OVERVIEW OF MEETING

The Massachusetts Gaming Commission has released its 2022 Community Mitigation Fund (CMF) Guidelines, which make some changes to the program. The purpose of this meeting is to:

ABOUT THE COMMUNITY MITIGATION FUND

- MGL Chapter 23K established the Community Mitigation Fund to offset the costs associated with the construction and operation of casinos in Massachusetts.
- □ 6.5% of the Gaming Taxes from Category 1 facilities go into the fund.
- □ Target spending for 2022 is \$21 million.

WHAT'S NEW FOR 2022

Several changes have been made to the CMF Guidelines.

The most significant changes are to:

- □ Public Safety Grants
- **Community Planning Grants**
- Workforce Grants

PUBLIC SAFETY GRANTS

- □ A new category for 2022
- □ Previously, public safety grants were a sub-set of Specific Impact Grants
- □ The basic parameters of these grants remain the same
- □ These funds must be used to supplement, not supplant, existing funding.
- The Commission is stressing the availability of these grants for training in support of the police reform law such as:
 - Implicit bias training
 - De-escalation training



COMMUNITY PLANNING GRANTS

To streamline the application process, the Commission has made some changes to the Community Planning Grant to reduce the documentation required to quantify the impact of the casino.

- The Commission has determined that the presence of a casino likely has some negative impacts on certain local businesses.
- ❑ Gaming establishments also provide opportunities for communities and businesses, but the lack of local funding hampers the ability to take advantage of casino benefits ("Lost Opportunity Costs").
- Applicants must still identify the impact associated with the casino, but no longer need to go to extraordinary lengths to **quantify** the impact.
- □ As always, the proposed project must mitigate the defined casino impact.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

- □ Workforce Grants increased to a maximum of \$500,000
- □ Regional Incentive Bonus has been eliminated
 - Bonus was not achieving its intended result
 - ✤ A consortium approach is part of the basic requirement
 - Created more confusion than incentive



OTHER CHANGES

- Specific Impact Grant More than one application may be submitted with the total of all grants not exceeding \$500,000
- □ Transportation Construction Maximum grant increased to \$1.5 million Commission contribution remains at a maximum of 33% of project cost.
- Review team will consider the use of Minority/Women/Veteran businesses as an evaluation criteria.
- On the application forms, we ask that all grant requests be rounded to the nearest \$100.

GRANT FUND CATEGORIES

There are eight categories of grants identified in the 2022 Guidelines.

- **General Specific Impact**
- Public Safety
- **Community Planning**
- **Transportation Planning**
- **Transportation Construction**
- **Workforce Development**
- **Tribal Gaming Technical Assistance**
- Emergency Mitigation

SPECIFIC IMPACT GRANT

Any impact of a gaming establishment that has been identified by a community that doesn't fall under any other category. The Community Limit is \$500,000.

- Increased demand on water and sewer systems
- Impacts from storm water run-off
- Stresses on housing stock including any negative impacts on the appraised value
- Increased social service needs including those related to problem gambling
- Demonstrated impact on public education



PUBLIC SAFETY GRANT

- An impact by a gaming establishment that has been identified by a community requiring:
 - Supplemental training for Police, Fire, and EMS for handling patrons from the gaming establishment
 - Increased demand on public safety staffing
 - Increased demand on public safety equipment
 - Pedestrian safety improvements
- One Public Safety Grant per community
- Maximum Grant \$200,000



Public Safety funding must supplement, not supplant existing funding.

COMMUNITY PLANNING GRANTS

Used for a variety of studies that typically are trying to leverage the presence of the gaming establishment for the benefit of the community, including:

- Economic Development Studies
- Land Use Planning
- Marketing and Promotional Plans
- Opportunities that would improve the ability of the community to compete



Category Limitations/Requirements

- Maximum grant amount \$100,000
 - Consultation with Regional Planning Agency

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TRANSPORTATION PLANNING GRANTS

Cover many types of transportation related studies and evaluations such as:

- Traffic Studies/Preliminary Design
- Transit Planning
- Bike Path Planning and Design

Grant Limitations

- Maximum grant amount -\$200,000
- Consultation with Regional Planning Agency



TRANSPORTATION CONSTRUCTION GRANTS

Category Limitations/Requirements

- Maximum grant amount \$1,500,000
- □ Maximum MGC contribution per project 1/3 of the total cost
- Projects must be shovel ready by June 30, 2023.
- Consultation with MassDOT/Regional Planning Agency/ Public Transit Agency



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REGIONAL COLLABORATION

The Commission strongly encourages regional collaboration. **Projects in the Transportation Planning and Community Planning categories are eligible for bonuses for regional collaboration (\$10k-\$50k).**

Some examples of communities that have worked together include:

- □ Foxborough/Plainville/Wrentham
- Revere/Saugus
- Springfield/Chicopee
- Everett/Somerville

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WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT GRANTS

One \$500,000 Workforce Grant each for Region A and Region B

Eligible Costs

- Administrative No more than 7.5%
- Consulting Services
- Expenses Reasonable expenses may be eligible
- Materials Training and educational tools, exams, technology
- Personnel Costs (with certain restrictions)

Eligible Activities

- Workforce Program structures intentional connections among ABE, occupational training, and postsecondary education programs designed to meet the needs of both adult learners and employers
- Educational GED assistance; postsecondary vocational programs; registered apprenticeships; courses leading to college credits; scholarships
- English Language ESOL; contextualized learning
- Credentials industry-related training, certificates

Measuring Casino Impacts

- City retained TEC to perform traffic impact analysis
- Two locations of interest were designated
 - Williams Street, west of Pearl Street, capturing vehicles traveling toward the Casino via the McCardle and Chelsea Street Bridges, as well as Logan Airport.
 - Beacham Street to the west of Market Street captures vehicles traveling toward the Casino from Route 1, both northbound via a direct exit and southbound via Carter Street and Spruce Street, including traffic stemming from North Shore
- City collected baseline data for six weeks in June 2019, ahead of the casino opening on June 23, 2019
 - Traffic data collected included traffic volumes and crash statistics
- City performed second round of traffic data collection in October 2019 to measure traffic impacts post-opening

- City sought and obtained a variety of grant and bond financing sources to realize the project
- Total Project Cost: \$11.26m
- Total Construction Cost: \$10.8m
- U.S. Economic Development Administration: \$3m
- MWRA I/I Funding (75% grant, 25% loan): \$1.63m
- Eversource: \$208,000
- Local Financing (GO Bonds, Sewer Enterprise, Water Enterprise): \$4.5m
- Mass Gaming Commission: \$1.5m
 - Specific Impacts Grant: \$500,000
 - Transportation Construction Projects Grant: \$1,000,000
 - Substantiated request with robust data on traffic increases, as well as physical and operational impacts

Using MGC Reported Info

According to Christopher Bruce, the author of Assessing the Impact of Gambling on Public Safety in Massachusetts Cities and Towns, "The types of calls for service to increase are those highly correlated with the number of cars and visitors to a community, such as traffic issues and reports of lost property and suspicious activity". Since the inception of The PPC we have seen an increase in traffic collisions and traffic related calls for service. Foxborough has all of the major routes to PPC running through our community, including Rte 1, 106, 140, 115,95, 495, and a variety of surface roads which serve as tributaries to these roadways.

Of note in Mr. Bruce's 2019 Analysis of changes in police data following four years of activity at Plainridge Park Casino "Although I related similar increases "likely" in Plainville and North Attleborough, in Foxborough's case, most hot spots seem around the stadium and not on routes to PPC. The increase is also a bit too steep to not involve some kind of change in policy or practice for recording such events.



We have noted an increase in criminal activity and calls for service at our hotels since the inception of PPC. This increase was noted by Christopher Bruce's **Analysis of changes in police data following four years of activity at Plainridge Park Casino.** "As the closest major hotel cluster to Plainridge Park

(there are 7 within the town limits, plus two in nearby Mansfield), there were concerns from the beginning that Foxborough might see an increase in activity at hotels. During the first year, this predicted increase failed to come to fruition, but both calls for service and crimes remained at traditional levels. But both 2017 and 2018 saw **a spike in activity** at Foxborough hotels." Of note since 2019 we now host 9 hotels in Foxborough. The closest hotel to PPC on Route 1 is 4 miles away and has seen an increase in police reports taken of over 120% in the 5 years since PPC has opened, from 46 in the 2011-2015 period to 101 during the 2016-2020 period.

PROJECTS OF REGIONAL SIGNIFICANCE

- Outside of the CMF process, we are going to evaluate the need for funds for projects that exceed our current limits.
- These would typically be large transportation construction or economic development projects that would require a significant dedication of financial resources to complete
- In January, the Commission will be reaching out to host and surrounding communities to attempt to identify the universe of projects that communities are considering that could also be eligible for CMF funding.
- □ The Commission will use this information to determine whether a new category of grants should be added for 2023 and beyond.



DIVISION OF COMMUNITY AFFAIRS

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
