The Gaming Enforcement Division (GED) of the Massachusetts Attorney General's Office (AGO) investigates and prosecutes criminal conduct related to expanded gaming in the Commonwealth and criminal conduct related to the gaming facilities, such as financial crime, organized crime, corruption, and money laundering, investigates. GED also monitors the fairness and integrity of the gaming industry, aids the Massachusetts Gaming Commission in consideration and promulgation of rules and regulations, and participates in generating a list of persons to be excluded from licensed gaming facilities. One of GED's primary responsibilities is to respond to cases resulting from activity at Encore Boston Harbor and MGM Springfield. Since 2021, an average of 22% of GED cases related to Encore Boston Harbor heard in Malden District Court involve charges relating to domestic violence (DV) and sexual assault (SA). During the same period, 14% of GED cases related to MGM Springfield heard in Springfield District court also involve charges relating to DV and SA.

The significant proportion of GED's caseload devoted to DV and SA cases in these two courts demonstrates a clear increase in criminal cases due to the establishment and operation of Massachusetts casinos. GED investigates and prosecutes criminal conduct related to expanding gaming thereby establishing a causal linkage between the presence of casinos and these crimes.

Additionally, the AGO's law enforcement partners have indicated that human trafficking (HT) occurs in Massachusetts casinos although quantitative data on its prevalence is scarce. Resources devoted to SA investigations, which may relate to HT criminal activity at casinos, will allow the AGO to explore, and potentially begin to measure, the prevalence of HT at casinos.

With a Regional Public Safety Grant, GED intends to hire a full-time Assistant Attorney General (AAG) who will specialize in DV/SA investigations and prosecutions stemming from the establishment and operation of casinos. GED's current staff does not currently maintain specializations in DV or SA. Given the unique needs of survivors of DV and SA crimes, an AAG with prior DV/SA litigation experience or with the charge to specialize in both will add necessary capacity and improve outcomes in these cases. With the grant-funded AAG undertaking DV/SA cases, GED will also be able to increase its workload of gambling offenses and other serious crimes relating to gaming facilities.

The grant-funded AAG's DV and SA specializations will also allow them to investigate and develop HT cases as workflow allows. Cases will be investigated and prosecuted with assistance from the AGO's Human Trafficking Division (HTD). The AGO maintains a multidisciplinary team (MDT) that responds to human trafficking through law enforcement efforts, policy development, and community partnerships. HTD's expertise and MDT model are critical to successfully investigate and prosecute these complex crimes and is vital to appropriately assisting survivors who may have experienced significant trauma.

Data on HT crimes, both broadly and specific to the impacts of gaming establishments, are not well measured. However, the AGO's law enforcement partners see evidence indicating HT crimes occur due to the presence of casinos. This is in addition to general recognition from the casino industry that hospitality-related businesses can attract human traffickers. It is necessary to begin an investigation and initial measurement process in order determine the extent of the problem. The AAG's grant-funded work and data collected from these efforts is expected to inform future requests for Regional Public Safety Grants and better support the Commonwealth's efforts to determine the scope of casino-related HT crimes.

With assistance from HTD, the grant-funded AAG will undertake initial efforts to review the scope of HT crimes potentially occurring at Encore Boston Harbor, Plainridge Park Casino, and MGM Springfield. The grant-funded AAG will receive training and oversight from HTD when working on HT cases in order to effectively pursue justice for survivors. Upon notification of a grant award, GED will begin a hiring process that prioritizes onboarding the AAG at the beginning of FY25.

The grant will also use subcontracts to directly support personnel and increase GED's capacity to address DV, SA, and HT crimes. GED will use grant funds to obtain translation services for interviews, evidence review, and communication with both survivors and witnesses. Language barriers are costly impediments to casework which can only be overcome with professional translations services. Additionally, the AGO's focus on equitable outcomes for survivors necessitates effective engagement with communities speaking languages other than English. GED will review procurement of translations services upon receipt of a grant award and will subcontract for services in FY25 as early as possible.

Massachusetts State Police (MSP) Troopers are critical components of AGO criminal investigations. Casino-focused investigations often require Troopers to work beyond normal hours (Monday – Friday, 0830-1700) and require additional resources to appropriately staff. Complex cases requiring wiretaps are not possible without significant overtime allocations and outcomes are jeopardized when overtime budgets are not available. Grant-funded overtime will be approved by GED and the AGO's State Police Detective Unit for DV/SA/HT cases pursued under this grant. Upon receipt of a grant award, GED would

develop and negotiate a payments agreement with MSP for overtime incurred under the grant in FY25.

GED will use grant funds to send five staff to the Conference on Crimes Against Women (CCAW) in Dallas, TX. The annual conference is expected to be held in May 2025. CCAW is a critical skill-building opportunity for GED staff, including the grant-funded AAG, to develop expertise in DV, SA, and HT. Given increased caseloads and the finite term of the grant, the grant-funded AAG will not be able to handle all DV, SA, and HT in perpetuity. Training additional GED staff in DV, SA, and HT is critical to ensure they are equipped to handle the unique nature of these cases in the long term while establishing sustainability for the DV/SA/HT capacity-building goal of GED's grant program. The staff being trained are directly tied to increased caseloads associated with casinos.

The AGO contributes significant financial and administrative resources to ensure the success of its grantfunded programming. A modest administrative rate of 7.5% is charged to support expenses related to grant management, compliance, internal program evaluation, and data collection (either required for reporting or potential opportunities to review HT issues in casinos). Administrative expenses would be incurred against direct costs in FY25 only.

An estimated 706 hours of Trooper overtime will be funded.
