Information Technology Resources Policy

As part of the Commission's commitment to the utilization of current technologies, all of its employees shall have access to the internet. This policy governs the use of information technology resources ("ITRs"), including computers, blackberries, printers and other peripherals, programs, data, local and wide area networks, e-mail, and the Internet for employees and contractors ("users") of all divisions and departments under the direction of the Commission. The use of ITRs by any employee or contractor shall constitute acceptance of the terms of this policy. Accordingly, it is the responsibility of any person using Commission's ITRs to read, understand and follow this policy. The following rules require strict adherence.

Business Use: The internet and e-mail system is provided to facilitate the effective administration of the Commission's business. Users are permitted access to ITRs to assist in the performance of their jobs. The Commission reserves the right to modify this policy at any time.

Personal Use: Limited personal use of the internet and e-mail is allowed if (a) it is in compliance with this policy or any subsequent policy promulgated by the Commission (b) is reasonable in amount and (c) does not interfere with work performance or business needs. Internet use generates the possibility of breaches to the security of confidential information. It also creates the possibility of contamination of our system via viruses or spyware. Spyware allows unauthorized people, outside of the Commission, potential access to passwords and other confidential information. Removing viruses or spyware from the Commission's network would require IT staff invest time and attention better suited for the business of the Commission. For this reason, and to assure the appropriate use of work time, we ask all employees of the Commission to limit internet and personal e-mail use.

Ownership: All e-mail accounts, information, and messages that are created, sent, received, or stored in the Commission's e-mail system are the sole property of the Commission and are not the property of the employee or individual.

No Expectation of Privacy: The Commission's ITRs are the property of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and are to be used in conformance with this policy. The Commission, in pursuit of legitimate needs for supervision, control and the efficient and proper operation of the workplace, will exercise the right to inspect any user's computer, any data contained in it, and any data sent or received by that computer. Users should be aware that the Commission's network administrators, in order to ensure proper network operations, will routinely monitor the volume of the Internet and network traffic together with the Internet sites visited. Use of the Commission's ITRs constitutes express consent for the Commission to monitor and/or inspect any data or messages created, sent, retrieved or received and any web sites accessed for any violations of law, breaches of the Commission's policies, communications that are harmful to the Commission, or for any other reason. Such monitoring may occur at any time, without notice, and without the user's permission.

Information Technology Resources Policy

Prohibited Acts: Provided below is a non-exclusive list of prohibited acts associated with the user's use of the Internet and Commission's e-mail system. Failure to observe this policy may subject individuals to disciplinary action, up to and including suspension of individual user accounts and/or termination of employment. Unless such use is reasonably related to the user's job, it is unacceptable for any reason to use Commission's ITR's:

- To use "Public" instant messaging (IM), including but not limited to, Internet Relay Chat (IRC), I Seek You (ICQ), and AOL Instant Messaging (AIM).
- For any illegal, fraudulent or commercial activities
- For any political purposes
- To send threatening or harassing messages, whether sexual or otherwise
- To access, download, transmit, or share sexually explicit, obscene, or pornographic materials
- To download, create or transmit words, images or references that could be viewed as libelous, offensive, harassing, illegal, derogatory or discriminatory
- To infringe any intellectual property rights by copying or distributing copyrighted materials
- To gain or attempt to gain unauthorized access to any computer or network
- For any use that causes interference with or disruption of network users and resources, including propagation of computer viruses or other harmful programs
- To access or intercept communications intended for other persons
- To misrepresent either the Commission or a person's role at the Commission
- To distribute chain letters
- To access online gambling sites or gaming sites unless accessing the site is necessary for the conduct of the Gaming Commission business
- To place confidential Commission materials (copyrighted software, internal correspondence, etc.) on any publicly accessible Internet computer without prior permission
- To access confidential data unless such access is required by the user's job or to disseminate rightfully accessed confidential information unless required by the user's job
- To use flash drives that have not previously been scanned by spyware

User Responsibilities and Security Guidelines: Employees using the Commission's accounts are acting as representatives of the Commission. As such, employees should act responsibly and professionally so as to preserve the reputation of the Commission or the Commissioners. All communications should be written with the same level of care and professional judgment as paper memoranda or documents. In addition, users are expected to exercise reasonable judgment in interpreting this policy in making decisions about the use of the ITRs.

No employee may install software on his or her computer without approval of his or her Gaming Commission supervisor and an authorized representative of the Information Technology department.

Any person with questions regarding the application or meaning of this policy should seek clarification from either the Information Technology department or the Human Resources department.

Computer Viruses: It is critically important that users take particular care to avoid compromising the security of the network. Users should exercise reasonable precautions in order to prevent the introduction of a computer virus into the local area or wide area networks. Virus scanning software should be used to check any software downloaded from the Internet or obtained from any questionable source. In addition, executable files (program files that end in “.exe”) should not be stored on or run from network drives. Finally, it is a good practice to scan portable media devices periodically to see if they have been infected.

Users should never share their passwords with anyone else, and should promptly notify IT personnel if they suspect their passwords have been compromised. In addition, users who will be leaving their PCs unattended for extended periods should log off of the network.

Use of Blackberries, Smartphones, Lap Tops or other Portable Devices: The Commission may in some instances approve the purchase of certain portable devices for the convenience of certain individuals if determined that it is in the interest of the Commission and for the purposes of conducting the business of the Commission after normal business hours or off site. This portability does not in any way limit this policy (i.e., business use, personal use, prohibited uses, etc.). In order for an individual to obtain a portable device, the business case for the use and need has to be approved by the employee’s supervisor. Access to a portable device does not supersede any other policies relative to time and attendance.

Acknowledgement of Internet Policies and Guidelines:

I have read and reviewed the Commission’s Internet and e-mail policies and guidelines. By signing this form, I agree to abide by the Guidelines currently in place and I agree to review periodically any changes or modifications. I recognize that the law and associated policy regarding the Internet, electronic mail and the Commission’s information systems are continually evolving. I understand that violation of any above policies may result in my termination. Therefore, I understand that my regular review of the Commission’s policy is required.

Steve,

As discussed, the members of the Gaming Commission may speak at events in their official capacity about gaming issues. They may be listed on the event agendas with their titles, since they are acting officially. If you and the other members are generally accepting all such invitations, I don't think any issues are raised. Likewise, I don't think issues are raised as long as you are treating similarly situated entities the same way. However, if you are providing access to the Commission to some entities (by speaking at their events) and not to others, you may wish to develop some objective criteria for Commissioners to use as the basis for accepting or declining speaking engagements. As always, if you have concerns about a specific event, please feel free to call.

As to the other issue you raised, I would not be comfortable giving advice (or having my staff give advice) on the conflict law during an open meeting of the Gaming Commission. If you would like to meet with us privately, we are happy to do that. Karen

From Providence:

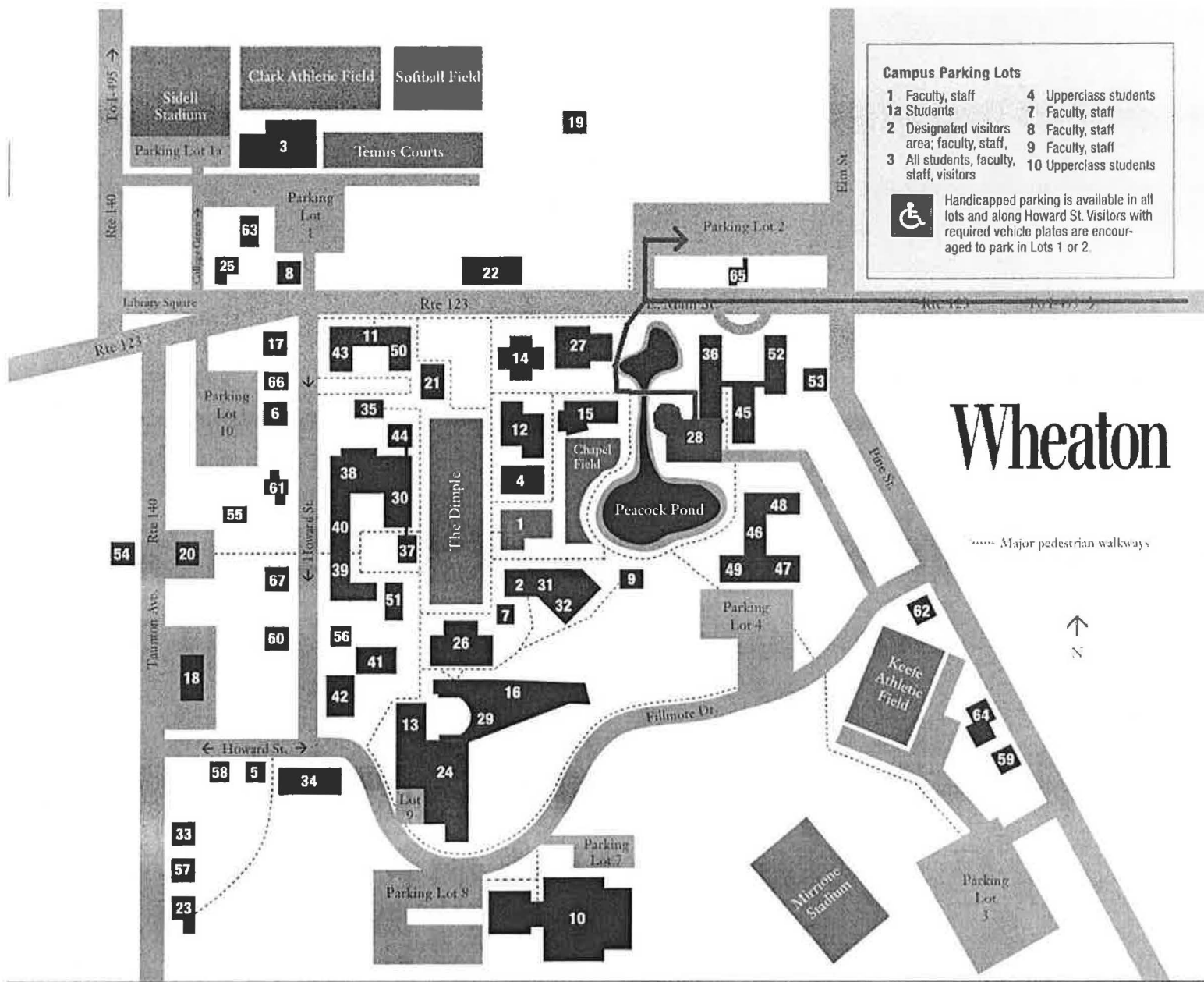
James F. McHugh comes to the Gaming Commission from the Massachusetts Appeals Court, where he served as the special advisor to the Trial Court Chief Justice for Administration and Management on the Trial Court's automated case management project from July 2004 through July 2008. The National Center for State Courts named Justice McHugh as the 2011 recipient of the William H. Rehnquist Award for Judicial Excellence in recognition of his many achievements over his 26-year judicial career, including his tireless efforts and success in achieving improvements in the Massachusetts court system - for the public and for those who work in the courts - on issues ranging from information technology and caseload management to judicial ethics. He retired from the Appeals Court on February 29, 2012.

James F. McHugh was born in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, on February 11, 1944. He received a B.A. from Brown University in 1965. After serving on active duty in the United States Navy, he attended Boston University School of Law, where he was Editor-in-Chief of the Law review and from which he graduated, magna cum laude, in 1970. From 1970 to 1971 he was a law clerk to Judge George MacKinnon of the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. In 1971, he returned to Boston, joining the law firm of Bingham, Dana & Gould (now Bingham McCutchen) as an associate, and later became a partner. His practice emphasized admiralty and First Amendment law.

In 1985, Governor Michael Dukakis appointed him to the Superior Court, where he served for a period as a Regional Administrative Justice and as Chair of the Rules Committee. He served on the Superior Court until March 5, 2001, when Governor Paul Cellucci appointed him to the Appeals Court. Justice McHugh taught a course on the law of the First Amendment at Boston College Law School for ten years and a course on advanced torts at Northeastern University School of Law for two years.

Stephen P. Crosby

Chair, Massachusetts Gaming Commission

Prior to serving as Chair of the Massachusetts Gaming Commission, Mr. Crosby served as Founding Dean of the John W. McCormack Graduate School of Policy and Global Studies at UMass Boston. He has 45 years of experience in policy making, entrepreneurship, non-profits and academics.

In his position as Dean, Mr. Crosby oversaw three academic departments (Public Policy and Public Affairs; Gerontology; and Conflict Resolution, Human Security and Global Governance), along with thirteen research centers and institutes. During his nearly 6 year tenure, he founded the Commonwealth Compact; the Edward J. Collins Center for Public Management; the Collaborative Institute on Oceans, Climate & Security; the Center for Civil Discourse; and has overseen the development of new Centers on Governance and Sustainability; Community Democracy and Democratic Literacy; and Peace, Democracy and Development.

As Secretary of Administration and Finance to Governors Paul Cellucci and Jane M. Swift from 2000-2002, he was responsible for development, legislative approval and implementation of the governor's \$23 billion annual operating budget and a \$2 to \$3 billion capital budget. He supervised 22 agencies with 3,000 employees. In 2002, he served as chief of staff to Governor Swift.

Working with the community on non-profit boards, Mr. Crosby presently serves as chair of the Center for Applied Special Technologies (CAST), and as a board member of the Economic Progress Institute, in Providence, R.I.

In other public service, he co-chaired Governor Patrick's Transition Task Force on Budget and Finance; served as Chair of the Commission to Review Compensation Packages of Senior "Quasi Public" Employees; and served as a member of the Supreme Judicial Court Task Force on Hiring and Promotion in the Judiciary.

In 25 years of work in the private sector, Mr. Crosby was founder and publisher of CCI/Crosby Publishing in Boston. In other business endeavors, he has served as chairman and CEO of technology and publishing companies, including Interactive Radio Corp., Inc., SmartRoute Systems, Inc., Crosby Vandenburg Group, and MetroGuide, Inc. His career also includes work as a campaign manager and senior advisor for local and national candidates and elected representatives, and as a frequent commentator in local and national media.

Mr. Crosby received his B.A. from Harvard College and his J.D. from Boston University.
