesale food distributors in the Boston area, probably in the state. We're active members of the New Market Business Association, which represents us and all of our neighbors including those in the dreaded meat and poultry businesses.

But I have to say Mohegan has made a solid effort reach out to members of the association to talk about what they buy and also their plans to source locally. Hopefully, if this project comes to fruition it will lead to good solid business for a lot of local companies. I support Mohegan in their efforts to obtain a license. Thank you for your time.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr. Coombs. Lorene Schettino and John Nazzaro will be next. Mr. Nazzaro, if you would come to the front. Ms. Schettino.

MS. SCHETTINO: My name is Lorene

1 | Schettino and I'm a lifelong resident of East

2 Boston as well as a local business owner of 3 East Boston.

I want to first commend the

Commission and Mayor Walsh for reaching a

surrounding community agreement. I live on

Leyden Street, which is an abutting street of

Boardman Street. And the overpass is very

important to me.

There are mornings that I can't even get off my street to drive a few blocks to my office. This is a much needed improvement that will not happen if Mohegan Sun and Suffolk Downs are not awarded a license.

I'd also like to add that Suffolk

Downs is a great neighbor. And I would hate to

see the track shut down and the jobs and

potential jobs lost.

I am sure that Mohegan Sun will follow suit on being part of the community.

Finally, I plan on remaining in East Boston for the rest of life. And I feel that the surrounding community agreement will only make East Boston a better place to live than it

1 already is today. Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you.

Mr. Nazzaro followed by Chip Tuttle.

FR. NAZZARO: Hi, my name is Father John Nazzaro. And I am the Executive Director of the Salesian Boys and Girls Club. We service young people from East Boston, Revere and Winthrop.

And I welcome the opportunity to speak publicly this afternoon to publicly affirm Mr. Fields and Mr. Chip Tuttle for their association with our Boys and Girls Club for over seven years sponsoring our scholarship dinner.

In June, we have a scholarship dinner to help needy kids. I just left 200 kids at our camp that we have. Over half of them benefited from that scholarship dinner that is hosted by Suffolk Downs and this past year Mohegan Sun helped as well.

It's very important to know that the young people need help. And I don't think anyone here would disagree with that. I feel in my heart that the association we've had with

Suffolk Downs and with Mohegan Sun will help us impact more young people that we serve at the Salesian Boys and Girls Club.

I feel that it's important for everyone to know that the most precious gift we have is our young people. And our young people need help. Each morning when I get up in the morning I say the same prayer. Each time I say mass, I say the same prayer.

I pray that young people may be the sign of hope and future for a better world that we have. And I pray for the young people who've run away from home, those who have succumbed to the allurements of substance abuse that the love and mercy of God may help them are a positive example like we have at the Salesian Boys and Girls Club will help them to be recovered, productive and wonderful citizens in our community. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Fr. Nazzaro. Mr. Tuttle and Wanda Geer is next. Mr. Tuttle.

MR. TUTTLE: Thank you members of the Commission. Chip Tuttle from the

surrounding community of Salem. Thank you Father John for your kind words.

Commissioners, thanks very much for the chance to address you again and for your diligence and your patience, especially your patience throughout this process. When it began, I didn't need these glasses to read my remarks.

While I've had the privilege in the past of addressing you as an applicant, today I'm here representing the people that you oversee as the regulators of thoroughbred racing in Massachusetts. Honoring your request that we restrict our remarks today to events since June 24th, I want to talk specifically about Suffolk Downs' agreement with the city of Boston, its recent agreement with Boston and what that means for the future.

Our separate agreement with Boston was signed the week of July 7, the same week that Suffolk Downs turned 79, and the same week that Mohegan Sun and Boston finalized a generous surrounding community agreement.

As you know, Mohegan Sun is leasing

40 acres of our property in Revere. agreement with Boston requires that we, Suffolk Downs, master-plan the Boston side of the property with the city in ways that complement Mohegan Sun's development. But most important, the agreement provides a legal requirement for us to race for at least the initial 15-year term of the Region A gaming license should that license be awarded to Mohegan Sun.

The agreement legally requires us to live up to the public pledge that we made to you in January to preserve and enhance Suffolk Downs' 79-year legacy as one of the areas sporting and entertainment venues. And we were happy to include that language in our agreement with Boston because it's consistent with our vision for the future of our facility.

A better customer experience, acres of open space, more park like with paddocks where people can get up close and appreciate the horses. And more than a racing and simulcast facility, a multi-use equestrian recreational facility and a community resource, a venue for special events, entertainment and

charitable causes. Perhaps the host to the equestrian games in the 2024 Boston Olympiad.

Over the last few months, and again, I'm sure you'll hear from people tonight, several members from the diverse, hard-working group of people whose livelihoods depend upon the future of Suffolk Downs. You heard from Maryann Wright at one of your hearings, a mutuel clerk worried about where she turns if her job and health benefits go way.

You heard from young Janelle
Campbell who wants to follow in the footsteps
of her aunt, Tammi Piermarini one of the
leading riders in the country wants to do it
here, not in Pennsylvania or Florida.

You've heard from some of the most pie-eyed hopeful optimistic people in the world, Massachusetts thoroughbred breeders who just keep going whose businesses support family farms and a way of life, and who watched as their contemporaries in neighboring states thrive with proceeds from expanded gaming while they struggle for one more year.

People ask me all of the time what

1 happens to Suffolk Downs if Mohegan Sun does 2 not earn this license? Unfortunately, the area 3 will lose a part of its history. It may take a 4 few years but the track will be developed. 5 sits on 160 acres on two MBTA stations and a 6 regional highway minutes from an international airport in downtown Boston. Our owners will be fine. I'll be fine. I'm fortunate and have 8 other business interests. 9 10 But what about Maryann Wright and 11 about Janelle Campbell? What happens to 12 Lorenzo and Able Juarez, brothers, stable hands 13 for our leading trainer Jay Bernardini. One a 14 recent US citizen, the other going through the 15

process trying to make better lives for their families? What happens to the hundreds of other people like them? What happens to George Brown's farm in Rehoboth and the dozens of others like it throughout the Commonwealth?

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr.

Tuttle. Thank you very much. We get the point.

MR. TUTTLE: We appreciate your consideration for these people. Thank you.

MS. GEER: Thank you, Commissioners, for allowing us this forum to speak in support of Mohegan Sun proposed casino in Revere. This is Mary Reed my Mom. We represent Tartts

Daycare Center.

Tartts Daycare Center is a multigenerational family business spanning six decades. Established in 1946, Tartts remains 100 percent minority owned and 100 percent family-owned. We are one of Boston's oldest minority- and women-owned businesses. Tartts is an equal opportunity employer with over 40 full- and part-time employees and we operate out of two Boston locations.

The reason we support Mohegan Sun's bid for the proposed Revere casino is because we believe that Mohegan Sun has a sincere commitment to providing quality child care for their employees. The positive and thoughtful conversations we have had with Mohegan Sun's team regarding childcare have demonstrated to us that they understand that staff morale and

retention are just a few of the many benefits
of having an on-site childcare for their
employees.

Mohegan Sun recognizes that
employees will appreciate the peace of mind
that on-site childcare provides. Children will
be within walking distance of employees'
workplace and are attending a curriculum based
early learning program with a proven track
record of excellence. My Mom, Mary Reed will
be finishing the comments.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you Ms.

Geer. Ms. Reed.

MS. REED: Thank you, Commissioners.

Let me just extend again, my thank you to all of you for allowing us to be here. Tartts, as my daughter has said, has established a reputation as one of Boston's premier brands in high-quality early childhood education.

We do not advertise. We rely solely on word-of-mouth. And yet Mohegan Sun approached us proving that they have a careful consideration -- they have given careful consideration to their commitment to diversity

and more importantly to high-quality for the choice of vendor.

So, I have a question. What is the value of a partnership with Mohegan Sun? Well, Mohegan Sun shares Tartts' vision of excellence in childcare for their employees. And Mohegan has a proven track record of excellence in service for their patrons.

Thank you again for the opportunity to voice our support for Mohegan Sun. We're excited by the possibilities they offer, their perception and the value they will bring to Revere and Massachusetts as a whole. Thank you very much.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Ms. Reed. All right. The next speaker is Richard Feinberg followed by Louis Ciarlone.

MR. FEINBERG: Thank the four of you for coming to Revere. My name is Richard Feinberg. And I live in Swampscott. And for those who don't know, that's about seven or eight miles down the road.

My wife and I are both retired school teachers. And I teach US Government and

Politics at Bunker Hill Community College as an adjunct. And if you're nice to me at the end of my brief presentation I will tell you who will be the next president in 2016.

First, let me tell you that my wife and I are the quintessential small gambler. We like to go to casinos and we play a game called two four hold'em poker. Not the big game that you see on television, just a small game where we'll sit for three or four hours. Maybe win a hundred, maybe lose a hundred, but I assure you we won't spend the family grocery money.

I would also like to tell you that I've been to a lot of casinos of my life and there are none better than Mohegan Sun in Connecticut. They are impeccably clean, but more importantly than that I think of Demoulas when I think of the employees. They love their job. They love their bosses and they are type of people that make it a pleasure to go there. Whether you're handicapped, my wife sometimes has to be pushed around in a wheelchair. Whether you're a senior citizen, they can't do enough to make sure that you have a good time.

1 I'm just going to say quickly, I 2 don't know Mayor Rizzo, but I have watched him 3 during this debate for gaming. I don't think 4 you could find a better spokesman for his city. 5 I want you to know I've never met Mayor Rizzo 6 and I've only seen him on television a few times, but he's really made a good classy 8 presentation for his city of Revere which will benefit the North Shore and the entire state. 9 10 And I think that if Mohegan Sun runs 11 like they do in Connecticut -- And I'm sure 12 Mayor Rizzo will make sure they do. He's got a lot at stake here. -- I think we've got a 13 14 number one facility. 15 Finally, I would like to tell you that the next president in 2016 will be a 16 It will be a woman whose husband was 17 woman. 18 already president, but it will not be Eleanor Roosevelt. Thank you. 19 20 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Mr. Ciarlone, 21 Sue Sullivan is next please. 22 MR. CIARLONE: Commissioners 23 Cameron, Zuniga, Stebbins and McHugh, thank you 24 for allowing me to address you once again

today. My name Louis Ciarlone and I live at 410 Park Avenue in Revere.

I am currently a business agent for IBEW Local 103, the union that represents the vast majority of the unionized workforce at Suffolk Downs. I worked at Suffolk Downs as a mutuel clerk for over 22 years and was previously elected as their spokesperson by my fellow employees for 12 years.

I would first like to commend

Mohegan Sun, Suffolk Downs and the city of

Boston for a thorough, fair and generous

surrounding community agreement. By placing

the guarantee of live thoroughbred racing into

that agreement, the three parties have

reinforced the original letter of commitment

that Suffolk Downs gave to the Commission.

There can now be no doubt that racing will continue at Suffolk Downs well into the future if Mohegan Sun is granted the Region A license. The members I represent could not be more thankful or happy by the placement of this provision into the Boston agreement.

This will probably be the last time

I will be able to address this Commission
before you make your final decision on the
Region A application. I speak for the hundreds
of workers at Suffolk Downs, workers with good
jobs and benefits, workers who perform their
jobs with dignity and confidence for decades.

Workers who can point to family ties with Suffolk Downs that date back more than a half a century. Workers who have bonded as a family. Workers who have grown up in the thoroughbred racing industry. Suffolk Downs has little to no employee turnover. Many of the full-time workers who work at Suffolk Downs have worked there as their only job from the time they were 18 years old.

I'm talking about a family of workers, a generation of workers. Workers who respect the company and a company that respects them, not much unlike our brothers and sisters at Wonderland a few short years ago. I was there that fateful day when similar bonds that I have described to you were dissolved and broken by a ballot question.

I watched as Representative

Reinstein and the Wonderland workers cried when those doors were shutting. Hardly any of the workers at Wonderland could find a job that duplicated the good union jobs that they lost. I resent the fact that some of our detractors can cavalierly dismiss these good jobs at Suffolk Downs and in the racing industry as routinely as throwing out a pair of old shoes.

These are jobs performed by people who are the salt of the earth. Mutuel clerks, bartenders, waitresses and waiters, assistant starters and valets, program sellers, money counters, cooks, cleaners, dishwashers, equipment operators, laborers, plumbers and electricians, carpenters, workers in feed granaries and breeding farms, owners, trainers, jockeys, exercise riders and grooms are some of the many jobs performed by hard-working men and women who are dependent on the thoroughbred industry to provide a living wage for their middle-class families.

As awful as that horrible day at Wonderland was four years ago, if Mohegan Sun doesn't win this license or if there is no

casino on Suffolk's property because our
opponents repeal the gaming law, all of these
people will lose their jobs and the result will
be tenfold worse than it was for our brothers

and sisters at Wonderland.

- 6 I respect the work that the 7 Commission has done and the fact the petition 8 is a heavy burden on each of you. I want to 9 leave you with this last through hundreds maybe 10 thousands of some of the most decent, hard-11 working and caring people you would ever want 12 to meet plead with you to save their jobs and 13 the industry they love when you make your final 14 decision. Thank you.
- COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: All right.

  Sue Sullivan, another tough act to follow.

- MS. SULLIVAN: Good evening. I'm

  Sue Sullivan and I'm the Executive Director of

  the New Market Business Association. And the

  New Market Business Association is the cohesive

  voice of the New Market Industrial District,

  which is the largest industrial business area

in Greater Boston and is located just south of South Station surrounded by the areas of the South End, South Boston, Roxbury and Dorchester.

Representing the second-largest business association in Boston I have over 235 member businesses representing over 20,000 employees. Most of these employees are blue-collar employees, long-lasting family members and members of organization and companies that have been in this area for upwards of 50 years.

wholesale food distributors. In fact, if you live in Greater Boston, it is a fact that there is a 90 percent chance of anything you eat that is fresh has come through the New Market area. Twenty-five percent of our companies are building contractors or building supply companies. And 20 percent of these companies are in service businesses that can be utilized in casino either building or operations.

Clearly, the purchasing dollars that will be generated by the construction and operation of any casino in the Greater Boston

area will be in the billions. By any standard, it is a potential game changer for thousands of small, medium and even large sized businesses.

Only one of the two potential casino operators understands this impact and their responsibility to both the city of Revere and the greater surrounding community. That operator is clearly Mohegan Sun.

In their host agreement, they have not only protected the businesses of Revere, but also the thousands of other businesses in the area. By creating the 15-mile buying radius for a large number of their annual buying dollars, they have promised that we will not be watching companies from other parts of the country get the lion's share of their purchasing dollars. It will stay here.

The operators of Mohegan Sun have been proactive and forthcoming in reaching out to the local businesses. Even doing preliminary meet and greets with the purchasing people. The other casino applicant has been nonexistent and non-caring.

Why should we trust Mohegan Sun?

1 I'll get a little personal here. I grew up 2 about five miles from Mohegan Sun in 3 Connecticut. My high school is less than a 4 football field away from it. I know a lot of 5 people who are their employees. I know a lot 6 of people who live in the surrounding communities. And all they talk about is not 8 only the economic impact of Mohegan Sun, but 9 the intangibles such as their contributions to 10 local schools, to organizations and to personal involvement in the area. 11 12 Speaking for the 235 members of the 13 New Market Business Association, I very, very 14 much hope that you will vote in favor of 15 Mohegan Sun as the casino operator. 16 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Ms. 17 Sullivan. Kathleen Orlando and next is Joe 18 Ms. Orlando. Todesca. 19 MS. ORLANDO: Good afternoon. Thank 20 you for once again allowing me to speak before 21 you today. As a lifelong resident of East 22 Boston, I stand before you today in full 23 support of Mohegan Sun's plan for a resort 24 casino in Revere, Massachusetts.

1 Since I last spoke here, Mohegan Sun 2 has entered into a surrounding community 3 agreement with Mayor Walsh and the city of 4 Boston. This is amazing news. This proves 5 that Mohegan Sun and our new Mayor listened to 6 the residents of East Boston and together worked hard to reach an agreement that 8 compensates East Boston and provides us with 9 things such as a new youth center, a senior 10 center and major road improvements. 11 This speaks volumes to Mohegan Sun's 12 commitment to Revere, all of the surrounding

commitment to Revere, all of the surrounding communities and the Commonwealth as a whole.

No other applicant has made an effort or shown any interest in making such commitments.

Mohegan has done everything to ensure that a resort casino in Revere would be an overwhelming success, and that horseracing will continue for a minimum of 15 years and once again thrive in the state of Massachusetts.

Mohegan Sun and Suffolk Downs are the perfect combination. And together will be a huge success story. Throughout this process, I have come to meet some of the most amazing

people at Suffolk Downs. I have learned so
much from them and their stories about their
employer that they respect so much and the
horseracing industry in which they have

family. Not often do you see employees stand
up for a company and remain so loyal.

Recently, we have seen this with Market Basket. When the media first broke the news about the situation at Market Basket, I immediately thought of the employees of Suffolk Downs who too are fighting to keep their jobs and stand with an employer who has treated so well.

They will fight to the end to keep horse racing alive in Massachusetts. And this plan has overwhelming support. You can see that in this room today as well at all of the other prior hearings. There is little opposition to this plan.

The opposition has been limited to a handful of folks that attend each meeting and talk about a no-vote in November in East Boston. What they fail to mention is that

thousands of East Boston residents voted yes on November 5 and today still stand in support of the project in Revere.

In fact, many of the people who voted no have now changed their position. When Mohegan announced their plan, many Eastie residents expressed that if Mohegan Sun was the gaming partner on November 5 they surely would have voted yes, which proves that no votes were due to a fact that a gaming partner -- I'm sorry. -- that many no votes were due to the fact that the gaming partner was unclear but not that East Boston residents were opposed to a casino.

East Boston residents have a renewed faith that although the casino will not be in East Boston, Mohegan Sun and Mayor Walsh have made certain that East Boston will be compensated for any negative impacts this project could bring while keeping its neighborhood and friend for 78 years in business.

Thank you to all of my friends at Suffolk Downs for fighting for what you believe

in. To Mohegan Sun, Mayor Rizzo and Mayor

Walsh to listening to the residents of Revere

and East Boston. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Joe Todesca and the next person is Bobby McKenna. Mr. Todesca.

MR. TODESCA: Good evening,

Commission. Thank you for giving me the

opportunity to speak here tonight. My name is

Joe Todesca. I'm a lifelong resident of East

Boston.

I spoke in front of you on numerous occasions in the past on behalf of Suffolk

Downs and Mohegan Sun. I have been a supporter of this project when it was initially proposed in East Boston. And have stood 100 percent behind my neighbors in Revere since the November 5 election.

The people of Revere have spoken twice and both times they said yes. They want this. They need this. My hometown of East Boston also needs it. Recently Mohegan Sun and the city of Boston reached a surrounding community agreement, the richest of its kind.

We need jobs that are dignified and not degrading. We need these jobs. We know the casino's main traffic is Thursday, Friday, Saturday night after rush hour. It's not a Justin Bieber concert every night.

We also know who's going to give us millions of dollars to fix places like Boardman and Curtis Street if we don't get it, nobody.

We know there won't be crime waves, chaos or evil circus clowns running loose in the streets, because cities like ours with casinos Bangor, Maine and Philly, no increase in crime, a decrease in drug crimes and burglaries because more police are on the streets. Police

1 like my Uncle Kenny Foley who kicked the Hell's

2 Angels off of the beach in the 70s or Chief

3 Cafarelli who drags terrorists out of boats in

4 Watertown.

We know safe and clean is best for business and best for us. No casino, Suffolk Downs is closed and bulldozed. And once we remove all of those human chains of protestors, the historic barns will go too. Whatever takes its place, it will be more problems, more abandoned shopping carts on Winthrop Ave. and a whole lot of nothing we can do about it.

Boston papers never compared both sites or this would've been over a long time ago. The Herald loved Mr. Wynn because of his Rex Ryan/Bobby Valentine way with words. And if it isn't about Gisele the Globe isn't interested.

So, I walked that half mile from Sullivan Square, past the Water Commission, the bus yard. The only place I found with food was at the very end, a gas station with a Snickers bar and a Gatorade. But I had to take it outside because there was no place to sit. A

woman with heels with shopping bags is supposed to walk all that way.

want to fix it with duct tape and sheetrock screws. Our track and our beach are the perfect spot because they were picked out 80 and 140 years ago. Theirs is in mechanics row on a street known as chemical lane. This is a resort. That is the last resort. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Ms. Bonfardeci and the next will be Bob Upton. Mr. Upton come down. Ms. Bonfardeci.

MS. BONFARDECI: Good afternoon members of the Mass. Gaming Commission. My name is Matilda Bonfardeci and this is not the first time I speak before you, but the third.

For the record, I am a longtime resident of Revere and support the Mohegan Sun Suffolk Downs Resort. I've spoken in the past about things like the benefits I see for the families here in Revere such as a million dollars a year to our schools, a new rec. center, a new high school to be built and of course saving the jobs at Suffolk Downs.

I spoke about how we are failing as a community and how throughout this process we really have worked as a team. I have spoken about how badly we need the jobs and the revenue. And of course I've said over and over again how much we back our mayor, a man whom has the city's best interest at heart.

So, I said to myself what else can I really say? Well, one thing I can still say and I don't mind repeating is this, we still need jobs. We still need the revenue and we still need a yes to the Mohegan Sun license for Suffolk Downs.

With that said, I did in fact think of something else to say today and I'd like share with you a bit of my personal journey through this. When I first heard on the news that a proposal was going in front of the legislation to expand the gaming law, I was intrigued. When Governor Duval Patrick signed it into law, I said to myself well, finally some money that has been leaving this state on a daily basis will now become possibility of staying in ours.

When Revere East Boston became one of the candidates, I was thrilled. I started to get more involved. I attended one of the many informational gatherings that Chip Tuttle and his team put together. I was astonished at how much was at stake for Revere.

So, I made it my personal mission to get out there and spread the word and help in any way I could. I held gatherings with moms and friends throughout the city to make sure they understood that this is a good thing for Revere and not to listen to the false notions that casinos are bad. Instead to tell them that this is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity and that we should not let it pass by.

When it came to voting time, I phone banked, held signs and may I add in the cold, gave out bumper stickers and pins, put signs on my lawn the words vote yes. And I did this all with great pride because I love my city.

When East Boston voted it down, I was personally very sad but I didn't lose hope. When the Mass. Gaming Commission found a legal way for us to retake the vote, I was elated.

So, once again I did everything I did the first time around only stronger, harder and with more hours put into it. And boy did it pay off with the landslide win.

So, I really didn't know anybody that worked at Suffolk Downs. But throughout this, I have met them through either gatherings or sign holdings. And it made even sweeter to get on board for them. One thing that is consistently on their minds is are they going to have their jobs if the license is not issued?

Well, it has been out there that if we are not granted the license that indeed their jobs are at stake. I can't even imagine over 800 people filing for unemployment. It's just mind-boggling to me.

So, this is only a bit of my personal journey. There is much more, but I only have four minutes. But I do want to say if you take a look around this auditorium today the support is incredible. And each and every one of us have a personal journey to tell.

It may be similar to mine or may be

1 even different but regardless one thing is that 2 we all have in common that has kept us stick 3 together and that is the following. We want 4 this. We put in our time. We don't want to 5 vote again. And we need a unanimous yes from 6 the Mass. Gaming Commission on September 12. I thank you for your time. 8 hope the next time we meet is at the 9 groundbreaking at Suffolk Downs. Thank you. 10 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: All right, Bob 11 Upton followed by Dan Doherty. Dan Doherty is 12 next. Mr. Upton. 13 MR. UPTON: Good evening 14 Commissioners. Thank you once again for giving 15 me this great opportunity to appear before you 16 and to speak on behalf of the Revere Chamber of 17 Commerce as well as myself, my family, the 18 community of Revere. And I really do 19 appreciate this opportunity. 20 I have spoken many times. And most 21 of that time I've talked about the business 22 development opportunities that we in Revere 23 will have and our surrounding businesses as 24 well.

But tonight, I do stand here and realize that I'm standing in place of where my father, his five brothers and three sisters were raised and many of those in my family. Those brothers were all World War II veterans and Korea veterans. I was raised in this city. And I'm realizing that I am here to really support and promote this great city of Revere.

It's great for me to be able to do that not only as a member of the Chamber of Commerce but a member of this community. And I'm very proud to be from this community because not only of all of the years and all of the reasons of why I'm proud to be from here and our rich history with the beach, but recently we just suffered a tornado in this community. And once again, I've seen the community come together with the great leadership of Mayor Rizzo and many others in this community. It's really a very strong passionate community as you've seen and you've heard through all of these hearings.

I also again as I said, I'm here to

represent the members the Chamber of Commerce
particularly Suffolk Downs with the 79-year
history that they have in this community, but
also Mohegan Sun. Mohegan Sun has worked very
hard to work with us at the Chamber of Commerce
to let us know what is planned with the casino
and what the opportunities or benefits would be
if we did have a casino here.

I want to say for the record that I have not heard one word from the Wynn Resorts people at all, not one contact has been made with us at the Chamber of Commerce from the Wynn Resort folks. And I think that's rather significant considering that Revere's mitigation agreement calls for \$10 million in local spending for our local businesses and \$50 million for the surrounding 15-mile communities.

So, for me that really is important that I myself have not heard anything. And I've heard no record at all of anyone being contacted at all from Wynn Resorts. I think that really does have merit.

We in the Chamber of Commerce in

Revere do see the \$1.3 billion-dollar business 1 2 development effort being made in this area. 3 see that as significant and that it will help 4 us, but it will also help many of the family members in this area and other affiliated 5 businesses that do benefit from doing business with us in this area.

The \$50 million in the 15-mile area, I think that's going to help not only the travel and tourism industries of the North Shore but I think in a lot of other businesses as well.

Travel and tourism, the Revere Beach redevelopment effort, I think that's the key. For me I see that is the wow factor. you're comparing the two plans from Wynn Resorts and Mohegan Sun, Revere Beach redevelopment will do amazing things for us in the community of Revere. And it will give a lot more jobs to many of those that are looking for jobs in the area, not only the construction industry but I think people that will be working in the hotel industry, restaurants, transportation and the like.

1 I think when Chairman Crosby spoke 2 at the very beginning of these hearings he was 3 looking to assess the wow factor between the 4 two plans. And I think Revere Beach 5 redevelopment is in fact that wow factor. 6 So, again, I want to thank you very 7 much for the opportunity to once again allowing 8 me to speak. And I do wish Mohegan Sun and 9 Suffolk Downs well in the pursuit of this. 10 And I know you hold the future of 11 what can happen here in Revere in your hands. 12 And I do wish you well in that decision-making 13 process. Thank you very much for that 14 consideration. 15 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you Mr. 16 Upton. Mr. Doherty and David Ravalli is next. 17 Mr. Doherty. 18 I just want to thank MR. DOHERTY: 19 you for having me here tonight. First, about 20 myself, my name is Dan Doherty. I'm the 21 Director of Operations for world-famous Kelly's Roast Beef on Revere Beach. 22 23 I started my job at Kelly's Roast 24 Beef in 1980 at the location on Revere Beach.

Kelly's is a family-run business that has been in operation since 1951. That's 63 years in business in Revere. We also have four other locations out in Massachusetts itself.

I grew up in Revere just a regular kid from Shirley Ave. moved out to the suburbs years ago but I can say my heart is always in Revere. I am here to support building a Mohegan Sun Casino in the city I love. My support comes as a citizen of the Commonwealth, as well as a business operator in the city.

It is our belief at Kelly's that building a Mohegan Sun Casino at Suffolk Downs would be the start of an unbelievable development of Revere Beach. We believe in our city leaders who have been informing us the city will benefit in many ways.

With that being said, I'd like to acknowledge the mayor, the city council along with our police and fire departments, along with the school department for staying the course on this long journey. Seeing all of them in support of this development is comforting.

1 I would also like to acknowledge the 2 city and its residents for the remarkable work 3 they did in helping each other during this 4 tornado. Thank you. 5 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr. 6 Doherty. Mr. Ravalli and Glenn Pujado is next. Mr. Ravalli. 8 MR. RAVALLI: My name is Jay 9 Ravalli. I'm a 25-year resident of Revere 10 Beach. When I first moved here from Back Bay Boston in 1989, the beach was in shambles. 11 12 Since then, I'm amazed at the 13 improvements but there's more to come. 14 Bringing casino gambling to this area will be 15 good for Revere, for the state of Massachusetts for several reasons. 16 17 It will create much-needed jobs. Ιt 18 will put Revere on the map as a world-class 19 city. The revenue to the city of Revere will continue to build -- will contribute to maybe 20 21 building a new high school, which is much 22 needed. I hear that the high school that they 23 built in Newton cost \$200 million for a state-24 of-the-art high school.

1 As far as the state is concerned, it 2 will keep the gambling revenue from going 3 across state lines. People in Suffolk County 4 and the state of Massachusetts have been 5 waiting a long time for casino gambling. 6 about time to give everybody what they've been waiting for. Thank you. 8 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr. 9 Ravalli. Mr. Pujado and Ana Lanzilli is next. 10 Mr. Pujado. 11 Hi. MR. PUJADO: Thank you, Mr. 12 Chairman and Commissioners, for allowing me to 13 speak today on behalf of Mohegan Sun. My name 14 is Glenn Pujado. I'm with Kettle Cuisine and 15 Soups. 16 We're a 28-year-old company, a local 17 company that started in Revere, moved to 18 Somerville, Chelsea and now we're located in 19 Lynn. We've had a long awesome relationship 20 with Mohegan Sun. They're an honest company. 21 They treat you well as a -- They're our 22 customer and they treat us really well and they 23 know what they want and we give it to them. 24 They've allowed us to grow in both

- 1 | locations in Pennsylvania and Connecticut. And
- 2 | it's allowed us to continue making soups on a
- 3 regular basis. They're not our biggest
- 4 | customer, but they're an important customer.
- 5 And I just wanted to say that it'd be great for
- 6 them to be allowed to have a casino here. And
- 7 | it'd be great for the community and the North
- 8 | Shore, which has been my home for 30 years
- 9 | since I came from Chile.
- 10 So, again, thank you so much for
- 11 allowing me to speak today. And I knew I was
- 12 going to beat the clock. Thank you very much.
- 13 | Have a good day.
- 14 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you very
- 15 | much. Ana Lanzilli is next followed by Gayle
- 16 Piraino.
- 17 MS. LANZILLI: Good evening,
- 18 | Massachusetts Gaming Commission. My name is
- 19 Ana Lanzilli. And I would like to thank you
- 20 | for allowing me the platform to speak for the
- 21 third time on the best choice for the Region A
- 22 | license, Mohegan Sun.
- When I spoke prior, I addressed you
- 24 on behalf of the employees at Suffolk Downs.

As a wife of an employee for Suffolk, I know how important this license is in continuing the legacy of thoroughbred racing and wagering at Suffolk. Revere citizens have had wagering and gambling in the city for years. And they welcome expanded gaming and the revenue and benefits it will have in their community.

I've been to meeting after meeting and have spoken multiple time. I had a very difficult time on deciding what I would say this time around, because I think everything that could possibly said on why the license should go to Mohegan has been reiterated multiple times.

Most importantly I believe a boost to the economy in Revere while keeping the doors open to a historical venue is sitting right at our doorstep. Mohegan's commitment to job creation and preserving current jobs is something needed not only in the city of Revere but in the state of Massachusetts. I personally know how many people -- I personally know people who are still unemployed due to the closing of Wonderland in 2010. How much can

one city take?

Our local businesses may be thriving but the opportunity to have additional business is something no owner will turn away. Mohegan is offering a rewards program that will drive old and new patrons to their business. I can't say the same for Wynn.

Revere needs to seize the opportunity now and has voted not once but twice to bring a resort casino to their city. The host community agreement that has been put in place for Revere is one that is lucrative and can be life-changing for all residents in Revere. Mohegan has also come to agreements with all surrounding host communities without arbitration. Can't say the same with our competitor.

I would like to take a moment to mention three current committees that are prospering from a resort casino built in their city. I feel they are a direct representation of what can happen in Revere. Bensalem, Pennsylvania thought a casino would destroy their town, instead it has flourished and was

named one of the best places to live in the US by Money Magazine in 2012. This can happen in Revere.

Cincinnati, Ohio was named by Forbes Magazine as one of 15 US cities emerging downtowns and attributed Horse Shoe Casino as part of their success story. This can happen in Revere.

And Saratoga Springs, New York was named one of America's best main streets in Travel and Leisure Magazine. And I can confidently say in conjunction with having the first historical beach in the US right here, this can absolutely happen in Revere.

As I close, I want to thank the amazing people I've met through this journey. We all started for different reasons on why we stood behind this resort casino. But we all ended up coming together and have dedicated countless hours to making this project a reality for the city.

Thank you to the Mass. Gaming

Commission for coming to this community and

listening to our stories. On September 12, I

- wholeheartedly know you will make the right decision and award the license to Mohegan Sun, the premier gaming brand in the Northeast. Let's make the vision of all of those sitting in this room a reality. Thank you. COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Ms. Lanzilli. Gayle Piraino.
  - MS. PIRAINO: Good evening,
    Commissioners. And thank you for having me
    here today. May name is Gayle Piraino. I'm
    president of Gap Promotions. We're a
    promotional marketing and display agency
    located in Gloucester, Mass.

And just about a year ago -- I'm standing here today, I'm really proud to share the experience and partnership that we formed with Mohegan Sun, which started a year ago. We originally met in August last year in Sturbridge where they were looking to -- They had an event titled Working In and Working with Mohegan Sun.

The invite alone was of great interest to us, because we had anxiously been awaiting the casino referendum here in Mass.

And honestly, we were so excited that Mohegan was a player and we wanted to learn more. It was a beautiful summer night. We drove there.

And from the moment we walked into the event we absolutely felt welcomed, sort of like we were home. And we listened to employees and suppliers alike share their success stories with Mohegan. With each story, we had more interest in learning more.

We were impressed with the opportunities that Mohegan provided and the passion that was displayed by all. They were quite clear about their expectations and licensing process.

Following the presentations, they even took the time to visit each table, talking with and answering any questions that arose. We knew right away that the hard work, extra effort and growth from within and love for what we do that Mohegan Sun embodied Gap Promotions' value and culture. They were to us the real deal.

We absolutely knew we wanted to pursue this project further and that the

- 1 opportunity was not just about Massachusetts,
- 2 | Mohegan Sun was indeed a family. We followed
- 3 up to thank our contacts. And we were
- 4 | immediately connected with one of their
- 5 | purchasing agents to be placed on their vendor
- 6 | list to determine if we were a fit with their
- 7 products and pricing.
- 8 They stated their expectations and
- 9 the bid started. And we were grateful to be a
- 10 part of this process. Shortly thereafter,
- 11 | Suffolk Downs was in the news and we were
- 12 invited to attend local events. And what was
- 13 so impressive is the forum and personality of
- 14 | these events was exactly the same. It was just
- 15 the location that had changed.
- 16 And having grown up in the North
- 17 | Shore, this project was near and dear to me.
- 18 | Imagine this undertaking right in our backyard,

I've had previous exposure to Las Vegas casinos. And you're just a number to At Mohegan they value your partnership and they want a relationship for the long-term. In October, we attended an event for the Center for Women and Enterprise Leadership conference where Mohegan had a prominent presence and an interest in doing business with minority vendors.

We participated in a matchmaking event where we had such a warm greeting from the people we had met in August. We discussed our progress on our bidding process with hopes our hard work would pay off. We felt we were strengthening our relationship with Mohegan and on our way to building a long-term partnership.

In November, we received our first order. It was a big celebration at our company. Our team was so excited. And later that month, we ran into, again, Mohegan at a diversity event at Fenway Park. And they named us the stalkers because we were now following each other everywhere.

In early December, we visited

Mohegan Sun and met the purchasing agents we've been working with. They took the time to explain their process and also to listen to us share our capabilities and some new ideas we prepared. They were so helpful and we truly felt we were welcome all knowing that our knowledge will only help us do a better job for Mohegan.

In January, we were proud to receive our Mohegan non-gaming license, which allows us to work with the Mohegan Sun property and had been receiving quotes and had the opportunity to partner on additional orders. And actually, a couple of weeks ago, we got our first reorder, which we thought was a big victory. So, we were pretty excited about that.

As things are so positively progressing for Mohegan Sun in Revere, we continue to attend all of the events. And each time the purchasing agents and executives take the time to come and talk. They talk to everybody, but they never ever rush you at all. And even us who are an established vendor at this point. They take the time to see how

1 things are.

They speak with everybody and they're committed to this project and the people and the businesses of North Shore.

We will begin with Taso Nikolakopoulos and he'll be followed by Marisa Curiale. Mr. Nikolakopoulos. Is Mr. Nikolakopoulos here? Maybe not everybody is not back in from the hall. I'll call him again in a second. Marisa Curiale.

MS. CURIALE: Hello, my name is

Marisa Curiale. And I am the office manager at

the Revere Rosetti-Cowan Senior Center.

I am speaking on behalf of Stephen
Fielding, our director who was not able to
attend tonight. As the director of the Revere
Rosetti-Cowan Senior Center, I am confident that
our senior population will benefit greatly from
a Mohegan Sun destination resort style casino.
The revenue generated for the city of Revere
will provide Mayor Rizzo the financial strength
and opportunity to allocate monies to repair and
meet the immediate needs of our current existing
building that is physically failing.

In the near future, it is our goal to construct a new one-level senior center that meets the needs of increasing numbers of seniors, the fastest-growing segment of our population. Provide monies to increase additional senior center staff that will support seniors enabling them to have a more direct selection of services that consist of informational, referral, medical and healthcare opportunities.

Strengthen program services and activities in the areas of health, nutrition,

exercise, education, life-style management and entertainment, allow the hiring of additional external instructors, specialized medical and nursing professionals and other experienced individuals in an ancillary number of fields that are directly related to seniors. Allow the senior center to purchase customized technology driven software to monitor our senior population's participatory involvement.

Increase our transportation services, including funding for drivers to accommodate the escalating demand for rides to the senior center, medical appointments, local pharmacies, banks, library and other pertinent places of business, giving seniors the ability to remain independent and entrenched in community living rather than isolation, loneliness and despair.

I ask you to comprehend fully what this all means to the city and its most treasured citizens. Our seniors have worked their entire lives and deserve the utmost respect and benefit the revenue from the Mohegan Sun destination resort style casino will bring.

Nikolakopoulos. All right then, Dick Venne

MR. VENNE: Good evening,

Commissioners. I'm here to address something a

little different tonight, one of your core

values. That's where you state we value a

diverse workforce and supplier base and an

inclusive culture internally and among our

partners in the Massachusetts Gaming industry.

I have had the unique honor to work with Mohegan Sun for the past 18 years in providing employees with disabilities to meet their staffing needs at their property in Connecticut.

When I look at their history of diversity and inclusion, it began in 1633. I'm not going to give you the entire history of the Tribe. But in 1633 along the Thames River, the Mohegan Chief Uncas settled with his clan. For

centuries, these Mohegan people have worked and lived with the community to create a better life for themselves and their non-Indian neighbors.

These same traditions have been used to guide employees of Mohegan Sun to provide a unique Mohegan Sun experience throughout the spirit of welcoming, mutual respect, cooperation and building relationships. This enduring tradition is called spirit of the aquai.

As I've heard tonight, you're looking at the future of casino gaming here in the city of Revere. The future of people with disabilities is equally important to me. For 40 years, I've run Community Enterprises. We're headquartered in Northampton, Massachusetts. And we have five branches in this part of the state.

We stand ready to continue our relationship that we started 18 years ago with Mohegan Sun, and providing a quality employment and training program for people with disabilities at this casino. We've signed a memorandum of agreement to work with the casino already.

In the past three years alone,

Mohegan Sun has hired and trained with us 127 individuals with disabilities to work at their property in Uncasville. They've already said they will be glad to work with us here. We train in 24 different jobs. If you're someone with a disability and you want to work with Mohegan Sun, they will work with us to find the right training opportunity and the right job so they can be successful along with the right

Here in Revere, the future is bright for individuals with disabilities. We'd be happy to expand our role with the Sun as we have four offices within 20 miles. Our state funding sources are excited about the prospect of good high-paying jobs for individuals with disabilities in this area.

We are prepared to replicate our award-winning training program that we developed in conjunction with Mohegan Sun. And I want to just state that Mohegan Sun is a tremendous community partner. I'm happy to endorse them as they work to develop operations in Revere.

1 On behalf of Community Enterprises 2 and the individuals with disabilities we serve, 3 I want to thank you for the time to give 4 testimony today. 5 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr. 6 Venne. Paul Umbrello and Ann Marie Casey will 7 Ms. Casey, Mr. Umbrello. be next. 8 MR. UMBRELLO: Thank you members of 9 My speech is brief. And before I the board. 10 begin, I would just like to acknowledge with a 11 round of applause to Chip Tuttle and the Suffolk 12 Downs management. As Chip stated on his 13 commitment to Boston and the racing industry 14 when Mohegan Sun is awarded a gaming license. 15 Thank you, again. 16 I'm Paul Umbrello, owner and 17 managing partner of Charles River Racing 18 Stables. I offer race horse partnerships and 19 have hundreds of partners. As owners, we alone 20 have contributed hundreds of thousands of 21 dollars back into the racing industry and the 22 economy. 23 I have testified numerous times. 24 And again I'm here today to support a yes vote

for a gaming license to be awarded to Mohegan
Sun and the city of Revere. My comments today
are my own and not solicited by Mohegan Sun or
Suffolk Downs.

We've been stating the same facts meeting after meeting. But the truth is Mohegan is by far the right choice over Wynn. This is because of the millions of dollars they're offering to give back to the host and surrounding communities, the Momentum Rewards program which will contribute to area businesses and the millions of dollars to road improvements.

One of the most important points I'd like to make is the preservation of the 800 plus jobs, existing jobs in the racing industry. If Wynn and Everett are awarded the gaming license, these jobs and racing in New England are lost as we've heard. My business will be out of business. I won't contribute back to the racing industry or the economy.

Some are opposed to gambling and the racing industry. They are not seeing the big picture here of jobs being saved and new jobs

- being created. In closing, members of the board
  I urge you to award Mohegan Sun the district A
  gaming license.
- I also urge all of those here
  tonight in favor of casinos in Massachusetts to
  start now, tell their families, friends, coworkers, neighbors and everyone else they know
  how important the November vote is and encourage
  them to get out and vote in favor of casinos in
  Massachusetts. I thank you for your time.
- COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr.
  Umbrello. Ann Marie Casey, Nick Moulaison
  followed by Bill Lagorio. Mr. Lagorio if you

14 | could come down, Mr. Moulaison.

- MR. ABRAMS: Mr. Chairman, members of the Commission. I'm not Anne Marie Casey. I am substituting for here. She's unable to make it. But I was bumped two or three other times. So, I'm the designated hitter now.
- My name is Hal Abrams. And my family has been in Revere for a total of five generations. In my younger days, I did work at Suffolk Downs. I worked for people in the thoroughbred industry that were trainers. I

worked for Jack Hamburg who had Kentucky Derby winners, Carl Bosmark, who has quite a stable and the legendary Bill Veeck who although he's in the Baseball Hall of Fame did run Suffolk Downs and I was glad to work underneath these people.

I am in support of the Revere location because I am in the building trade and also the engineering trade. We support the Revere location for the following reasons. It's conveniently located near Logan Airport. And we believe that approximately half of the patrons that will come to Mohegan Sun will be coming by Logan Airport and by air.

It's on the Blue Line and a lot of people will be using the Blue Line. In fact, Mohegan people mostly use the Blue Line I'm seeing during all of these events. There will be stops here at the Mohegan Sun, at Beachmont, Suffolk Downs and possibly Wonderland on the Blue Line.

There could probably be because it's an open rail system maybe a monorail system.

It's something that could be built, envisioned.

2.1

It's something not like in the Jetsons or something that could be real.

I have built also in East Boston overlooking the racetrack. And most people that want to improve their kitchens or dining rooms or whatever on the side of the East Boston hill that overlooks Suffolk Downs, it's a beautiful view in the morning. It's picturesque. To wake up in the morning, sit down at your porch or breakfast table and watch the horses exercise at Suffolk Downs is a gorgeous site. And that's what a lot of people in East Boston are now building. And that's how they like to start their morning.

To talk about the Everett site is something that you have to understand. We develop mostly in Charlestown and East Boston, but when you build in Charlestown, you see the Everett site. You see the Mystic River.

It's an LNG site. And being an LNG site, all of the abutting properties have LNG problems. No one is allowed in the harbor when the LNG ship comes in where Wynn's development is going to be, everything comes to a stop.

Nothing is allowed in the harbor.

If you're on a rooftop, you're told by a helicopter with a spotlight to please get off the roof and close your windows and please do not overlook the harbor because of the security that is going on with the LNG. It's right in the middle of the Wynn area. And when they bring the LNG ship into this area into Everett along with 22 billion gallons of petroleum along with the LNG tanker into Everett, it's a hazard if something ever goes wrong.

To put a resort in the middle of this does not compare to where the Mohegan Sun is going to be here in Revere. In order to get into the harbor, the following agencies have to protect the LNG tanker. You have the Coast Guard. You have Homeland Security. You have the Boston Police, the Boston fire, Everett Police. Let me just finish up

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you very much. Thank you very much.

MR. ABRAMS: Thank you for

24 listening.

1 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: All right, 2 Nick Moulaison. Bill Lagorio and Mr. Lagorio 3 will be followed by Nancy Burns. 4 MR. LAGORIO: Thank you, 5 Commissioners. Pardon my appearance. I did 6 work today at the track. So, we had to come as we were done. It's good to see you all again. 8 I normally don't have something 9 prepared, but I do forget most of what I want to 10 say. So, I did make some notes. I live on 36 11 Witherbee Ave. I've been a member of the city 12 of Revere my whole life as was my dad and my 13 grandparents, etc., etc. We are third 14 generation Revere residents. 15 And as a lifelong resident of Revere and a horse trainer at Suffolk Downs for the 16 17 past 30 years, it is very clear that in every 18 possible criteria, Mohegan and Suffolk Downs are 19 the all-around best choice for the Region A 20 resort casino license. And Revere is the ideal 2.1 location. 22 I want to thank the Gaming 23 Commission for the thorough job they've done. 24 And I hope the voters of Massachusetts again

show their support for the gaming bill in November so that all of the groundwork can become a reality for the good of the whole area.

Revere has already voted twice in favor. And the city of Boston is now satisfied with its participation. My fellow trainers and other horsemen at Suffolk Downs are very excited that live racing will remain a major part of the overall project going forward and want to go into 2015 in full stride for the benefit of everyone concerned.

For that reason, especially now that Boston is on board, we would like to see a firm commitment to a specific blueprint for a barn area to be included as part of the license process so that it becomes something the horsemen and count on for next year.

The Honorable Commission, I would like to say that it's a key point for us because it's a wonderful place for the casino, but what people have to understand is we're displacing not only the horses from a 79-year location, we're displacing an industry that needs to be on premise to continue.

In order for us to keep running and thrive at Suffolk Downs, we need to be stabled at Suffolk Downs somewhere on the property. And we do need a firm commitment. And we need your help in that respect.

We need the smoothest most coordinated joint effort possible with the least chance of possible delays. I believe everyone involved in the Mohegan Suffolk resort casino, including all of us involved in live racing remain 100 percent committed to working together in every way to see this through and make it the huge success that we've all been waiting for. And I thank you for your time.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: All right,
Sir, thank you very much. Nancy Burns, is Nancy
Burns here? Kim Luiso, Saber Abougalala, Saber
Abougalala, Kathi Wyatt, Ms. Wyatt and next will
be Louis Scapicchio.

Before you start, I was just handed a note that said there are lights on in a Honda Insight, license number S18WKS, S18WKS, lights on in the parking lot. All right, Ms. Luiso.

MS. WYATT: Hi, my name is Kathi

1 | Wyatt and I'm an abutter to Suffolk Downs.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: I'm sorry.

MS. WYATT: Thank you for allowing me to voice my concerns one last time. I've been to almost every meeting and hearing and had the opportunity to have had my voice heard at a few.

While patiently sitting through hours of listening to other people's opinions, I've heard some very disturbing and exaggerated comments, some sincere and heartfelt testimonies and some downright lies. Up until tonight, nobody has brought up the alternative. What is going to happen to Suffolk Downs if Mohegan Sun is not granted the gaming license in Massachusetts?

Having grown up in Franklin, I'm a country girl at heart. I appreciate the message of the Joni Mitchell song that I referred to the last time I spoke to you. I feel like I have the best of both worlds, living in the city yet enjoying the country setting without leaving my big backyard.

I would like you to close your eyes

1 and picture a beautiful blue sky, big fluffy 2 white clouds and green grass and green trees 3 that stretch for more than a mile. Hear the 4 soft (sounds) of the horses' hooves as they pass 5 by while conditioning in the early morning. 6 Smell the freshly grown grass on a balmy summer day. And feel the warmth of the sun and the 8 cool breezes as they caress your face. No, this 9 isn't a dream. You're sitting on our back deck

on Waldemar Ave. in East Boston.

Now open your eyes and look out over the immaculately manicured grounds of Suffolk Downs. You can see almost all of the way to Revere Beach. Would you believe that you're actually sitting in the city?

Close your eyes again and picture
18-wheeler freight truck and tractor trailers
rumbling through our neighborhoods. Listen to
the grinding of their gears as they try to
maneuver the narrow and hilly streets of Orient
Heights. Smell the pungent diesel exhaust as
they sit idling in traffic on the highway. And
feel the heat of their roaring engines.

This is the alternative. This is

the reality if Suffolk Downs closes. This is what I imagine will happen if my little piece of paradise gets bulldozed over.

This is what will be like if lowincome housing units some off-site parking for
the airport, a strip mall or the freight
companies from across the street that will most
likely expand. I asked you last time to
remember my family and I and the song that Joni
Mitchell sang.

I'm asking you again to please consider who and what are going to be affected if Mohegan Sun is not granted the license in Massachusetts and Suffolk Downs ultimately closes.

When making your decision, I want you to think about the employees at Suffolk Downs who will be without jobs and health insurance, the environmental impact of removing the green space in order to develop the land. The current horrendous traffic situation at the intersection of Boardman Street and McClellan Highway that will only get worse.

Most importantly, the people like me

- 1 | living along Waldemar Ave. who abuts Suffolk
- 2 Downs. Please don't break my country girl
- 3 | heart. Please don't force us to have to sell
- 4 our beautiful house with the big backyard.
- 5 | Please don't make us leave the little bit of
- 6 | tranquility that is left in the city. Again,
- 7 | please don't pave paradise to put up a parking
- 8 lot.
- 9 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Ms.
- 10 | Wyatt. Mr. Scapicchio. And the next one will
- 11 be Wanda Rosario.
- MR. SCAPICCHIO: Good evening,
- 13 | members of the Commission. You're attention
- 14 | span is commendable. I appreciate it. I think
- 15 you can see from the folks in this room that
- 16 this is an important decision. So, thank you
- 17 | very much for paying attention to everyone who
- 18 testifies today.
- 19 I am an East Boston resident. I
- 20 grew up in Orient Heights on Orient Ave. I used
- 21 to as a child walk across the street to a
- 22 | neighbor's house and we could see the horses run
- 23 in the morning. I've been doing it since I was
- 24 | eight years old. So, I'd be very, very

disappointed if Suffolk Downs goes away.

I voted for the casino absentee 2 3 ballot from Fort Bragg, North Carolina. While I 4 was away, I had a chance to really listen to 5 both sides of the argument, kind of from a 6 distance. And I was told that I was pretty lucky to hear it from a distance. 8 listened to both sides, from the opponent's side what I really heard was a lot of pessimism, I 9 10 heard a lot of negativity about the community 11 and what would happen if this project goes 12 forward. And I really disagree with it.

The people of this community can handle something like this. I've been to plenty of cities and I've been to plenty of places that have casinos that don't have the quality of people that we have in Revere that really have thrived with having a casino. And I know that we would be able to handle such an establishment.

The folks in this room and the folks in these communities, we're not going to let what our opponents say happen. We're not going to let it turn into a slum. We're not going to

let the crime increase. We're not going to let poverty come in. That won't happen in this area. So, you can rest assured if you voted to put a casino here, it's going to be a success.

People in the surrounding communities and again our opponents, very, very negative views of what would happen. When I say that this will be a success, and when I say that I'm confident that it will be a success, it's because of the people in this room, not just the folks that live in these communities. I've seen everything I would want to see from the leaders of Suffolk Downs, Mohegan Sun and our political leaders.

I don't make this decision lightly.

I wouldn't make this vote and I wouldn't have casted that ballot from such a distance if I thought there was even the slightest chance that it would hurt these people or this community that I love and when I got off active duty I returned to.

I want this place to succeed. I want these businesses to succeed. And I know that these folks here in this room are going to

make it succeed. So, you can be confident when you vote yes for this project. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you.

Wanda Rosario, and the next will be Stephanie Scopa Ms. Rosario.

MS. ROSARIO: Good evening,

Commissioners, my name is Wanda Rosario. I live
in East Boston. And I'm a proud member of local
Unite Here Local 26. And I am opposite to
casino proposal in Revere and so is my union.

The agreement between Mohegan Sun and Boston do not address the most important issue the job quality. These casino will subcontract many of the jobs. They want to subcontract an entire hotel. And you need to hear my story to understand why I opposite to this proposal.

For 23 years I been working as a housekeeper in Hyatt Hotel in Boston. And I was making about \$15 per hour. I thought I going to be there until I retire, but in 2009 Hyatt subcontracted housekeeping in another companies. And subcontracted Brown temporary housekeeping to the hotel. They going to get only eight

dollars per hour. My co-workers and me we was fired.

But before we get fired we training the people who later going to take my place in the hotel. I was one of the lucky ones because right now I'm working in Park Plaza Hotel. Park Plaza Hotel has union. And I make \$18 per hour right now. And I have here job security. Some of my co-worker they don't get same as lucky like me because they don't find any job right now after they were fired.

Commissioner, I urge to you to think about my story when you make your decision.

Some companies will put the profit before the workers. That is no good for the workers and that is no good for Boston either. So, thank you very much.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Ms. Rosario. Stephanie Scopa and Frank Parker will be next. Ms. Scopa.

MS. SCOPA: Good afternoon. My name is Stephanie Scopa and I am a resident of the city of East Boston. I would first like to thank you, Commission, for the opportunity to

speak today in support of the applicant Mohegan Sun and your consideration of this project.

I come before you today representing several interests of someone who supports

Mohegan Sun. But let's get right to the point.

I am supporting Mohegan Sun's application

because of their commitment to local small

businesses like the ones in the Revere Chamber

of Commerce in which I am lucky enough to work

with as I am the administrative director there.

When we discuss the many opportunities with Mohegan Sun, we are not only talking about jobs, but the opportunity for a small businesses in the Revere community and others to grow and prosper. Working with Mohegan Sun means that small businesses will be able to be affiliated with one of the most prestigious gaming facilities in the region.

Mohegan Sun has agreed to spend millions of dollars annually with Revere and surrounding community businesses. They are also implementing a Momentum Rewards program so that patrons of Mohegan Sun Massachusetts will be able to redeem their rewards points earned at

1 the gaming facility to make direct purchases with local small businesses. It will allow 2 3 patrons to use their rewards points at their 4 favorite hair salon, their son or daughter's daycare and their preferred local restaurant. 5 6 That is important for the small business. For the administrative director of 8 the Revere Chamber of Commerce, having a resort casino paired with our small businesses in the 9 10 area is an opportunity like no other.

I am a lifelong resident of East
Boston and a property owner there, a past small
business owner myself, a horse owner's daughter
and the administrative director. I would be
honored and filled with enthusiasm to welcome
Mohegan Sun Massachusetts to Revere. And I hope
that you will vote us in. Thank you for your
consideration.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Ms. Scopa. Frank Parker will be followed by Richard Dolan. Mr. Parker.

MR. PARKER: Good evening. Frank

Parker, I serve on the school committee in

Everett and serve as the vice-chairman. And as

1 you can probably understand me being from
2 Everett, I'm a little pro-Wynn.

The condition of the land in the 3 4 former Monsanto site has been well documented. 5 There has been some type of chemical production 6 facility there since prior to the Civil War. But it's going to be remediated. And it's going 8 to be cleaned by a bona fide group with a track 9 record history including some of the properties 10 former the WR Grace Properties up in Woburn. 11 So, I am confident that that issue will get 12 resolved. We'll have a cleaner area down there 13 and the people my age will stop coming down with 14 deadly diseases. I feel like someone else is 15 dying every week.

With that, the Mohegan site in Suffolk Downs is not without its own environmental concerns. Granted it's not arsenic and lead but still it's something to be thought about. So, I want to express concerns regarding Mohegan Sun's MEPA report.

While this report was filed with a separate entity, I believe it warrants your consideration. First, (INAUDBLE) the entire

site for the Mohegan Sun proposed is located on a 100-year floodplain. According to the US geological survey, the 100-year flood plan reference is an indication of probability which is equal to one percent in any given year.

Specifically, the report indicates that the first floor of the parking garage and much of the site will flood four and a half feet in a 100 storm event. However, further analysis has revealed that the site would appear to flood a full three feet in a 10-year event.

Moreover, the report doesn't address what would happen with the higher probability recurrences such as the two- to five-year event. These 100-year events are actually -- They happen quite often. We opened the Keverian School on Nichols Street. It's a K to 8 school about 10 years ago. And we had two 100-year floods within the first year of operation.

Further, there's also concern relative to the impact on wetlands. Because this site is located adjacent to the Belle Isle Marsh and not far from the Rumney Marsh, it will likely have an impact on these fragile eco

1 system.

Mohegan Sun reports to identify how their project will impact these wetlands and how they will mitigate these impacts. And a lot of these concerns is evident that these concerns deserve more studies before any environmental approvals are considered.

And while I've got a minute and a half, I just want to correct one thing for the record. The gentleman that said you can only get a Snickers bar at a gas station, had he gone across the street, he would have gotten a full menu at GT's Lounge of the Caribbean.

Everett is not just sub shops and funeral homes. So, if you guys come over the border, and help spend your money sometime, when I'm at Renzo's listening to DJ George or I'm at Bill Ash's ordering a pizza through the window ringing a bell hoping Dana and Verna West show up, we can certainly approve and help as your neighbors.

One last thing, like many of you because I've seen you around, we've been to hearings in Boston, Everett, Charlestown and

this is my first time in Revere, and a lot of
reasons that we say a casino will help the
region, you can interchange the words Everett
and Revere for all of those reasons. I think we
can all agree upon that.

So, just in closing, no matter what your decision, I'm telling you that I'm going to work with either group to make sure that we repeal question three in November. I'd ask all of you do the same. Thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Mr. Parker,
12 thank you. Richard Dolan. Mr. Dolan will be
13 followed by Michael Alexander.

MR. DOLAN: Hello, my name is
Richard R. Dolan. I've lived in Revere for all
of my 75 years. I've lived in Ward 1, Ward 2,
Ward 3 and Ward 4. And we only have six wards
in the city.

So, I spoke before the Commission in the convention center and I talked about jobs. I wrote two letters that were published in the Revere Journal that talk about jobs and everything else. So, I wasn't going to talk about that but just one little thing.

A lot of people have been talking about -- I just want to answer a question to a lady. What will happen to Suffolk Downs if they don't get the casino? Mr. Tuttle answered that, by the way. He said it will close.

So, there's 800 jobs there. So, if you have 800 jobs that may involve a family of a husband, a wife and three children. That would translate into 4000 people that would be impacted by Suffolk Downs closure, not 800. Because when you let a person go, you let a family go.

So, now I'll just read what I was going to read. I am sure you read the Sunday Globe. I hope you did on June 22, 2014. That long four-page damaging article should have put to rest what city must be selected as the host city for a Region A casino. It was a damning article against Wynn.

I would ask you to decide upon selecting Revere as the host community. Revere is simply stated the most obvious choice for you to make. We are now in the unenviable position of having to go to the polls a third time. This

- proves the commitment that Revere has towards
  Mohegan Sun.
- Revere will be vigilant and
  aggressive in its resolve to make this a host
  community. Mayor Rizzo would take nothing less.
  This is not a political vote. This is a people
- 7 vote. And the people of Revere need your vote.
- 8 Thank you for listening.
- 9 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Mr. Dolan,
- 10 thank you. Michael Alexander who will be
- 11 | followed by Lara Moreno.
- 12 MR. ALEXANDER: Thank you
- 13 Commissioners for your patience and
- 14 perseverance. I'm Michael Alexander. I'm the
- 15 president of Lasell College.
- 16 Lasell is a vibrant, thriving
- 17 private high-quality institution in Newton,
- 18 Massachusetts. We have a growing program in
- 19 hospitality and event management. I am joined
- 20 here today by several talented young faculty
- 21 members from that program.
- 22 We recently entered into a
- 23 | memorandum of understanding with Mohegan Sun to
- 24 | support the job development goals of the

Commonwealth of Massachusetts. That agreement calls for Mohegan Sun to provide assistance to our program in the form of input to further program refinements, input to our curriculum.

They will provide field experiences for sophomores and juniors in our program and paid internships for seniors. Most importantly, they will provide management level job opportunities for our graduates who have been trained for that industry.

We in turn will provide them with custom workshops and courses for their employees. And we will also provide discounts for any of their employees who want to enter into our hospitality and event management programs.

Last fall, we started specifically a major, one of the only major in resort and casino management east of the Mississippi and to our knowledge, one of only three in the country. Their employees will be able to enter into that program if they wanted a discount or in any of our graduate programs at a discount, including this fall a new professional MBA that includes a

concentration in hospitality and event management planning.

So, we are proud to partner with Mohegan Sun to support the job development goals and aspirations of the Commonwealth. Thank you very much.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr. Alexander. Lara Moreno and next will be Christopher Welling. Mr. Welling, if you're here could you come down to the ready seat, please. Ms. Moreno.

MS. MORENO: Thank you. Good afternoon, members of the Gaming Commission, respected elected officials, community leaders, education leaders and the respected residents of Revere and eight surrounding areas. My name is Lara Moreno. I'm originally from Spain and I have been living in Waltham, Massachusetts since I came to the United States almost 10 years ago.

I recently graduated and I acquired an MBA in a CAT program in education from Boston University. As a recent graduate, I value education as one of the most important things in life and respect every project, entity, group

and organization that is willing to finance and support the creation of those goals.

I have been following the process of the casino very closely, because I have very dear friends collaborating on this project. And it is obvious, even for someone who is not from either Revere or Everett that this is the best choice. The best choice is Mohegan Sun and the benefits that it will bring to the community.

The fact that Mohegan Sun will be giving money to schools and will actually create a school shows that Mohegan Sun in Revere is the right choice for this place and the surrounding areas. Also, as a recent college graduate what student that graduate would want to take on another debt on top of college loans?

We all look for jobs after we graduate that will be actually easily accessible to public transportation to take, because having to purchase a car to commute to work is the last thing I want to do, because I don't want to get another loan to purchase a car.

To my understanding, Mohegan Sun project will be right accessible to the T and

basically public transportation, which will
actually offer great opportunities to many
graduates and even young adults looking for IT
positions, accounting, marketing, business
administration positions or internships, any
kind of job.

Aside from the money that Mohegan Sun will give to education and the actual location that we're talking about, Revere, I believe that Mohegan Sun has done quite enough already to reach out to the diverse communities including the Spanish community, which means a lot to me.

I feel they have done everything to include me and my community on the information about the project. And many of them I know such as restaurant owners like the little Spanish restaurant in Brookline in which I have worked for a few months while finishing college which is also a member of the points program.

Members of the Gaming Commission, I am sure I'm not the only person from a neighboring city who believes Mohegan Sun is the right choice to this area. Thank you for your

1 | time and consideration.

Most of our 600 workers service other entertainment venues in the Boston area though, the Citi Center, the Convention Center, last week Katie Perry at Boston Garden, yesterday we set up Country Fest concert at Gillette Stadium, next month Lion King at the Opera House, Tom Petty at Fenway Park. We have serviced the entertainment industry since 1893.

Chip Tuttle and Mohegan Sun have made IATSE a part of this project from the very

- 1 beginning. Their labor harmony agreement 2 includes unions big and small. The agreement 3 assures good jobs during construction. And more 4 importantly to me are the careers that will span 5 the decades after the Mohegan Sun casino is 6 built. IATSE workers provide technically 8 sophisticated, physically challenging services 9 that require a complicated skill set. 10 Commissioners look above your heads. 11 Less than 1000 pounds of lights and curtains are 12 hanging up there. On the average show, IATSE 13 helps hang 60- to 100,000 pounds over the 14 performers and audience. That is 10 to 20 15 trailer loads of lights, speakers, scenery and 16 video equipment. Who do you want hanging that 17 gear at a new casino? 18 I haven't heard from Mr. Wynn yet. 19 I guess he's still looking for the lowest 20 bidder. Mr. Wynn may have the most money. I 21 heard that here tonight. But is he going to 22 share and be fair with his workers or just with
- I trust Chip Tuttle, Mohegan Sun and

- 12 | Gladys Oliveros. Most of my family live in East
- 13 | Boston and Revere. I came from Columbia 25
- 14 | years ago.
- 15 Always I'm working with the
- 16 community. I know my neighbors. I know my
- 17 people. I know that we need jobs as immigrants
- 18 here in this venue.
- I come today to you to ask you to
- 20 consider give the Mohegan Sun the license to
- 21 open the casino in this area. And also please
- 22 don't ignore it the jobs that we really need. I
- 23 can go over few of the issues that I think that
- 24 you need to consider before you made a decision.

First, the location. The location not only for customers or for visitors but also for those workers including the students who maybe want to have an IT or a marketing internships. The facility will be close to the T stations, which make it more accessible for those who are commuting or who are walking to the jobs.

Also, I remember a dog track was closed years ago in Revere and lead to the big, big unemployment problems. Many of those clerks were able to fine job at Suffolk Downs. - MR. MONTOYA: Good evening, members
- 21 of the Commission. My name is Juan Carlos
- 22 Montoya. And I am a resident of Revere, a
- 23 | business owner in East Boston.
- 24 I'm here to tell you that I have

been supportive of the casino proposal in
Revere, especially now with the agreement with
Boston and East Boston. The fact that many of
my customers will have the opportunity to work
close to their homes. We also increase the
chances to spend locally the money and come to
our business to share with us.

Also, if the casino comes to Revere instead of Everett will be much better for everyone, especially for many of the neighbors and residents in East Boston. For example, if Mohegan Sun gets the casino, the visitor who comes to the airport they will go straight to Revere.

If it goes to Everett, most of the tourists and taxi drivers will not only go through the tunnel, but also the main streets in East Bostonk, Like Meridian Street, Brook Street, Chelsea Street. So, that means that they will bring our roads back. I understand that the other proposal from Everett hasn't offered any money to repair the roads in my neighborhood, which means all of those repairs will be coming from our business and residential

1 l taxes.

In addition to that, Mohegan Sun is willing to integrate small business with their points program means a lot to me. About 4000 people will be working for the casino to their employee discount program. Their employees will come often to eat in our restaurants.

From a personal perspective not so much a business owner, I have always believed that more people working makes stronger and healthier. Ladies and gentlemen, I do have my kids sitting in the back in this room and probably they think is a boring meeting, but they don't know that we are talking about their future about their dreams.

So, please member of the Commission consider Mohegan Sun for the license in Revere. Remember that we vote yes, yes, twice. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr. Montoya. Mr. Vasco and Jacqueline Iannuzzi will be next. Mr. Vasco.

MR. VASCO: Good evening. My name
is Luis Vasco. I'm a resident of East Boston as

well a business owner in East Boston.

I'm here to tell you that I was not too supportive of the casino proposal last year in East Boston. But today I support Mohegan Sun proposal in Revere. I must admit at first I was skeptical about the talk of casino in my neighborhood. I was against based mainly on what I heard from the opponents.

But as the time went on, my understanding of this project has evolved. I understand the potential for opportunities for Revere and surrounding communities. My main concern was traffic, but now I have more clear understanding of the positive fact and impact.

The tens of millions of dollars of private investment for road improvements and specific fixes to major intersections and roadways that will go above and beyond any added traffic the casino will generate.

It's an opportunity for us.

Realistically some type of major development is coming to Suffolk Downs. Any development of that size will generate additional vehicle and traffic. But at least this project will go

above and beyond to mitigate additional traffic disruptions and fix many existing issues that we see today.

We talk about crime in the neighborhoods, I discussed that with some of the leaders here. We stand to be in a better position with Mohegan Sun as our neighbor. With the additional funds Revere and Boston will get because of this project, the cities are set to hire more police and emergency services.

The business partnership that are available between Mohegan Sun and local vendors such as myself would boost business exposure and generate added business opportunities, whether it's the Mohegan points partnership program or a piece of the \$5 million that will expand on goods and services in East Boston. There are opportunities and possibilities that are depend on Mohegan Sun's success.

If Everett earns the license or get the license, my neighborhood loses the opportunities. If Suffolk Downs close and another type of development is built here, we all lose. People need these opportunities. As

- 1 I am and go out and push for the benefits
- 2 instead of letting them pass by. Thank you.
- 3 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr.
- 4 | Vasco. Jacqueline Iannuzzi and next will be

- 9 Last summer, I was introduced to the

- 11 LJ McCannis is a horse trainer at Suffolk Downs.
- 12 And my Nana, Clara Matola is a huge fan of the
- 13 | sport. She went each time he had a horse
- 14 | racing. She absolutely loved it.
- 15 One day I decided to go with her and
- 16 | see what horse racing was all about. It was
- 17 | then when I experienced my first winner's circle
- 18 | picture with my Nana. And I was hooked and I've
- 19 been hooked ever since.
- 20 Today, I am the proud owner of three
- 21 thoroughbred race horses that are currently
- 22 training under LJ at Suffolk Downs. They live
- 23 in barn eight. It's their home. It's been the
- 24 home to many horses and many generations of

horsemen.

I'm brand-new to this industry and I'm still learning. But the time I spent there, the bond I have with these horses and my new track family has changed me. I'm truly part of something extraordinary at Suffolk Downs. I realize there are many more people here tonight that are much more invested in this track than I am and have remarkable stories to share. Many of who will agree with me that horse racing is not a dying sport. It just needs the tools to market and compete with other choices for entertainment.

And many of the folks here tonight like me are committed to staying there and racing there in the future. As you know, without a casino in Revere, there is a risk that this amazing track will go away.

It's a nearly 80-year legacy. It's the last thoroughbred racetrack in all of New England. All of that history and any potential future memories will be lost. You could argue I'm the luckiest owner there is to have a track a few miles away from my home, from my work

where my friends and family can easily join Nana to watch my horses race or give them carrots and mints back at barn eight and enjoy these wonderful creatures. And for me, I'm fortunate enough be able to see them every day and love them every day.

Or you could argue what a shame it is to fall in love with the sport so late in the game only to have it taken away so soon. Please don't let that happen. Put the casino in Revere so we can all enjoy the gift of both.

note to family, friends and colleagues that my horse Flex was racing and 50 people showed up. They came to have some food and beer, make a wager, enjoy sunshine and racing. They spent the whole day at Suffolk Downs. They had a wonderful experience and wanted to know what else is around here. They didn't want to leave. They have since been back with their families. Many of them are here tonight.

Putting a casino in Revere will help this great track stay alive and create new experiences for many people just like it did for

my friends. Who knows, some day if I'm lucky enough that one of my babies are able to compete in the Kentucky Derby, I'll be honored and proud to say they trained at Suffolk Downs. I may even play a few slots that night to celebrate.

I know I am only one person and this is my dream. But there is an opportunity for you to help many people create these lasting memories. Help see the vision I see for a world-class casino and racetrack that will combine to make one of the most extraordinary places to visit.

Keep the track alive, help it thrive to its fullest potential. Help me keep my horses in their home at Suffolk Downs where I can see their beautiful faces every day and share them with my racing team, my family and friends and their biggest fan of all, my Nana. Thank you for listening to my story.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: William

Jackson and John Valentine will be next. Mr.

Jackson.

MR. JACKSON: Thank you for permitting me to speak this evening. I want to

thank each and every one of you for the professionalism and the patience that you have shown during these hearings.

I've been asked to speak for a gentleman who was unable to be here. His name is Saber Abougalala. I consider him a friend. He has three businesses in this city of Revere, came from Egypt and has made a great success for himself.

Now I'm not going to really say much about Revere because I really don't think it's fair how great Revere is. It's just not fair. I'm not going to do it. Why, because if you compare Revere to Everett, there is no comparison. It's clearly evident there is no comparison between these two cities, none whatsoever.

The people of Everett are good people. They need the casino, of course they do. They have a great mayor. They have great politicians. It's a fine city. Unfortunately, Everett cannot be chosen because of what I just said.

From reports in the Boston

newspapers, the Gaming Commission will not have the final report that would detail how the contaminated site in Everett would be cleaned before you take the vote on September 12. You are not going to have that information.

The reason, why is that, because the Department of Environmental Protection granted a request from the Denunzio Group to extend the deadline for an environmental study for one year.

This report will detail the following. Number one, how the contaminated dust will be monitored as it blows across the neighborhoods. And not just in Everett, it will be coming into Revere. Who knows what's in that air, nobody knows for sure.

Two, that study will determine how the contaminated dirty soil will be excavated. Three, how and where the contaminated material will be managed. And that means how and where is it going to be dumped. This site contains arsenic and lead and who knows what else is in that soil, nobody does.

And Monsanto has been there or was

1 there for decades. So, there's just a lot of 2 poison over there. By the way, this is all 3 public knowledge because it was in mostly the 4 Boston Herald for the whole of last week. 5 the way, there are rumors, very good strong 6 rumors that no excavation will start due to a coalition of environmental protection groups who 8 will seek and probably get a court-ordered 9 injunction. This thing could go on for years. 10 Then there's a little fighting 11 between Boston and you, the Gaming Commission 12 because the city is no longer a surrounding 13 community. That's because Boston didn't respond 14 to the questions that you asked. 15 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: All right, Mr. 16 Jackson. Thank you very much. 17 MR. JACKSON: Do I get another 18 minute because I spoke for the other gentleman? 19 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: No. I think 20 you've had your four minutes, Sir. Thank you 21 very much. We get your point. Mr. Valentine, 22 John Valentine. Mr. Valentine will be followed 23 by Carol Tye. Mr. Valentine. 24 MR. VALENTINE: Thank you,

Commissioners. I'm here today as a citizen and a homeowner in Revere. I don't represent any businesses. I have no vested interest other than the goodwill of the city of Revere.

I wish everyone to be successful, but I really am sitting here tonight really just in amazement. They don't build casinos with winners. The community is going to take a great hit taking the wealth, taking the money right out of the system.

We talk about crime, crime is already here. It's only going to get worse. So, that's a concern. Traffic, we live in a densely populated community, both Revere and Everett. I don't think we should have a casino in either community. It should be on the highway up 93 out of the way.

Just think about the airport, real commerce. The airport we're going to jeopardize that. Traffic is not bad enough now. Local businesses are going to get these reward programs. Gamblers come to a casino for one purpose only to gamble and leave.

They're not going to get their hair

done. They're not going to go elsewhere within the community. They go, gamble, lose their money and leave. The professionals will win.

4 The rest of us will lose.

Mohegan Sun will give money to the city in all sorts of ways. Mr. Mayor they're going to need it because we're going to have a declined tax base and crime going through the roof.

Again, I want everyone to be successful, but apparently I'm the only one here not wanting a casino at all. So, it's really all about the zoning. Zoning, we shouldn't have a casino in Revere, in Everett. Revere has over 53,000 people in the last census 2012, Everett 43,000.

It's just too congested. No matter what you do on these roads and highways, it's not going to fix the traffic patterns that's going to happen.

Thank you very much for your time.

And again, no vested interest here. One last thing, I appreciate all of the Suffolk Downs folks. I want them to be successful and I wish

them well, but your decision shouldn't be based on a dying industry which it is.

Young people -- and no one is going.

That's why it's not successful. If it were successful, it would be thriving. Maybe they need some help, I don't know. But your decision shouldn't be based on that. I say your decision should be based not Everett, not Revere.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you.

Ms. Tye, Carol Tye.

MS. TYE: Thank you, Commissioners.

But I'm here today because as an elected member of the school committee, I think it's really important that you understand that we believe that the Mohegan Sun project is really crucial to the future of education in Revere. The Superintendent supports it. The school committee supports it. The mass supports it because we know this is the only way we can make improvements in our school department.

I was born a neighbor of Suffolk

Downs just after it was actually established and have lived in the same house all of my life and have always considered Suffolk Downs a good neighbor.

I could give you three points as to why I think that Revere should get the Mohegan Sun proposal. First, we need the economic development. I realize that just because we need it, it isn't necessary that you give it, but I know that's part of the law that the needs of the community should be considered.

People have talked about the jobs that are now in existence. We know that's really important not only for the jobs at Suffolk Downs but for the family farms. Our low-income families, we see the suffering every day in our school system as we feed children breakfast, lunch and oftentimes dinner as well.

Our businesses need the support of the partnership that it can bring. And that will bring success not only to the employers and the businesses but to the employees.

I've been in the school department for half a century, actually more than that.

1 So, my first priority is the kids. Our kids 2 need the benefit of being in a place where they 3 can go to a youth center. I also belong to 4 Revere Cares, the MGH coalition in support of 5 children in Revere. And when we take a vote, 6 the number one things the kids want -- Of course, they don't vote for a new high school. 8 -- but the number one thing they want is a youth 9 They feel that they have no place to go 10 after school. And as much as we try to put in 11 after-school program, we cannot support them 12 all.

And I certainly know that we need the infusion of \$1 million a year. That'll buy an awful lot of iPads in the school system. And most of all, I hope that after we get this proposal, someone invited you to the shovel in the ground ceremony for the Mohegan Sun. You probably can't do that. But I hope to invite you to the shovel in the ground ceremony of the opening of a brand-new Revere High School.

I read the newspapers. I don't know much about the Everett project. All I know is what I read in the newspapers. The entire

project over there seems to be replete with intrigue, deception. The project developer seems to be someone who's idea is to bully people by almost antagonistic and arrogant bombast.

suggestions for traffic changes, they tweaked

about every suggestion. You could say well,
that's good business, but that is good business.
It's good for us. It's good for their business.
It's good for all of us.

So, I hope that I will be able to see you at the shovel in the ground ceremony for the new high school. And I hope that the

proposal will go to Revere, Mohegan Sun and Suffolk Downs. Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: All right. 4 Thank you, Ms. Tye. Now we're finished with the 5 people who signed up before the meeting began. 6 And their names were all typed. So, pardon me if I stumble over some of these names that the 8 handwriting I can't read. Paul C. Brooker, Mr. Brooker and Dolores Escuelo would be the next 9 10 one. So, Mr. Brooker.

And I've been an employee at Suffolk Downs for over 40 years. I have formed many great friendships with the workers, the jockeys, owners, trainers and management. And most importantly, I have formed great friendship with

There's concern about traffic

mitigation. Yes, there will be. But there are

plans to alleviate it. Secondly and

importantly, the MBTA is deep in debt. The

increase in ridership will alleviate much of

this.

At a meeting a few years ago, I mentioned that yes after a period of time, many riders will take public transportation and buses. A gentleman jumped up and told me that was ludicrous to think people would ride buses to a casino. He is like many negative attitude towards gambling or racing.

I don't gamble. I went to Las Vegas for a week at a convention, spent a whole \$10 trying to win a motorcycle. In Atlantic City I spent \$.25. So, I'm not a gambler. But I've worked at Suffolk Downs for 42 years and I enjoy it. They're great people.

Like Billy Lagorio, I have concerns also about concrete plans of stabling facilities for my blacksmiths, veterinarians, vendors and very importantly the Eighth Pole, which is a

great organization that helps many people who have problems at a time.

The money being infused into racing from Mohegan Sun will alleviate a lot of problems that we have now. I have lost two-thirds of my blacksmith force because the days are not here, the people are not coming back racing. I've gone from 21 blacksmiths to seven. Income has gone down because of the amount of days of racing.

I was first introduced to Suffolk

Downs in 1948 by my grandmother. And other than
eight and a half years in the Marine Corps, I've
been in racing all over the country. Racing is
a great thing. Mohegan Sun will help us and not
only in sporting entertainment, musical
entertainment, but in cultural as they do with
the great Indian pow wows. This is things that
people need not just the gambling. And they
will bring it. And I thank you for your time
and again your patience. Thank you again.

MS. REARDON: Hi. My name is Patti
Reardon. My daughter is a trainer at the track.
I've been to many of these meetings including

I would like to tell the committee that this is the last thoroughbred racetrack in New England. Many other places are building tracks such as outside of Austin, Texas because they have the support of gambling and other things from their state. We need the support that has been taken away from the thoroughbred racing because of lotteries and other things that go on.

The track that's in Plainridge, they're already going forward with their plans. Mostly Plainridge are trotters that have a circuit throughout New England. They at the end of their meet, they go home to Maine. Here in Massachusetts, we want to bring our thoroughbreds home to stay and live. And in order to do that, we need the funds that come from racing.

I've heard of plans and I agree with
Billy. We need concrete plans of a barn area
that will be located at the track, not a
hypothetical two-story thing that I've heard
rumored around. Anybody that's ever taken a
horse off a trailer knows it is not going to
come down a second story ramp.

I'd like to thank the Commission for all they've done in allowing everybody to speak their mind. Thank you very much.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Ms. Reardon. Marguerite Flury, Hal Abrams, Vincent Camarada, David Lamotha, David Vigalia. Here comes somebody. All right, Sir. Good evening.

MR. LAMOTHA: How are you doing,

Commissioner. I am David Lamotha. I'm a Revere

resident for 52 years, all of my life. I'm a

Local 103 electrician.

I have been out of work for almost 11 months. I just got back. This was a jobs bill. Since 2007, me and a bunch of other locals have been looking for this situation to get back to work. We have been waiting since 2007. This has been tough. Guys have lost

- 1 Guys have lost houses and everything 2 else. 3 We voted twice in Revere. We won 4 both times. I remember the Mayor, thanking him -- Wow, tough. 5 6 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Take your 7 time. 8 MR. LAMOTHA: I am. When we won the 9 vote in November -- February 25, I congratulated 10 the Mayor for the vote. I said I'm a Local 103 11 electrician in the construction business. He says to me, and I thank him for this, we get 13 this license you will not only work there, but
- 12
- 14 you will head further. We will see the road on
- 15 the beach and keep going. I trust this Mayor.
- 16 I trust Mohegan Sun. I trust Suffolk Downs.
- 17 Build then the casino, give them the license so
- 18 every union construction worker can get back to
- 19 work and support their families. Thank you.
- 20 COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Cynthia Tolin.
- 21 Ms. Tolin.
- 22 MS. TOLIN: It's late, so I'm
- 23 cutting my remarks in half because you've been
- 24 very patient. I heard the saying that what

happens in Vegas stays in Vegas. I hope you keep that. I hope you keep what happens in Vegas in Vegas.

I have no connection with the track.

I'm not a gambler. I'm either not smart enough or dumb enough. I'm certainly not rich enough or poor enough to make any money from the track.

I just love the horses. I love watching those magnificent creatures run. And I'm not talking about the trainers or the jockeys. I'm referring to the horses.

There is one bet that I believe in 100 percent though. If you vote for Suffolk Downs and keep the story track alive you will have a winner and you will never regret this decision.

We are a country that was built on agriculture. And as I was listening to people here today, I was thinking how appropriate it is that Revere, which is asking for the casino license, was named for a man who was a patriot and a silversmith. But he wasn't known for being a silversmith. He was known because he rode a horse. And I think Paul Revere would be

very pleased if the track were kept alive in the city that bears his name.

There are legendary names associated with the track. And I am not going to repeat all of them but many, many famous horses and jockeys have been here. None of course which is more famous than around Tammi Piermarini who is in a rarified stratosphere of being one of the few jockeys who has won over 2000 races. I think she is now the number three female jockey in the country for the number of races that she has won.

But it's not about the famous names. It's about the everyday people who come to the track and care for these equines. It's also about leadership. Suffolk Downs was the first track in the country to ban any owner whose horse had been sold to a slaughterhouse. And if a horse is found to end up in one of these facilities, the owner is banned for life from racing at Suffolk Downs. That's leadership. No medications other than Lasik may be administered to a horse within 24 hours of racing.

It's clearly a remarkable part of

- 1 Boston's sports history. So, I want to ask you 2 if the Boston Garden were in financial trouble 3 would you say no to the Celtics and the Bruins? 4 If Gillette Stadium faced closure for economic 5 reasons, would you say no to the New England 6 Revolution and the Patriots? And heaven forbid, if Fenway Park didn't have the backing to 8 continue, would you say no to the Boston Red Sox? So, I'm asking you, will you say yes to 9 10 Suffolk Downs? Thank you.
  - COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you.

    All right. That concludes the list of speakers that have signed up. I want to thank each and every one of you who still remain and those of you who have left.

As I said at the beginning, those comments that you allure made and took the time to make are enormously important to all of us and we'll take them into careful account as we proceed.

We are pleased to be with you again this evening for our final chance to close as you enter the phase of your review, deliberation and decision.

We've been very grateful as a team for the opportunity over the past few years on a number of folks' part, particularly the guy with the eyeglasses, to share our ideas, our history and our qualifications as a collective team.

But certainly here in the more recent phase of this, our vision and proposal to design and develop what we think is the Commonwealth's flagship gaming and entertainment complex right here in the historic tourist destination in the city of Revere.

A quick aside and it was sparked as fate might have it, I don't know if he is still in the audience or not, but there was a young paratrooper from Fort Bragg, North Carolina here. And it took me back to my days in the

Army. And what the recurring theme of his comments was is that this is about the people.

We can all show you a design plan and a marketing plan and a jobs program, but really it's about the people. It's not just the historic destination city of Revere that counts in this thing, it's those people of Revere. We have been humbled by the reception that we've received as the Mohegan Sun team here in the city of Revere.

And I would be remiss if I didn't take this opportunity for those that are still present and hanging in there and those who have made their comments and departed if I didn't take this to say thank you to all of you for what you've done.

Another recurring theme throughout those comments tonight was from those who had experienced our casino in Uncasville,

Connecticut. And to a speaker they all mentioned the quality of our employees. And we like to think that our employees, our team members are really our most precious resource.

And if you take the fact that that's

how we operate that our employees, our team members are our most precious resource and you overlay that on what our host and surrounding community agreements that call on us to employ these local people, these very wonderful people that I've just been talking about, then we're sitting on a veritable goldmine for what we can do here when we put our work in their hands here in the city of Revere. And we're looking very much forward to that.

You might recall the last time we appeared before you, I suggested that you consider this decision not in this moment, but as part of the legacy of the decision that you will make for some time to come.

And shortly after that hearing just a few weeks ago, I had the great fortune to be at an event on Revere Beach. It occurred to me tonight that I should transport you forward in time and make you think about that legacy. Look forward and reason back to this decision. It's truly breathtaking when you think about what could come from a decision to license Mohegan Sun especially when you consider what it can do

in terms of rejuvenating that historic beach, that tremendous stretch of ocean and sand.

Imagine if you will that you're standing on a jetty coming out of the south side of Revere Beach. It's the reconstructed great ocean pier. And you're looking back at the beach where you see Mayor Rizzo about to cut the ribbon. And just a quarter-mile away is the front door of our resort.

Music from the newly formed Revere
High School band fills the air. The band looks
and sounds great. They're in their new
uniforms. It matches their new school, all
thanks to revenue generated by the Mohegan Sun
Resort. As you look down the beach, the beach
is alive with activity. Umbrellas are along the
water line. Umbrellas that are in the shades
and the colors of the Mohegan Sun.

Out on the water, there are sailboats filled with children. Children that are learning STEM, science, technology, engineering and math along with sailing in a program that we anticipate bringing this fall to the community of Revere, modeled after a program

that we already partner and conduct down in Stonington, down off the Narragansett Bay. And importantly, those children include children of our future employees.

Imagine that there are new hotels and restaurants now our business partners in the Momentum program. And they're bustling with activity and visible all along the boulevard. And imagine that there are couples enjoying an afternoon at the Mohegan Sun Beach Club, a club connected by a shuttle service from our boutique hotel out to the beach that shuttles folks back and forth.

Imagine that there are seniors setting up for one of a series of community concert events at the Reinstein Bandstand. And finally imagine that just a short distance away those parasols, those umbrellas that we keep talking to you about, there they are like a reflection of the umbrellas that are back on that very beach.

This captures the essence of our unique design. And this captures the essence of what our resort casino can do for Revere Beach.

So, as you imagine all of this, imagine that what we've done is we've accomplished the goal. Imagine that we've made Revere and Revere Beach into a superior tourist destination once again.

And imagine that you have left an enduring legacy and one that makes not only a first order economic impact on Revere, but a second order and larger impact all along the North Shore. That's the spirit and intent of this legislation.

We can imagine all of this because it is in fact our vision. And to bring that vision into clearer focus, I would like to introduce our friend and the Mayor of Revere, Mayor Dan Rizzo.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Mr. Mayor.

THE HON. DANIEL RIZZO: Good evening, Judge McHugh, members of the Commission. With one action, you can provide a powerful catalyst to make Chairman Brown's look into the future a reality.

As you know, Revere has a long proud history as a tourist destination. The nearly

three-mile long crescent Revere Beach was once the anchor tenant to a mall of recreation and entertainment venues from ballrooms to races, rollercoasters to carousels, movie theaters to restaurants. Revere has long been a source of recreation and as a regional vacation and tourist destination for people across New England and beyond.

In fact, just last month Revere played host to our 11th annual International Sand Sculpting Festival, the largest of its kind to be found anywhere. This year's figures show that somewhere between 600- and 800,000 people visited Revere over a three-day period. That number includes sculptors and families from across the world.

Over the years, we've hosted hotels and restaurant of all price points from the Point of Pines to Rogan's Point, from the time a little known landscape designer named Charles Elliott was chosen by the Parks Commission to design Revere Beach Reservation back in 1896 to the parkway's reconstruction of the 1990s, local, state and federal decision-makers have

1 | always recognized Revere's enormous potential.

2 Revere Beach attracts greatness all around it.

3 It always has.

But it's not only the beauty of the nation's first public beach that is made and will make Revere a grand destination once again. It is much more than that. It's the warm hospitality of its people, the historical collaboration and partnerships with surrounding communities, the multitude of entertainment offerings not just in Revere but across this great region, the majesty of thoroughbred racing, and yes, soon the newly reconstructed great ocean pier.

Given this enormous potential and strong regional collaboration, the likely results will be incredibly impressive. Regional unemployment rates will be at an all-time lows. More residents will secure not just jobs, but careers that will provide security for their families and real opportunity for advancement.

For many, home ownership will become a reality. And thanks to new local gaming tax revenues, local municipalities are now able to

invest in public safety, schools and parks and making our communities better places to live learn, work and play.

Road improvements long thought unfixable will get better thanks to improvement design for peak casino travel. The American dream will be alive and well.

Consider this project by the numbers. \$52 Million, this is the minimum amount that Mohegan Sun will spend in annual payments to its host and 12 surrounding communities.

\$50 Million this is the estimate of the amount available each year for resort patrons to spend with local businesses with Mohegan's industry changing Momentum Club players card program.

\$50 Million, this is Mohegan's annual commitment to vendor spending within a 15-mile radius of the city of Revere.

\$45 Million, this is the total private investment Mohegan Sun will spend in transportation and infrastructure improvements.

4000, this is the number of

permanent jobs being created. 2500, this is the number of construction jobs being created. 850, this is number of jobs being preserved in the historic thoroughbred racing industry at Suffolk Downs. 5600, this is a number of statewide jobs including direct, indirect and induced jobs in the first year of operation.

And finally the number one, this is the number of gaming licenses needed to bring all of these numbers to fruition.

When you vote on September 12

Governor Patrick and the Legislature's collective vision to create jobs and generate revenues by expanded gaming and preserving thoroughbred racing will take another step closer to reality, but it will not stop there.

Yes, the voters will have their say when they vote in November, but it will not stop there either. Know the real work of creating jobs will be accomplished by working with my colleagues in government not just in Revere but with mayors, managers, administrators, city councils, boards of aldermen, boards of selectmen from across the region.

We will work hard doing the project by project work that capitalizes on this great opportunity. And we will do in a way that connects our varied venues and attributes and becomes a must see part of New England and beyond.

You may know that many of my colleagues and I have already begun discussions centered around these opportunities so that we waste no time in maximizing the regional economic benefit that will come from this resort. We will continue to meet and partner together because we all see such great potential.

You see for us, this is not merely a vote for one isolated project, but a neverending series of projects hotels, restaurants and businesses that will span from the Boston waterfront to the shores of Pickering Wharf in Salem and beyond.

I invite any one of you to sit with my economic development director John Festa for just one day. You would hear firsthand the numerous proposals being considered by investors

and developers almost all predicated upon your decision.

To be clear, this resort is not an end for us. It is just the beginning. It is the spark to a resurgence in economic activity to a corridor of the state and demographic of people hit hardest by our changing economy.

This is also about helping the less fortunate, the unemployed and the under employed and those who have sacrificed in our communities. I am on the board of CAPAC. And I'm so excited that Mohegan Sun has partnered with that organization to set up a job training and placement program for those who need it most.

Mohegan Sun will also look to train and employ disabled workers through their partnership with Community Enterprises. And I know that due to the great interest that Chairman Brown has in these issues, Mohegan Sun is the only applicant to have a specific program for employing our nation's heroes, our veterans through a partnership agreement with the Massachusetts Fallen Heroes Fund.

With one action, you can provide a powerful catalyst to spark a renaissance in this region's future. On behalf of my colleagues in local and state government along with the unemployed and under employed throughout this region, I ask each of you to vote for this project to give us the tools that fulfill the promise of Chapter 194 of the Acts of 2011, the best legislation of its kind, the Massachusetts Gaming Act.

I want to thank you for your time and consideration. And I'd now like to call on Mitch Etess.

COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr. 15 Mayor. Mr. Etess.

MR. ETESS: Thank you, Mr. Mayor.

It's great to be back here. And it's kind of amazing that this journey of ours is coming to a close. And there's a bunch of things that I want to tell you since this is my last chance to speak to you before you make this decision that is so important to the people here in Revere, to the whole Commonwealth.

I just hope that you realize how

extremely important this has been to us. We put our heart and soul into this. It's critical to us. It's why we spent tens of millions of dollars and thousands of hours from Kevin and I all of the way down, because it's really important to us.

It's why we forged best in class partnerships with vendors and entrepreneurs and tourism and hospitality and entertainment venues, municipalities, unions and neighborhoods. So, I've put together an extremely talented team of architects, engineers and experts in many fields, some local, some world-renowned and in many cases both.

As you know we've been focused in providing you with all of the information that you need to help in this important decision.

We've offered and we've tried to be completely transparent and to strictly conform to the policies and procedures set by the Governor, the Legislature and yourselves.

I don't have to tell you, this has been a very rigorous process, but it has without question made our project and our proposal

better.

We stand before you tonight with a location, project, proposal and team that will make the Commonwealth proud each and every day.

Mohegan Sun offers you the unique combination of being a nationally recognized gaming company, widely respected in our industry. We operate a gaming facility that does more gaming revenue than any casino in the Western Hemisphere.

We have a track record of success in multiple venues and multiple jurisdictions. And we are also a group that's been part of the New England landscape for nearly 400 years. We've evolved the Mohegan Tribe's way of cooperation, transparency and truthfulness into the Mohegan Sun way, a corporate philosophy with the same values of openness, transparency and trust.

Our location is far superior. And it's not just in terms of access, environmental safely and preparedness but that it sits in the city of Revere with its rich tradition of both gaming and hospitality. A city that's poised for the type of economic development that comes from gaming and tourism is why this Act was

started.

Our project is a uniquely designed resort that has been conceptualized and created exclusively for Revere. One that fits into the character and the fabric of its community, and it integrates with the region. Mohegan Sun Massachusetts will live and breathe Massachusetts and succeed not as a regional casino as some suggest, but as a national, international destination befitting the Commonwealth. It will complement the city and its surroundings. It will not to attempt to redefine it.

As you know, just this week as you heard today, an independent panel of architects unanimously embraced our design over that of the competitor. And of course, this will be a very sustainable project, the greenest casino in the country, truly shovel ready and environmentally safe.

Our proposal revolves around the industry changing economic model, the centerpiece of the Massachusetts Gaming Act, an outwardly facing model that integrates our

Mohegan Sun Momentum Points program and
therefore the resort itself into the
entertainment, tourism, convention, hospitality

businesses around it.

Putting tens of millions of dollars for patrons out into the community to spend, out in the community, not inside the casino. In fact, our patrons will actually be able to comp. themselves at area attractions and restaurants and stores. This is unprecedented. It's the first in the nation. And so far we've enrolled close to 390 participants in over 40 communities. And the list is growing as it has since I first addressed you.

We have five million established

Momentum Club members. And we have told you
many times, one out of six persons in the
greater Boston area are already members, but
there are four million members from outside the
Commonwealth. That means that Mohegan Sun
Massachusetts comes with loyal customers, lots
of loyal customers from the Commonwealth, from
New England, from the nation, from the world.
So, our database will drive revenue into

Massachusetts from near and far.

We are excited about the tremendous diverse workforce we'll have in Revere. Through our numerous partnerships with the community colleges, higher education institutions and nonprofit groups, we'll have a highly trained workforce. Mohegan is a minority-owned company, has a track record as an organization that embraces diversity.

In addition, through the terms of our host and surrounding community agreements and the planning we've already shared with you, you know that we will create a diverse workforce. And because our agreements with organized labor and because among our core values we'll have a workforce that is well compensated and who can live comfortably in Revere and the surrounding communities.

Our team is led by a 400-year-old tribe that accepts and shares the Commonwealth's policies and priorities. We bring a sense of teamwork and commitment that's unprecedented and unwavering.

Our team extends far beyond Mohegan,

1 Brigade our amazing financial assets behind us 2 and with us as our partners, KPF, New England 3 Development and Finard. Our team includes 4 hundreds of local businesses, dozens of unions, 5 the Wang, Shubert and Colonial theatres, area 6 municipal and nonprofit entertainment venues, Mayor Rizzo and the citizens of Revere that are 8 here, and all of our 12 surrounding communities. Community colleges, Lasell College and area 9 10 nonprofit organizations such as CAPAC, the 11 Massachusetts Fallen Heroes Funds, Community 12 Enterprises, the North of Boston Convention and 13 Visitors Bureau and the Greater Boston Convention and Visitors Bureau. 14 15 Now I can't say this as eloquently as Louis did, but you know that awarding Mohegan 16 17 Sun Massachusetts will preserve thoroughbred 18 racing in the Commonwealth and 850 jobs at 19 Suffolk Downs and thousands more in ancillary 20 farms and businesses. 21 And lastly, you know exactly what 22 we'll be like to work with by the things we've 23 done during this process, not the things that 24 we'll we say we'll do or that you hope we'll do.

1	So, for all of those reasons and
2	more, we know that Mohegan Sun is the clear
3	choice for the Commonwealth as its flagship
4	gaming resort. Thank you.
5	COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Thank you, Mr.
6	Etess. All right. Thank you all for your
7	participation, for your energy, for your
8	insights, for your comments. And I will now
9	entertain a motion to close the statutory
10	hearing with respect to the Mohegan Sun
11	application.
12	COMMISSIONER CAMERON: So moved.
13	COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: Any
14	discussion? All in favor, aye.
15	COMMISSIONER CAMERON: Aye.
16	COMMISSIONER ZUNIGA: Aye.
17	COMMISSIONER STEBBINS: Aye.
18	COMMISSIONER MCHUGH: The hearing is
19	concluded. Thank you all very much.
